WEST INDIES.—CUBA—NORTH COAST.

Havana Harbour—Positions of Additional Beacons and Buoys.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 202 (2) of 5th August, 1887, on additional beacons and buoys having been placed to mark certain shoals in Havana Harbour:—

The following further information as to their positions have been received:—

1. Bajo de Feliciano is marked on its eastern side by a white triangular beacon, placed with Dockyard shears bearing S. $54\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ W., distant $5\frac{3}{4}$ cables, and Morro Lighthouse, N. $63\frac{3}{4}^\circ$ W.

2. Bajo de Regla is marked on its north-eastern side by a red truncated buoy, and by a white beacon:—

The buoy lies with Dockyard shears bearing S. $80\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ W., distant $5\frac{1}{2}$ cables; and Morro Lighthouse N. $56\frac{3}{4}^\circ$ W.

The beacon is placed with Dockyard shears bearing S. $83\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ W., distant $5\frac{1}{2}$ cables; and Morro Lighthouse N. $55\frac{3}{4}^\circ$ W.

3. Bajo de Atocha is marked on its south-western edge by a red truncated buoy, lying with Dockyard shears bearing S. $61\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ W., distant 3 cables; and Morro Lighthouse N. $50\frac{3}{4}^\circ$ W.

4. Bajo Valdes is marked on its south-western edge by a white triangular beacon, placed with Dockyard shears bearing N. $88\frac{3}{4}^\circ$ W., distant $2\frac{3}{4}$ cables; and Morro Lighthouse N. $45\frac{3}{4}^\circ$ W.

NOTE.—A wreck lies sunk on the north-eastern edge of Bajo de Regla.

[The bearings are magnetic. Variation $3\frac{1}{2}^\circ$ Easterly in 1887.]

FRENCHMAN BAY.

(1.) *Fog Signal at Egg Rock Lighthouse.*

THE United States Government has given notice, that on or about 1st August, 1887, a fog signal would be established at Egg Rock Lighthouse, in the entrance of Frenchman Bay:—

The signal is a bell, which during thick and foggy weather will be sounded twice in quick succession at intervals of twenty seconds.

(2.) *Fog Signal at Bear Island Lighthouse.*

Also, that on or about 1st August, 1887, a fog signal would be established at Bear Island Lighthouse, south side of Mount Desert Island:—

The signal is a bell, which during thick and foggy weather will be sounded by machinery, once every fifteen seconds.

In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our common seal, this fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.
