## A PROCLAMATION.

MARIE R.

**T**HE King and Queens most Excellent Majesties taking into Their Princely Consideration, That the Holding the next Assizes for the several Counties of this Kingdom at the Days and Times first intended, might greatly obstruct the good Endeavours of Their Majesties Subjects, for the Common Defence of the Kingdom at this time of Invasion by the French, and desiring Graciously to Provide that Their good People may not suffer in their Private Affairs, whilst they are so unanimously Attending the Service and Safety of the Publick: Their Majesties therefore, by the Advice of Their Privy Council, having thought fit to Command Their Judges of the respective Circuits, to Appoint other more convenient Times for Holding the said Assizes; And in Obedience therunto, the Judges having Appointed the Times and Places of Holding the same in manner following; That it is to say,

It is therefore Their Majesties Pleasure, That all Their Loving Subjects be Discharged from Attendance at the Assizes, Sessions of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery, at any other Times then as herein before is particularly mentioned. And all and singular Mayors, Sheriff's, Bailiffs, Constables, Headboroughs, and all other Their Majesties Officers, Ministers and Subjects whatsoever whom it may concern, are required to take notice hereof, and govern themselves accordingly. Provided always, and Their Majesties are hereby Graciously pleased to Direct and Command; That no more or further Fees or Charges shall be paid by any of Their Majesties Subjects, for or by reason of the altering, Amending, Renewing or Sealing of any Writs or Records of Null prius, or other Process or Records, on occasion of this Proclamation.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Nineteenth day of July, 1690. In the Second Year of Our Reign.

Turin, July 8. The Duke of Savoy removed his Camp on the 6th Instant from Moncalier nearer to Montieur Catinat, and lyes now within 3 miles of him. Several French Defenders come daily into our Camp, and report, that Provisions are very scarce in the French Army, and that the Horse suffer very much for want of Forage. The Cavalry continue to do them a great deal of mischief, and have so closely block'd up 500 French, that had put themselves into the Fort Della Torre in the Valley of Lucerne, that they will not be able long to subsist there. The Enemy in the mean time have made several attempts to lay a Bridge over the Po, to open a Communication with Casal, but the Militia that are posted on the other side of that River, have hitherto hindered them from effecting their design. This morning Montieur Catinat sent a strong Detachment towards Carignan to post themselves near that place; whereupon the Duke of Savoy detached likewise some Troops from his Camp, who meeting with the Enemy, had a sharp Dispute with them, and at last forced them to retire with the loss of above 200 of their Men killed upon the place; On our side, we lost about 30, and the Count de St. Etienne Captain of Dragons, and the Count de Villeneuve, were wounded. Our Duke has sent Commissioners to receive on the Frontiers of this State, the 6000 Germans which the Emperor sends to his assistance.

Frankfort July 22. The Velt-Marschal Baron de Chantreaux arrived here yesterday. He is to command the Luxembourg Forces that are marching to join the Imperial Army. Part of the Saxons Troops are come to Hildesheim. The Landgrave of Hesse is daily expected here.

Cologne, July 25. The Imperial Army, according to our advices from the *Post-Ordre*, continues at *Bunfels*, expecting the conjunction of the 30000 Saxons, who make a Body of 17000 Men. The Luxembourg Troops, consisting of 6000, and 1000 of Hesse, which are about the same number, are to wait on their march towards the Rhine, to join the Elector of Brandenburg, or to act apart, as shall be found most expedient. The French are drawing together on the *Meuse*, and the Forces of Munster and Nassau are ordered to join together for the Security of this Country.

Brussels, July 26. The Elector of Brandenburg passed the *Meuse* on the 22d Instant on a Bridge of Boats between *Vilpe* and *Nroegne*, and is now encamped with his Army, consisting of 18000 Men, at *Tongren*, 4 days march from hence. The Princes of *Loche* have joynea Prince *Waldack*, whose Camp is still at *Digrem*, between this City and *Witford*. The Duke of Luxembourg is encamped at *Querzheim*, between *Mons* and *Valenciennes*; it's said, he has not at present with him above 18000 Men, having lately sent some of his Achiments towards *Germany*, but that the Marquis *d'Archer*, who is posted with 4000 Foot and 1600 Horse near *Loche*, has Orders to join him. The Marschal *d'Harmer* is return'd to *Liège*, but the Forces that were lately under his command, continue to observe our Governour-General the Marquis *de Godesauger*, who lyes encamped with 18000 Men near *Guv*.

Brussels, July 26. In pursuance of the Measures which our Governour-General and Prince *Waldack* have concerted with the Elector of Brandenburg, their several Armies will march to be reassembled, on Monday next, towards the French Territories; and in the mean time, great quantities of Corn have been sent to *Mons*, *Querzheim*, and *Aeth*, to make Bread for them. The Duke of Luxembourg continues at *Querzheim*, but it's believed he will put himself behind the River *Schelde*, between *Tournay* and *Valenciennes*.

Hague, July 28. The Men of War which the States have ordered to reinforce their Squadron in *England*, will be all at Sea in few days. Four great Ships, and 9 Brigades, lye ready to sail at *Goree*, and 6 Capital Men of War, fitted out by the Admiralty at *Amsterdam*, have already paid the *Passage*. Prince *Waldack* has now with him 26000 Men effective, and a good Train of Artillery. The Spanish Forces, with their *Artillerie*, make 12000. The Elector of Brandenburg has pulled the *Meuse* with 18000. The Troops of *Loche* are 6000 old Souldiers. And we are assured, that their several Bodies will march in few days towards the French Frontiers, keeping at such distances, as that they may be ready to join, or second each other as there shall be occasion. Monsieur *de Foy*, Governour of *Brussels*, came hither yesterday, to communicate some Matters to the States from the Governour of the *Spanish Netherlands*. All the Letters from *Paris* speak of the arrival of the late King *James* at *Brussels* on the 24th of the last Month, having landed the 21st Somewhere on the Coast of *Normandy*.

From His Majesties Camp at *Kells*, July 17. On the 15th Instant we encamped at *Carle-Jerome*, yesterday we marched to *Greenough*; and this day we came higher, making the Road to *Bathenny*; for that it was 5 miles out of the way, and from hence we shall march to *Waterford*, where we hear the French have 5 Regiments commanded by *Col. Lery*; the Earl of *York*, who now styles himself Lord Lieutenant of *Ireland*, having called the Earl of *Down* a Governour of that Town, upon some mistrust he had of him, to *Limerick*, near which place he is gathering what Troops he can together. Colonel *Eppinger* has taken possession of *Wexford*, and from thence marches to *Waterford*; which we hope in 3 or 4 days to be likewise Master of. We expect every hour to hear, that Lieutenant-General *Douglas* is come to the *Isle of Rhé*. We had an account yesterday, that the late King *James*, who sailed on the 24th from *Waterford*, was afterwards put into *Cork*; and thence went out again with several French Ships for *France*.

Scarborough, July 18. This day appeared off of this Port 12 Sailed Men of War, who it's believed are gone for *Holland*.

Brussels, July 27. On the 18th Instant a Dutch Privateer brought into this Port a French Prize. She was bound from *France* to *London*, laden with Wine and Brandy, but at her arrival there, found a great many French and Irish Officers making all the hast they could to get away; She took on Board divers Passengers, and came out with 7 Ships more under Convey of a French Privateer; but meeting the aforementioned Dutch Captn, after two hours dispute, the French Man bore away, and this Vessel, next day, as well as the rest, was taken. On Friday last Their Majesties Ship the *St. Albans*, Captn *Fitz-Patrick* Commander, came up with a French Man of War of 36

Guns, and 200 Men, about 10 Leagues to the Westward of the *Renn-head*, and took her, after a Fight of 4 hours, in which the French had 40 Men killed and wounded, and the Ship was so shattered, that the w was towed in; the *St. Albans* had but 4 Men killed, and 7 wounded. There were on Board the French Ship 50 Souldiers, commanded by a Captn and 2 Lieutenants.

Wexford, July 21. There now appears about 5 Leagues to the South-East of *Portland*, a Fleet of about 70 Sail, which we judge to be the French. The Weather being thick, we cannot fully discover them, but we perceive they make to the Westward.

Exton, July 22. We have received an account, that about 6 this morning the French Gallies, 12 or 13 in number, anchored in *Trow*, the whole Fleet being 5 Leagues East from *Trow*, standing in N.W.

Their Majesties having by Their Proclamation of the 5th Instant, Nominated certain Places to which all Seamen, taken up by Virtue of the said Proclamation, shall be sent, as also all Loose and Unknown Persons, who may justly be suspected to be Seamen, or Watermen; Do hereby further Declare, for the greater Ease of the said so taken up, and of their Conventors, That Ipswich, Wells, Lynn, Boston, Scarborough, Sunderland, Whitby, Southampton, Cowes, Poole, Weymouth, Lyme, Poptham, Dartmouth, Plymouth, Looe, and Exeter, are also Places appointed for Receipt of Seamen, and that the Collectors of the Customs in each of these Ports, as also of Newcastle, Hull, and Great Yarmouth, shall be obliged to receive the said Seamen, and to pay forthwith to the Conventors the Imprest and Conduct Money directed upon that Service.

The Commissioners appointed by Their Majesties for the Distribution of the Money Collected for the Relief of the Poor Protestants of Ireland, Do hereby certify, that all Persons concerned in the Receipt of any Money upon their account, that they do with all possible speed remit the same unto the Chamber of London; forasmuch as there are many Thousands of the said Poor Protestants that would forthwith repair to their own Country, where they would be very useful, but cannot for want of a little Money to carry them to the Water side, and hereby you will prevent their being any further burthen to his Kingdom.
