MEDITERRANEAN SEA—SARDINIA.—EAST COAST.

(1.) Port Terranova—Occulting Light on Islet at
Entrance.

THE Italian Government has given notice, that on 1st October, 1887, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse erected on the islet (della Bocca), south side of Port Terranova Entrance:—

The light is an occulting white light, with red flashes every twenty-five seconds, the duration of the white light is twelve seconds, that of the red flash two seconds, which is preceded and followed by short partial eclipses. It is elevated 80 feet above high water, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles.

The light is obscured over an arc of about 64°, or between the bearings of N. 84° W. (leading northward of the shoals off Cape Ceraso), and N. 20° W.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, or by lenses, and of the fifth order.

The lighthouse is square, built of brick, and painted white.

Position, latitude 40° 55′ 15′ N., longitude 9° 34′ 00″ E.

Note.—Approaching Terranova, this light should be kept in sight until the four floating lights in the entrance channel are visible.

ADRIATIC—EAST SHORE.—LISSA ISLAND.
(2.) Port S. Giorgio—Occasional Harbour Light.
