WARNING TO TRAVELLERS IN SPAIN.

THE following is a translation of a Note received from the Spanish Minister at this Court:—

*Spanish Legation, London,
September 21, 1887.*

MY LORD,

IN accordance with the orders of my Government, I have the honour to inform your Excellency, for such steps as you may think proper to take in the matter, that the Spanish Minister of War has issued a General Order to the competent Civil and Military Authorities to prevent any person making topographical studies of the country in the neighbourhood of the frontiers of the kingdom, and under no pretence whatever to permit foreigners, even when they are acting as Surveyors or Engineers in the service of private persons or companies, to take notes of the features, &c., of the localities in question.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with swine-fever.
2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

SCHEDULE.

An Area in the borough of Morley, comprised within the following boundary, that is to say, commencing at the point in Ackroyd-street at the western extremity of the premises occupied by Messrs. Wilson and Swallow, thence along the north side of Ackroyd-street to Marshall-street, thence along the eastern side of Marshall-street

to the end of that street, and thence along the fence at the northern side of the field occupied by Mr. R. Barron and along the line of the said fence and the fence at the western side of the property occupied by Mr. Charles Dixon and Messrs. Wilson and Swallow to the point of commencement.
