Genova, June 24.

Yesterday parted from hence the Gallies of Naples, Sicily and Tiflis, being 15 in number, to the Westward. We have an account from Savoy, That Monsieur Catinat endeavours to lay a Bridge over the Po, but that the Savoyards have hitherto hindered the execution of his design.

Milan, June 28. Our Governor is on his march with the rest of the forces of this State, towards Savoy, to joyn those that are now incamp't near Turin, where there will be very shortly formed an Army of above 30000 Men. In the mean time, we are told, That Monsieur Catinat has sent several Messengers to the Duke, with new Proposals for an Accommodation, but that his Highness will not now hearken to any. Some of our Troops defeated this week a French party of Horse, of whom they killed divers, and took 36 Prisoners, with their Horles.

Venice, June 30. The last Letters from our Fleet, lying before Napoli di Malvasia, told us, That the Captain General Cornaro had landed some Forces to attack the lower Town, and doubted not but to be in few days Masters of it, which would very much facilitate their approaching to the Castle, though without an attack, its believed the Garison there cannot hold out much longer, being in want of many things necessary as well for their Defence as Subsistence.

Warsaw, June 17. We are expecting the return of the Express that was lately sent to Vienna, with the Treaty of Marriage between the Prince of Poland, and the Princess Palatine of Neubourg, and so soon as he arrives with the Emperors Ratification thereof, the Bishop of Posnia, whom the King of Poland has named to be his Ambassador Extraordinary, for the performing the Ceremony of the Marriage, and the conducting the Princess hither, will begin his Journey towards the Imperial Court with a Splendid Attendance. The Envoy from the Kam of Tartary continues still here, not having yet received a final Answer to the Proposals he was charged with, but its believed he will now be very suddenly dispatch'd.

Vienna, July 2. Prince Louis of Baden arrived here the 29th of the last month from Bohemia, and will set out in 3 or 4 days towards Bulgaria, to Command the Imperial Army against the Turks. The Letters from Nissa of the 17th instant, tell us, That the Grand Viter was with 12000 Men at Philippopolis, and that 10000 Turks and Tartars were come to Kizanecke. The Imperialists have taken Uskiza, a very strong Castle on the Frontiers of Bulgaria.

Vienna, July 6. The Emperor has sent Count Maximilian of Walstein to meet and receive on the Frontiers of Austria, the Elector and Electores Palatine, who are on their way hither. The Letters from Nissa of the 24th past, tell us, That the Imperial Forces were drawing together on that side; but that by their best Informations it did not appear the Turks would be able to bring any great Army into the Field this Summer. We have advice, that

a Detachment of 2000 Croats and Rascians, having possessed themselves of the Town of Bizari near Bagualucca, they set Fire to it; and retired with divers Prisoners, and a considerable Booty. Prince Louis of Baden will part from hence the next week for Bulgaria.

From the Imperial Camp at Bruchsal, July 10. The Forces of Saxony are marching this way. So soon as they have joyned us, we shall decamp from hence, and march, as its believed, towards Friedburg, to joyn with General Souches, who is at present posted with 10 or 12000 Men between Basse and Hummingen. At the same time the Elector of Saxony will remain near the Rhine with the Forces of Suabia and Franconia, to block up Philipsburg. The French Army continues about Wackenheim, their out Guards reaching as far as Spire and Wormes.

Francfort, July 12. The Forces of Saxony will be in a Body on the 16th instant at Mergenthal; from whence they will march to joyn the Imperial Army, which continues encamp't at Bruchsal near Philipsburg. The Snaphans have beaten a French Convoy near Lanterne, and got a good Booty.

Cologne, July 14. The Elector of Brandenburg had yesterday a Conference with the Bishop of Munster at Schermbeck, about 4 Leagues from Wesel; and within 2 or 3 days his Electoral Highness will be at the Head of his Army, which in the mean time marches towards the Meuse. The Forces of Munster and Paderborne are incamp't at Meckenheim, about 5 Leagues from Bonn; where they expect Orders for their continuing their march in order to joyn with those of Brandenburg; and together they will make an Army of above 30000 Men, without reckoning the Troops of Neuburg, which are posted at Burvenich near Duwen. The Count de Stirum Major General of the Imperial Army, passed yesterday through this place in his Journey towards Wesel, being sent by the Elector of Bavaria, to the Elector of Brandenburg, and Prince Waldeck. The Marquis de Boufflers marches with some Horse and Foot, towards the Country of Esfeldt. Of 11 Battalions that were at Mont-Royal, 6 are gone to joyn the Army Commanded by the Dauphin, who continues encamp'd between Spire and Wormes.

Brussels, July 16. The Deputies of the States General that came to confer with Prince Waldecke about the State of their Army, are returned for Holland, having left all things in such good Order, that Prince Waldecke who is now encamp'd at Digben, a League from this place, will march in few days towards the Enemy, who lye along the Sambre between Faisiennes and Charleroy. The Elector of Brandenburg will be to morrow with his Forces, which are come to Pijet between Liege and Maftricht, being 25000 Men. And the Marquis de Gastanaga, our Governor General is going to put himself at the Head of the Army, with which he is to act seperately on the side of Flanders. The advices from Sufferland continue to give a very good account of the posture of Affairs in Savoy; the French Troops under Monsieur Catinat being very much streightned, and their Parties daily cut off by the Vaudois and those of Mondovi; who have beset the passages of the Vallies.

The Letters from Paris bring the following List of General and other principal Officers killed and wounded on their side in the late Battle of Fleurus.

The Count de Goumay Lieutenant-General and Governor of *Masleuse*; the Sieur du Metz Lieutenant-General of the Artillery, the Marquis de Vallarceaux Marechal de Camp, the Marquis de Soicourt Colonel of the Regiment of *Vermandois*; the Sieurs de Sallart, de Barillac, de Jusfac, de Juvory, the Chevalier de Siete, ont Colonel of the Dauphins *Gens d'Armes*; the Marquis Verderonne, the Sieur de Laubespine, and the Sieur de Bellefontaine, with a great number of Interior Officers killed. The Sieur de Vivans, and the Sieur Zimenes, both Marechals de Camp, the Sieur de Grader Brigadier, the Count Albert, Son of the Duke de Luynes, the Marquis de Livarot, the Count de Marchin, the Marquis de Mozy, the Count de la Sire, the Sieur de la Riviere, with many others wounded. They own likewise, that divers Regiments suffered extremely in this Fight, and particularly the Royal *Puissant*, those of *Picardy*, *Normandie*, *Languedoc*, *Champagne*, *Vermandois*, the *Royal German*, the *Dragoons of Furstemberg* and *Silbourg*, the Foot Guards, and the *Gens d'Armes*; there remaining of the latter (who were 600 before the Battle) but 175, and of the *Suiss Regiment of Souda*, most of the Officers were killed.

These Letters add, That there Sailed from *Brest* on the 6th instant several light Frigats bound for *Ireland*, under the Command of the Sieur Forant.

*Hague*, July 13. The Deputies of the States General having had a Conference with my Lord *Darkeley* Envoy Extraordinary from *England*, on occasion of the late Engagement at Sea, the States, upon their Report, resolved to return their most hearty Thanks to Her Majesty for the Directions she had been pleased to give about refusing in *England* the Dutch-Ships that were disabled: And at the same time they sent Orders to the Admiralties of these Provinces, not only to hasten away the Men of War that are now near ready to sail, but likewise to fit out what fresh Ships, can be speedily got ready; and writ particularly to the Admiralty of *Zealand*, to put to Sea with all possible diligence the *Zelandia*, a Ship of the Fast Rank. The Pensionary *Heinsius*, and the Heer *Dyckvelt* and *Schaermans*, are come back from *Brussels*, and have brought with them 21 of the Standards that were taken from the French at the Battle of *Flerus*, the other remaining with the *Spaniards*. They write from *Welsch*, that the Elector of *Brandenburg* would part from thence the 14th instant to joyn his Army near the *Mense*.

*Edinburg*, July 10. Major General Mackay is with the Forces under his Command, still at *Inverlochby*, where he designs to make a Fort, and to leave a good Garrison in it, and in several strong Houses in the Highlands. Three of the Heads of Clans, or Chiefs of a Name, are come in and submitted to him.

Whereas several Dutch Seamen are come on Shore upon the Coast of *Dorset* and *Kent*, having left the Ships that were disabled in the late Fight. These are to advertise them, and all others whom it may concern, That Her Majesty has given Directions, That the Commissioners of the Navy at the Navy Office in *Crooked Fryers* near the Tower, do immediately upon the Application of such of them as were Sick or Wounded, give them Conduct Money for the carrying them to *Chatham*, where they will be further taken care of by the Commissioner of the Navy residing there, and provided with all Necessaries for their going on board the Dutch Ships that are lying near that place; And as for such of them as are Sick or Wounded, the Commissioners for Sick and Wounded Seamen in *George-street* in *York Buildings* are likewise ordered to take care of them in what place they be, until they shall be able to repair to their Ships, and have to that purpose appointed Officers near the place where they were put on Shore, who are to provide them with all fitting Accommodations. The like Care is also taken for English Seamen, both for their Cure, and Employing them to return on Shipboard.
