A PROCLAMATION.

MARIE R.

WHereas Their Majesties have received Information, That the Persons herein after particularly Named have Conspired together, and with others their disaffected Professors, to disturb and destroy Their Government, and to that purpose have abetted and Adhered to Their Majesties Enemies in the present Invasion, for which cause several Warrants for High Treason have lately been Issued out against them, but they have withdrawn themselves from their usual places of Abode, and are fled from Justice; Their Majesties therefore have thought fit, by the Advice of Their Privy Council, to Issue this Their Royal Proclamation: And Their Majesties do hereby Command and Require all Their Loving Subjects to discover, Take and Apprehend Edward Henry Earl of Litchfield, Thomas Earl of Aylesbury, William Lord Montgomery, Roger Earl of Cattlemaine, Richard Viscount Preston, Henry Lord Belasyse, Sir Edward Hales, Sir Robert Thorold, Sir Robert Hamilton, Sir Theophilus Ogleshorp, Colonel Edward Sackville, Lieutenant Colonel Duncan Abercromy, Lieutenant William Richardson, Major Thomas Soaper, Captain David Lloyd, William Pen Esq; Edmund Elliot Esq; Marmaduke Langdale Esq; and Edward Rutter, wherever they may be found, and to carry them before the next Justice of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate; who is hereby Required to Commit them to the next Goal, there to remain until they be thence delivered by due Course of Law: And Their Majesties do hereby Require the said Justice or other Magistrate immediately to give Notice thereof to Them or Their Privy Council: And Their Majesties do hereby Publish and Declare to all Persons that shall Conceal the Persons above Named, or any of them, or be Aiding or Assisting in the Concealing of them, or furthering their Escape, that they shall be proceeded against for the same Offence, with the utmost Severity according to Law.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Fourteenth Day of July, 1690. In the Second Year of Our Reign.

Turin, July 2. The Duke of Savoy is marched at the head of his own Forces, and thence that came to his Succour from the State of Milan, to Moncalier, where they are now encamped. Twelve pieces of great Cannon will be taken out of the Arsenal here to morrow, and sent to the Army, which will advance in three or 4 days towards Monsieur Catinat, who has pitched himself near a place called *Osira*, within four Miles of *Pignerol*, expecting a Reinforcement: But his Troops, besides the considerable losses they have sustained by the *Vaudois*, and those of *Montebello*, do suffer very much through the scarcity of Forage and Provisions, and we doubt not but that our Forces as they approach towards them will streighten them yet more. The Prince Eugene of Savoy is arrived in the Camp, and has delivered to his Highness several Dispatches from the Emperor, assuring him at the same time, that 3000 German Horse, and 3000 Foot, are marching with all the speed they can to his Assistance. The first instant the Marquis de *Robenac* Ambassador of France, was conducted from hence to *Inverca*, where he will be kept till such time as we hear that our Ambassador at *Paris* is at Liberty to return home. The new Levies go on very successfully.

Milan, July 5. Our Governour the Count de *Fuenfaldia* went on Friday last to *Lumelino*, to mark out a Camp near this place, whither the Troops of this State have already

begun to march from their several Quarters. The same day 300 Foot and Dragoons of the Garrison of *Casal* advanced between *Vercell* and *Tin* to raise Contributions; upon notice whereof, a Detachment was sent from *Vercell*, who put the Enemy to flight, and another of our Parties coming in very opportunity to intercept their Retreat, most of the French were killed or taken Prisoners.

From the Imperial Camp at Bruchsal, July 12. The Count de *Sturum* (whom the Elector of *Bavaria* sent lately to the Elector of *Saxony*) returned hither on the 6th instant, and gave his Electoral Highness an account, That the Saxon Troops were marching with all possible diligence to joyn the Imperial Army under his Command; and that they will be the 16th of this Month at furthest, at *Heilsbron*. The Dauphin has sent 7 Regiments towards *Savoy*, to joyn Monsieur *Catinat*, and has reinforced the Garrison of *Friburg* with 4000 Men.

Cologne, July 21. According to our last advices from the Palatinate the Elector of *Saxony* was expected the 16th instant with 18000 men in the Imperial Camp at *Bruchsal*. The Imperialists have taken the Fort lately built by the French at *Wagheusel* near *Philipsburg*. The *Brandenburg* Forces are marched to the *Meuse*, a Camp being marked out for them between *Liege* and *Mastricht*. Those of *Munster* and *Paderborne* will remain on this side to cover the Country against the Enemies Invasions.

Brussels, July 21. The Elector of *Brandenburg* being come to *Vise* on the *Meuse*, (near which place his Forces are now encamp'd) Prince *Wauwarte* went thither the 13th instant, to confer with his Electoral Highness, and returned this day to his Camp at *Digben*, from whence we are assured he will remove in 3 or 4 days, and march towards the Enemy, who lye still encamp'd near the *Embre*. Our Governour General will march at the same time, and advance towards the French Frontiers. We are told from *Liege*, That the Forces of that Country, to the number of 8000 Men, were marched by *Walbourg*, towards the River *Riker*, where they would be joyn'd by four Regiments from *Mastricht*.

Hague, July 25. On the 22d instant, Mr. *Harbord* arrived here from *England*, and the same Evening had Audience of the States General, (being accompanied by my Lord *Dursey*, Their Majesties Envoy Extraordinary,) to whom he represented, That he was Commanded by the Queen to let them know, how much Her Majesty was concerned at the Misfortune that had befallen their Squadron in the late Engagement; and at their not being Seconded as they ought to have been; which Matter Her Majesty had directed to be Examined into, in order to Recompence those that had done their Duty, and to punish such as should be found to have deserved it. That Her Majesty had given Orders for refitting the Dutch Ships that were disabled, at Her own Charge, and had Commanded, That all possible care should be taken of the Sick and Wounded Seamen; and that Rewards should be given to the Widows of those that were killed, behaving themselves bravely in the Fight, to encourage others to do well for the future. He told them also, That he was Commanded by the Queen to let them know, That Her Majesty had ordered 12 great Ships, 4 of 90 Guns, 4 of 70, and 4 of 64, to be forthwith fitted out; and that her Majesty hoped the States would likewise do their utmost to reinforce their Fleet in this conjuncture; And lastly, he acquainted them with His Majesties Happy Successes in *Ireland*.

The States received this Message with great satisfaction, and they have resolved to fit out immediately 13 Capital Ships, and 6 Frigats, and to lay an Embargo upon all Merchant Ships till they are Mann'd and ready to sail, which

which we are assured they will be within 10 days or a fortnight. They have likewise resolved to build 13 new Men of War against next Summer.

We have an account from Flanders that Prince *Maldick* was ready to march with 2000 Foot, and 8000 Horse; and that he had had a Conference with the Elector of *Bran-denburg*, who had promised to assist him with a Body of Horse, and to join him with his whole Army if it be thought necessary.

Edinburgh, July 13. We have an account from the North, that Major General *Mitcalfe* continued with 7000 Men at *Inverkeithing*, and will speedily have finished the Fortifications he is making there. That Colonel *Causton* with 500 Foot, and 200 Horse, had fallen down upon *Perthshire*, within 30 Miles of *Stirling*, with a design to plunder the Country; and that Colonel *Bishop* with the Earl of *Buchan*, and a party of 300 Men had made an Incursion into *Aber-deenshire*, to surprize some Houses in that Country, which the Master of *Forbes*, eldest Son to the Lord *Fer-bes*, having notice of, he marched towards them with Three Troops of Horse and Dragoons, upon whose appearance the Rebels fled; our men pursued them to the Hills, killing several, and taking the Earl of *Buchan*, and Captain *John Ramsay*, Brother to Col-onel *Ramsay*, and several others Prisoners.

From His Majesty's Camp at *Inchiquin*, July 14. His Majesty is now encamp'd about 22 Miles from *Dublin*, in the way to *Kilkenny*, where we shall be on *Thursday*, within 20 Miles of *Waterford*; which it's believed will be Surrender'd upon our appearing before it; His Majesty as he advances, settles the Sheriffs and Justices in the Counties, and many poor Papists come in for Protections. *Cavan* and *Slegg* are abandoned by the Enemy. *Arklone* holds out as yet, but Lieutenant General *Douglas* will be before that place on *Wednesday*, with 10 Regiments of Foot, and 4 of Horse. The late King *James* is certainly gone for *France* with the Lord *Powis*, and divers others. But we hear, that the Earl of *Tyrconnel* is retired towards *Limerick*, where he endeavours to draw together, their scatter'd Troops. Brigadier *Trelawney* remains at *Dublin*, (not which he is made Governor) with 5 Regiments of Foot, and one of Horse.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

WILLIAM R.

HAVING taken into Our Consideration the great Oppressions and Abuses committed by Our Enemies in this Our Kingdom of Ireland, by Coyn-ing and Making Current Brass Money of Copper or mixt Metal, and raising the Value thereof to an extravagant height, thereby to enable them to continue the War against Us, and to impoverish Our Loving Subjects in Our said Kingdom: We have therefore thought it necessary to put stop thereto, and to the end that such part of the said Copper or mixt Metal Money, which remains in the hands of Our said Subjects, may not be wholly lost, We have thought fit to reduce the former Value of the said Copper Money, to the Value or Standard of the like Copper Money formerly Current in this Our Kingdom, and accordingly We do hereby Will and Require all Our Subjects, within Our said Kingdom of Ireland, to take and receive all such Copper or mixt Metal Money, lately Coyn'd in the Mint erected in Our City of *Dublin*, at the several and respective Valuations following, and that the same do pass Current in Exchange of Money, and for all manner of Goods and Provisions whatsoever, and shall be received by all the Officers and Collectors of Our Customs, Excise, or other Branches of Our Revenue accordingly, viz.

The large Half-Crown of Copper Money, together with Crown Pieces of like Metal and Weight, lately Stamp'd, shall pass at One Penny Sterl.

The small Half-Crown of Copper, lately Stamp'd, shall pass at Three Farthings.

The large Copper Shilling shall pass at a Half-Penny Sterl. The small Shilling, lately Stamp'd, and Six-Pence, shall pass each at One Farthing.

And Our Will and Pleasure is, that all such Pewter Pence as have been lately Coyn'd in the said Mint, shall pass for Half-Pence, and all the Half-Pence of the like Metal, stamp'd in the said Mint, shall pass Current for Farthings.

Which several sorts of Coin shall be deemed as Current

Money at the Rates before-mentioned, in all Payments whatsoever within this Our Kingdom.
Given at Our Camp by *Dublin*, this Tenth Day of July, 1690. In the second Year of Our Reign.

Their Majesties having by Their Proclamation of the 25th Instant, Nominate certain Places to which all Seamen taken up by Virtue of the said Proclamation shall be sent, as to the 25th and upwards of Persons, who may be, or be subjected to be Seamen or Mariners; We hereby further Declare, for the greater ease of the Men to be taken up, and of their Conductors, That *Witch*, *Wells*, *Lynn*, *Botton*, *Scarbrough*, *Sunderland*, *Whitby*, *Southampton*, *Cowey*, *Pool*, *Weymouth*, *Lynn*, *Topsham*, *Dartmouth*, *Plymouth*, *Palmerston*, *Loose*, and *Fowey*, are also Places appointed Receipts of Seamen, and that the Collectors of the Customs in each of these Ports, at any of New-Castle, *Hull*, and *Great Yarmouth*, have Obedience to receive the said Seamen, and to pay forthwith to the Conductors the Imprest and Conduct Money assign'd upon that Service.
