

*Francfort July 22.* The Velt-Marechal Baron de Chastellier arrived here yesterday; He is to command all the Luxembourg Forces that are marching to join the Imperial Army. Part of the Saxon Troops are come to Huzerow. The Landgrave of Hesse is daily expected here.

*Cologne, July 23.* The Imperial Army, according to our advices from the *Praetoriate*, continues at *Buerbach*, expecting the conjunction of the Saxon forces, who make a body of 15000 men. The Luxembourg Troops, consisting of 6000, and those of Hesse, which are about the same number, are all w<sup>t</sup>e on their march towards the Rhine, to join the Elector of Brandenburg, or to act apart, as shall be required most expedient. The French are drawing together on the *Myde*. And the forces of *Munster* and *Rhenanus* are ordered to join together for the security of this Country.

*Berl<sup>le</sup>, July 26.* The Elector of Brandenburg passed the *Moselle* on the 22d instant on a Bridge of Boats between *Vitry* and *Nesle*, and is now encamped with his Army, consisting of 18000 Men, at *Tongren*, 4 days march from hence. The Forces of *Liege* have joined Prince *Waldkirch*, whose Camp is still at *Dijon*, between this City and *Beaune*. The Duke of *Luxembourg* is encamped at *Quertruy*, between *Mons* and *Valenciennes*; it's said, he has not at present with him above 18000 Men, having lately sent some like *schneiders* towards *Germany*, but that the Marquis d' *Soubise*, who is posted with 4000 foot and 1600 Horse near *Lens*, has Orders to join him. The Marshal d' *Hauterive* is return'd to *L<sup>is</sup>*, but the Forces that were hitherto under his command, continue to observe our Governor-General the Marquis d' *Gelding*, who lies encamped with 12000 Men near *Givet*.

*Berl<sup>le</sup>, July 26.* In pursuance of the Measures which our Governor-General and Prince *Waldkirch* have concerted with the Elector of Brandenburg, their several Armies will march, as we are assured, on Monday next, towards the French Territories; and in the mean time, great quantities of Corn have been sent to *Maubeuge*, *Avesnes*, and *Ath*, to make Bread for them. The Duke of Luxembourg continues at *Quertruy*, but it's believed he will post himself behind the River *Scheldt*, between *Tournay* and *Valenciennes*.

*Hague, July 28.* The Men of War which the States have ordered to reinforce their Squadron in *Engeland*, will be all at Sea in few days. Four great Ships, and 9 Frigates, lie ready to sail at *Groningen*, and 5 Capital Men of War, fitted out by the Admiralty at *Amsterdam*, have already packed the *Pampus*. Prince *Waldkirch* has now with him 26000 Men effective, and a good Train of Artillery. The Spanish Forces, with those of *Hanover*, make 18000. The Elector of Brandenburg has posted the *Moselle* with 18000. The Troops of *Liege* are 6000 old Soldiers. And we are assured, that their several Bodies will march in few days towards the French frontiers, keeping at such distances, as that they may be ready to join, or second each other as there shall be occasion. M. *de Foy*, Governor of *Breda*, came hither yesterday, to communicate some Matters to the States from the Governor of the Spanish Netherlands. All the Letters from Paris speak of the arrival of the late King *James* at *Yverdon* on the 24<sup>th</sup> of the last Month, having landed the 21<sup>st</sup> somewhere on the Coast of Normandy.

*From His Majesties Camp at Kels, July 17.* On the 15<sup>th</sup> instant we encamped at *Capelle-Termonde*, yesterday we march'd to *Ghent*, and this day we came hither, not taking the Road to *Bethune*, for that it was 5 miles out of the way; and from hence we shall march to *Waterford*, where we'll see the French have 3 Regiments commanded by Col. *L'Estrange*, the Earl of *Fitzgerald*, who now styles himself Lord Lieutenant of *Ireland*, having called the Earl of *Leinster*, Governor of that Crown, upon some misfortune he had or him, to *Limerick*, near which place he is gathering what Troops he can together. Col. *Eppinger* has taken possession of *Waterford*, and from thence marches to *Waterford*; which we hope in 3 or 4 days to be likewise Master of. We expect every hour to hear, that Lieutenant General *Douglas* is come into *Waterford*. We had an encounter yesterday, that the late King *James*, who failed on the 2d in *Waterford*, was afterwards put into *Cork*; and thence went out again with several French Ships for *France*.

*Scarborough, July 18.* This day appeared off of this Port 12 Sardinian Men of War, who it's believed are gone for *Ireland*.

*Parma, July 27.* On the 18<sup>th</sup> instant a Dutch Privateer brought into this Port a French Prize. She was bound from *France* to *Kinsale*, laden with Wine and Brandy, but at her arrival there, found a great many French and Irish Officers making all the haste they could to get away; She took on Board divers Passengers, and came out with 7 Ships, more under Convoy of a French Privateer, but meeting the aforementioned Dutch Captain, after two hours capture, the French ship bore away, and this Vessel, not fitting so well to the rest, was taken. On Friday last Their Majesties Ship the *St. Albans*, Captain *Fitz-Patrick* Commander, came up with a French Man of War of 36

Guns, and 200 Men, about 10 Leagues to the Westward of the *Ram-head*, and took her, after a Fight of 4 hours, in which the French had 40 Men killed and wounded, and the Ship was so shattered, that she was towed in; the *St. Albans* had but 4 Men killed, and 7 wounded. There were on Board the French Ship 50 fusiliers, commanded by a Captain and 2 Lieutenants.

*Weymouth, July 21.* There now appears about 5 Leagues to the South-East of *Portland*, a fleet of about 70 Ships, which we judge to be the French. The Weather being thick, we cannot fully discover them, but we perceive they make to the Westward.

*Exon, July 22.* We have received an account, that about 6 this morning the French Galleys, 12 or 13 in number, anchored in *Torbay*, the whole Fleet being 3 Leagues E.S.E. from *Torquay*, standing in N.W.
