Twin, July 2. The Duke of Savoy is marched at the had of his own Forces, and the fe that came to his Succour from the State of Milan, to Moncalier, where they are now incamped. Twelve pieces of great Cannon will be taken out of the Arfenal here to morrow, and fent to the Army, which will advance in three or 4 days towards Monteur Catinat, who has posted himself near a place called Ofina, within four Miles of Pignerol, expecting a Rendercement: But his Troops, besides the contiderable balls they have sufficient by the Vaudois, and those of Monday, do safer very much through the secrety of Forage and Provisions, and we doubt not but that our Forces as and Provisions, and we doubt not but that our Forces as they approach towards them will fireighten them yet more. The Prince Engene of Savay is arrived in the Camp, and has delivered to his Highness feveral Dispatches from the Emperor, assuring him at the same time, the 3000 German Horse, and 3000 Foot, are marching with all the speed they can to his Assistance. The first instant the Marquis de Rebenae Ambassador of France, was endusted from hence to Increa, where he will be kept all such time as we hear that our Ambassador at Paris is at liberty to return home. The new Levies go on very streetifully.

Milan, July 5. Our Governor the Count de Fuenfalida atton Friday last to Lumeline, to mark out a Campnear in place, whither the Troops of this State have already

begun to march from their feveral Quarters. The fime day 300 foot and Dragoons of the Garifin of Cofal ad-vanced between Verceil and Trin to raife Constitutions; upon notice whereof, a Detachement was fent from Verceil; who put the Enemy to flight, and another of our Parties coming in very opportunely to intercept their Retreat, most of the French were killed or taken Pribaers.

From the Imperia! Camp at Bruichal, July 12. The Count de Stirum (whom the Elector of Biviria fent lately to the Elector of \$ (xony) returned hither on the 6th intrant, and gave his Electronal Highnels an account, That the Saxon Troops were marching with all possible diligence to joyn the Imperial Army under his Command; and that they will be the 16th of this Month at farthest, at Heilbron. The Dauphin has fent 7 Regiments towards Savoy, to joyn Monsieur Carinat, and has reinforced the

Garilon of Friburg with 4000 Men.

Cologne, July 21. According to our last advices from the Palatinate the Elector of Saxony was expected the 16th. the Palatinate the Electron of Saxony was expected the 16th inflant with 18000 men in the Imperial Camp at Bruckful. The Imperialiths have taken the Fort lately built by the Frenchat Waghenfel near Philipphing. The Brandenburg, Forces are marched to the Menfe, a Campbeing marked out for them between Liege and Marsfirichs. Those of Munster and Paderburns will remain on this side to cover the Country against the Enemies Incurious.

The States received this Message with great satisfaction, and they have resolved to fit out immediately. 13 Capital Ships, and 6 Frigats, and to lay an Embargo upon all Merchant Ships till they are Mann'd and ready to sail, which
