PORT OF EXETER.

LIMITS OF PORT.

WE, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of
Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom
of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under
the authority of "The Customs Consolidation
Act, 1876," appoint Exeter to continue and be
a Port in that part of the United Kingdom called
England, and do hereby declare that the limits
of the said Port of Exeter shall commence at the
west bank of the River Char, in the county of
Dorset (being the western limit of the Port of
Weymouth), and shall extend thence in a westerly
and southerly direction along the coast of Dorset
and Devon to Langstone Point, in the county of
Devon, being the north-eastern limit of the Point
of Teignmouth, and as far up the River Exe as
the Bridge of the city of Exeter, and shall
include the Exeter Canal from the seaward
entrance thereof at the River Exe at Exeter,
together with the basin at the north-west end of
the said canal, and all bays, harbours, rivers,
streams, and creeks, within the said limits, and
shall extend seaward to a distance of three miles
from low water mark along the coast within the
aforesaid limits.

And We, the said Lords Commissioners of
Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby annul all
former limits of the Port of Exeter.
