WHEREAS by the Medical Act, 1886, it is provided (amongst other things) that Her Majesty may from time to time by Order in Council declare that the second part of the said Act shall be deemed, on and after a day to be named in such Order, to apply to any British possession which in Her Majesty's opinion affords to the medical practitioners of the United Kingdom such privileges of practising in the said British possession as to Her Majesty may seem just, and from and after the day named in such Order in Council, such British possession to which the said Act applies, within the meaning of the second part thereof, and that until such Order in Council has been made in respect of any British possession the said second part of the said Act shall not be deemed to apply to any such possession.

And whereas Ceylon is a British possession within the meaning of the said Act, and affords, in Her Majesty's opinion, to the registered medical practitioners of the United Kingdom such privileges of practising in Ceylon as to Her Majesty seems just.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty doth hereby, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, order, direct, and declare that, on and after the first day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, the second part of the Medical Act, 1886, shall be deemed to apply to Ceylon.

W HEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehend-

ing seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to a subject of such power when within Her Majesty's dominions shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of the Republic of Paraguay will be given under a Treaty between the Governments of Great Britain and Paraguay signed at Assumption on the 16th October 1884.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that, from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves (and not being British subjects), who desert from merchant ships belonging to the Republic of Paraguay within Her Majesty's dominions shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships; provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect:

And the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Secretary of State for India in Council, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the Explosives Act 1875

"explosive" is defined to mean gunpowder, nitro-glycerine, dynamite, gun-cotton,
blasting powders, fulminate of mercury or of other
metals, coloured fires, and every other substance
whether similar to those above-mentioned or not,
used or manufactured with a view to produce a

practical effect by explosion, or a pyrotechnic effect, and to include, amongst other things, every adaption or preparation of an explosive as above

And whereas it is enacted by the said Act that Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, declare that any substance which appears to Her Majesty to be specially dangerous to life or property by reason either of its explosive properties, or of any process in the manufacture thereof being liable to explosion shall be deemed to be an explosive within the meaning of the said Act, and the provisions of the said Act (subject to such exceptions, limitations and restrictions as may be specified in the Order) shall accordingly extend to any such substance in like manner as if it were included in the term "explosive" in the said Act.

And whereas when picric acid, and picrates and mixtures of picric acid with other substances are manufactured or used with a view to producing a practical effect by explosion, or a pyrotechnic effect, such picric acid, picrates, and mixtures fall within the definition of "explosive" above set forth, and are subject to the provisions of the said

And whereas such picric acid, picrates and mixtures when manufactured or used for any other purpose than to produce a practical effect by explosion, or a pyrotechnic effect, do not fall within the said definition of "explosive."

And whereas it appears to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, that picric acid, picrates and mixtures of picric acid with certain other substances are, under certain conditions, specially dangerous to life and property by reason of their explosive properties.

Now therefore Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and declare, and be it ordered and declared as

(1.) Picric acid when in process of manufacture cr storage shall (for whatever purpose used or manufactured) be deemed to be an explosive within the meaning of the said Act for all the purposes of the said Act, subject to the exceptions following:

(a.) Picric acid when wholly in solution shall be exempt from being deemed to be an explosive within the said Act; and

(b.) Picric acid which does not fall within the exemption (a) above set forth, but which is being manufactured or stored in a factory, building or place exclusively appropriated to the manufacture or storage of picric acid, and in such manner as effectually to prevent any picric acid from coming into contact (whether under the action of fire, or otherwise) with any basic metallic oxide or oxidising agent, or other substance capable of forming with picric acid an explosive mixture or explosive compound, or with any detonator or other article capable of exploding pieric acid, or, with any fire or light capable of igniting picric acid, shall be exempt from being deemed to be an explosive within the said Act.

(2.) Picrates and mixtures of picric acid with any basic metallic oxide, or any oxydising agent, or with any other substance capable of forming with picric acid an explosive mixture, or an explosive compound (for whatever purpose used or manufactured) shall be deemed to be an explosive, within the meaning of the said Act, for all the purposes of the said Act unless such picrates or mixtures be wholly in solution.

THEREAS by "The Thames Conservancy Act, 1857," it is enacted that the Conservators of the River Thames shall have power and authority, from time to time, to make Byelaws for the regulation, management, and improvement of the River Thames and the navigation thereof, in the manner thereby provided, and to impose penalties, not exceeding five pounds, for the breach or non-performance of such Bye-

And whereas by the thirty-first section of "The Thames Conservancy Act, 1864," it is enacted that Bye-laws made under the authority of either of the said recited Acts shall not have any force unless and until they are allowed by

Order of Her Majesty in Council:

And whereas the said Conservators have, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the said recited Acts, made and submitted for the allowance of Her Majesty in Council certain rules and Bye-laws for the regulation, management, and improvement of the navigation of the River Thames, and amongst others certain Bye-laws which have been allowed by Order in Council dated the eighteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty:

And whereas it has been deemed expedient by the said Conservators to repeal in part the said last-mentioned Bye-laws, and to make new Byelaws in lieu of the portions so repealed in the manner set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

And whereas the said new Bye-laws have been duly published in accordance with the said recited Acts, and it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said new Bye-laws are reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by "The Thames Conservancy Act, 1864," and of every other power enabling Her in that behalf, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to allow the said Bye-laws. C. L. Peel.

SCHEDULE referred to in the above Order. BYE-LAWS for the Amendment of the Bye-laws for the Regulation, Management, and Improvement of the Navigation of the River Thames, allowed by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council on the 18th day of March, 1880.

THE Conservators of the River Thames in exercise of the power and authority vested in them by the Thames Acts, 1857 to 1883, and of every other authority them thereunto in anywise enabling, do order and direct as follows, that is to

From and after the day when these Bye-laws shall be allowed by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council, Bye-laws 17, 18, and 19 of the Bye-laws for the regulation management and improvement of the navigation of the River Thames allowed by Her Majesty in Council on the 18th day of March 1880 including the words "steam whistle signals" immediately preceding such Bye-law 17 shall be and the same are hereby repealed and the said Bye-laws of the 18th day of March 1880 shall have effect and be construed as if the following Bye-laws had been inserted therein in lieu of such repealed Byelaws, and the following Bye-laws shall have effect and be construed accordingly and shall be taken to have been numbered as the same are hereafter numbered and the words "Bye-laws and Rules "Regulating the Navigation of the River between "Yantlet Creek and a line drawn from Blackwall "Point to Bow Creek" in the said Bye-laws of the 18th day of March 1880 shall be thereafter read as if the same immediately preceded the words "steering and sailing rules" leading to Bye-law 20 and the following Bye-laws shall apply to the River Thames from Yantlet Creek to Teddington.

Steam-Whistle Signals.

17. When two steam vessels are in sight of one another and are approaching with risk of collision the following steam signals shall be intimations of the course they intend to take.

(a.) One short blast of the steam-whistle of about three seconds' duration to mean, "I am directing my course to starboard and intend to pass you port side to port side." The use of this signal shall be optional.

(b.) Two short blasts of the steam-whistle each of about three seconds' duration to mean "I am directing my course to port and intend "to pass you starboard side to starboard "side." The latter signal shall not be used in the case provided by Rule 22 where that rule can be obeyed; but it shall be compulsory to use this signal when a departure from that rule is necessary to avoid immediate

(c.) Three short blasts of a steam-whistle each of about three seconds' duration shall mean

"I am reversing my engines."

18. When a steam vessel is turning round or for any reason is not under command and cannot get out of the way of an approaching vessel, or when it is unsafe or impracticable for a steam vessel to keep out of the way of a sailing vessel she shall signify the same by four or more blasts of the steam-whistle in rapid succession, the blasts to be of about three seconds' duration.

19. The signals by whistle mentioned in the preceding rules shall not be used on any occasion or for any purpose except those mentioned in the rules; and no other signal by whistle shall be made by any steam vessel unless it be by a prolonged blast of not less than five seconds' duration.

19a. Vessels coming out of dock shall signify the same by a prolonged blast of the steamwhistle of not less than five seconds' duration and in cases where a vessel is not under steam the tug boat in attendance shall make the same signal and no other steam-whistle signal shall be made by vessels coming out of dock.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventeenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, in the words following, that is to say :-

England in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, of the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and seven, of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew situate within the limits of the district parish of Leytonstone in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albaus.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans and with the consent of the Reverend William James Bettison Clerk in Holy Orders, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said district parish of Leytonstone (testified by their having signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said district parish of Leytonstone which is described in the schedule hereunder written all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Andrew situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Leytonstone.

"And with the like consent of the said Thomas Legh, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans, and of the said William James Bettison (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Andrew situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew,

Leytonstone being :-

"All that part of the district parish of Leytonstone in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans, wherein the present incumbent of such district parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls, and which is bounded upon the east by the parish of Wanstead and upon the north-west and upon the west by the parish of Leyton, both in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-west and upon the south-east at is to say:—

We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for boundary which divides the said parish of Leyton

from the district parish of Leytonstone aforesaid | at the point where Queen's-road is crossed by the old course of Philli Brook, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said Queen's-road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Phillibrook-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of fifty yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the north-western end of the wall forming the south-western boundary of the house and garden known as Ash Villa, and extending thence southeastward for a distance of three chains or thereabouts along the same wall to its south-eastern end on the north-western side of the line of the Great Eastern Railway and continuing thence still south-eastward and in a straight line to a point in the middle of the said line of railway, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the same line of railway for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said district parish of Leytonstone from the parish of Wanstead aforesaid.

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the ninetcenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the seventeenth day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Stephen situate at Upton Park in the parish of East Ham in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of East Ham, of the parish of West Ham on the said county and diocese and of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Saint Mary Plaistow in the same county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes and of such new parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of East Ham, of the said parish of West Ham, and of the said new parish of Saint Mary Plaistow should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Stephen situate at Upton Park as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Albans, as such Bishop, with the consent of the Principal and Scholars of the King's Hall and College of Brasenose in the University of Oxford as the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of East Ham, with the consent of the Right Honourable William Henry Smith, the First Lord of Your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of Your Majesty as the patron in right of the Crown, of the vicarage of the said parish of West Ham, and with the consent of the Reverend Thomas Scott Clerk in Holy Orders the vicar or incumbent of the last - mentioned vicarage and as such vicar or incumbent, the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Mary Plaistow (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of East Ham and of the said parish of West Ham, and of the said new parish of Saint Mary Plaistow which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Stephen situate at Upton Park as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Stephen, Upton Park.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Stephen, Upton Park, being: -

"All those several contiguous portions of the parish of East Ham, of the parish of West Ham, and of the new parish (sometime chapelry district) of Saint Mary Plaistow all in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans, wherein the present incumbents of such parishes and of such new parish still respectively possess the exclusive cure of souls, all which said contiguous portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of East Ham from the new parish of Saint Andrew Plaistow in the county and diocese aforesaid at the junction of Green-street with the Barking-road and extending thence eastward along the middle of the lastnamed road for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction with the public footpath which leads into Wakefield-street, and extending thence northward along the middle of the said public footpath for a distance of eleven and a half

chains or thereabouts to its junction with Wakeaforesaid and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with Katharine-road, and extending thence first northward and then north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty chains or thereabouts thereby passing over the line of the London Tilbury and Southend Railway to the junction of the same road with Red Post-lane and with the road called or known as Plashet-grove and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eleven and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Shrewsbury-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts to a point at present north-western end of the same road, upon the boundary which divides the said parish of East Ham from the district chapelry of All Saints Forest Gate in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence generally south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of half a mile or thereabouts to its junction in Gipsey-lane with the boundary which divides the said parish of East Ham from the new parish of Forest Gate in the county and diocese aforesaid and extending thence southward along the lastmentioned boundary for a distance of two chains or thereabouts, thereby following the middle of Gipsey-lane aforesaid, to the junction of the said last-mentioned boundary with the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the parish of West Ham aforesaid and extending thence westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts thereby passing between Saint George's-terrace and Oakdale-road and crossing Saint George's-avenue to a point in the middle of Bilton-road and extending thence southward along the middle of the lastnamed road for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Elmhurst-road and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of two : chains or thereabouts to its junction with Stukeleyroad and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of · fourteen chains or thereabouts to a point at its igunction with Manor-road, upon the boundary which divides the said parish of West Ham from the new parish of Saint Mary Plaistow aforesaid and continuing thence still in precisely the same direction, that is to say southward and in a straight line for a distance of seventeen and a half chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the line of the London Tilbury and Southend Railway aforesaid and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the northern end of the wall or fence which divides the house and premises known as No. 313 Queen's-road, from the house and premises known as 315 Queen's-road and extending thence southward to and along the said wall or fence for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its southern end on the northern side of Queen's-road aforesaid at or near to the junction of that road with Saint Mary's-road and extending thence first southward to, and then southward and south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Western-road, and extending thence southward along the middle of the lastnamed road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its intersection by the public footpath which leads from Plaistow into Green-street

aforesaid and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned public footpath for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to a point at its junction with Green-street aforesaid near to the building known as 'Anne Boleyn's Tower," upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary Plaistow from the parish of East Ham aforesaid and extending thence southward along the last - mentioned boundary for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts thereby following the course of Green-street aforesaid to the junction of the same boundary with the boundary which divides the said parish of East Ham from the new parish of Saint Andrew Plaistow as aforesaid and continuing thence still southward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of six chains or thereabouts thereby still following the course of Greenstreet aforesaid, to the first-described point at the junction of Green-street with the Barking-road as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocess of Saint Albans.

THE Board of Trade have received from the Austro-Hungarian Consul-General in London the following translation of a Notification from the Maritime Government of Trieste, respecting arrivals from Malta:--

By order of the Minister of Commerce, as arranged by agreement with the Royal Hungarian Minister of Commerce, in the following Telegram, dated to-day, No. 48390, the Imperial-Royal Marine Government decrees :-

That vessels arriving from the Island of Malta will be subjected for the future in Austrian ports to a medical visit and disinfection, when they have had a clean voyage and arrive under normal circumstances. But if this is not the case, the facts must be laid before the Imperial-Royal Marine Governor, who will take such steps as he thinks fit.

The present order is applied to those vessels which had to undergo the reserve of observation of six days in consequence of the circular of the 8th August (No. 7311) of this year, which is hereby rescinded.

WHEREAS by an Order made under "The Bankruptcy Act, 1869," on the 1st day of January, 1870, by the Right Honourable William Page, Baron Hatherley, as the then Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the County Courts of Carnarvonshire, holden at Pwllheli and Portmadoc, and the County Court of Denbighshire, holden at Llanwrst, were excluded from having jurisdiction in bankruptcy, and their districts were for the purposes of such jurisdiction attached to the County Court of Carnarvonshire, holden at Bangor.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by an Order in Council of the 14th day of February, 1883, to order that from 31st day of March, 1883, the County Court of Carnarvenshire, holden at Portmadoc, should be holden at Blaenau Festiniog as well as at Portmadoc.

And whereas it appears expedient to the Lord Chancellor that the County Court of Carnarvonshire, holden at Portmadoc and Blaenau Festiniog. should no longer be excluded from having jurisdiction in bankruptcy, and that the districts of the County Court of Carnarvonshire, holden at Pwllheli and Portmadoc and Blaenau Festiniog, and of the County Court of Denbighshire, holden at Llanwrst, shall no longer be attached for bankruptcy purposes to the County Court of

Carnarvonshire, holden at Bangor.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Hardinge Stanley, Baron Halsbury, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, do, by virtue of the powers vested in me by the Bankruptcy Act, 1883, and of all other powers vested in me, hereby revoke and alter the Order made on the 1st day of January, 1870, so far as the said Order excludes the said County Court of Carnarvonshire, holden at Portmadoc, from having jurisdiction in bankruptcy; and so far as the said Order attaches its district, and the district of the County Court of Carnarvonshire, holden at Pwllheli, and the district of the County Court of Denbighshire, holden at Llanwrst, for the purposes of bankruptcy, to the County Court of Carnarvonshire, holden at Bangor.

And I do further order that the districts of the County Court of Carnarvonshire, holden at Pwllheli, and of the County Court of Denbighshire, holden at Llanwrst, shall be attached for the purposes of bankruptcy to the County Court of Carnarvonshire, holden at Portmadoc and Blaenau Festiniog, which latter County Court so holden at Portmadoc and Blaenau Festiniog, shall have jurisdiction in bankruptcy, as provided by "The Bankruptcy Act, 1883," so far as regards any proceedings in bankruptcy which shall hereafter be commenced in the said Court.

RULES AND REGULATIONS made in the Month of December, 1887, by the Gunmakers' Company and the Guardians of the Birmingham Proof House, under Authority of the Gun Barrel Proof Act, 1868:—

WHEREAS in and by Section 117 of the Gun Barrel Proof Act, 1868, the Gunmakers' Company and the Guardians of the Birmingham Proof House, in such Act and hereinafter referred to as "the Two Companies," are empowered, should they deem the Proof or the Rules, Regulations, and Scales stated in Schedule "B" to the said Act annexed, or any of them respectively, insufficient or inapplicable or unsuitable, on application to and with the approval of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department to repeal or alter all or any of the rules and regulations, and all or any part of the scales respectively from time to time in force under the said Act for the proof of small arms or of any classes of small arms, and to make, repeal, and alter any new rules and regulations, and any new scales in that behalf.

And whereas the rules, regulations, and scales now in force under the said Act are set forth in Schedule "B" and Schedule "C" respectively to the said Act, and also in certain rules and regulations relating to Choke-bored barrels made in the month of July, 1875, and which were approved by Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the War Department on the 11th October, 1875. And whereas since the passing of the said Act certain improvements have been made in small arms, and certain new explosives have been invented to be used in small arms, to which the said rules, regulations, and scales at present in force under Schedule "B" to the said Act are insufficient, inapplicable, or unsuitable.

Now, therefore, the two Companies, with the approval of the Right Honourable Edward Stanlinge, M.P., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department, do hereby repeal the rules and regulations and scales applicable to the Proof of Small Arms contained in Schedule "B" to the said Act, and the before-mentioned rules and regulations made in the month of July, 1875, and in lieu thereof do make the following rules, regulations, and scales, that is to say:—

### SCHEDULE B.

CLASSIFICATION OF SMALL ARMS.

1. First Class.—Comprising single barrelled military arms of smooth bore, not being breechloaders or revolvers.

2. Second Class.—Comprising double barrelled military arms of smooth bore, and rifled arms of every description, except express rifles, and arms of the Eighth Class, whether of one or more

barrels, or constructed of plain or twisted iron, not being revolvers.

3. Third Class.—Comprising every descrip-" Danish," tion of single barrelled Birding, "Danish," "Dutch," "Carolina," and "Spanish" arms, not being breech loaders or revolvers.

4. Fourth Class .- Comprising every description of double barrelled fowling-pieces for firing small shot, and breech-loading small arms of every description and system, not being rifles or revolver, or Choke-bored.

5. Fifth Class.—Comprising revolving small

arms of every description and system.

6. Sixth Class.—Comprising all small arms, except those comprised in the Eighth Class, having one or more barrells Choke-bored, i.e., barrels whereof the diameter of the bore at the muzzle is less than the diameter of the bore at some point behind the muzzle other than the chamber or recess which contains the charge.

7. Seventh Class.—Comprising express rifles, i.e., rifles intended to be fired with a larger charge of powder than ordinary rifles, and which must be so declared in writing when sent for

definitive proof.

8. Eighth Class.—Comprising Choke-bored barrels having all or a portion of the smaller diameter of their bore rifled.

#### RULE OF PROOF.

9. The Gunpowder used shall be of strength equal to Waltham Abbey "R.F.G2," but of a Mixed Grain to pass through Sieves of No. 27 Wire Gauge, varying between 17 and 36 meshes to a lineal inch, and no change shall be made therein without the consent of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for War.

10. Barrels for arms of any class shall, at the request in writing of any person or persons sending the same for Definitive Proof, be proved with "Schultze's," or "E.C." Powder, or any particular description of Gunpowder which may be specified by the sender, after and in addition to the ordinary proof. The service charge of such powders shall be determined by the two Proof Companies respectively, from time to time, and the quantity of the said powders to be used in proof shall be such as the two Companies shall decide to give a strain exceeding that of the service charge, equivalent to the excess of strain exerted by the quantities of proof powder in the scales to these rules over the service charge of the same. The service charge of such powders shall be marked on the barrels. If any new powders shall come into use the same regulations as the above shall apply thereto. The several powders used in proof shall at all times be open to the inspection of any officer authorized for the purpose by the Secretary for War, who may take samples of the same for examination or trial without notice.

- 11. The Bullets used shall be of lead, of the specific gravity 11.352, and of the size and weight prescribed by the respective Scales for Proof. The bullets, except those used for rifled arms, shall be spherical, cylindrical, or conical in shape, and for rifled arms they shall be cylindrical and flat-ended. For arms of the Eighth Class they shall be conical, and of a diameter not more than .005 of an inch less than the muzzle diameter of the barrel.
- 12. For the Definitive Proof of all shot barrels, except for arms of the Eighth Class, shot shall be used instead of bullets.
- 13. The Shot used shall be of lead, and of the size and description known in the Gun Trade as "Soft Shot," Size No. 6. No. 25772.

14. The Wads to be used shall be of solid felt, and shall not exceed in thickness one diameter of the bore, one wad to be placed over the powder and another over the bullet.

15. The charges of powder and lead for Provisional Proof of all arms shall be according to such scale to these rules as may be applicable. thereto respectively. The charges for Definitive Proof, except for arms comprised in Rule 16, shall be according to No. 3 Scale to these Rules.

16. Barrels for rifled arms of the Second Class. and for arms of the Fourth, Sixth, and Seventh Classes, shall be Definitively Proved with double the quantity of powder and one and one-third the weight of lead of the service charges set forth in the respective scales to these rules. Barrels for arms of the Eighth Class shall be Definitively Proved with double the quantity of powder and one and one-half the weight of lead of such service charges.

17. For all military arms manufactured for the British Government, the Scales of Proof shall be the same as used by Her Majesty's War

Department from time to time.

18. Barrels for breech-loading arms of the Fourth Class, and for arms of the Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Classes, shall be Proved Provisionally and Definitively. Barrels for arms of the Second Class, and muzzle-loading arms of the Fourth Class, shall be Proved Provisionally and Definitively, or on the request in writing of the person or persons sending the barrels for proof shall be proved once only, in which case such barrels shall be sent in the state for Definitive Proof, but shall be proved according to the scale for Provisional Proof, and shall be marked with a special mark denoting that such barrels have been proved in the Definitive State according to the scale for Provisional Proof. Barrels for arms of the First and Third Classes shall be proved once Definitively; but the scale used for proving such barrels for arms of the Third Class as have the diameter of the bore in every part one inch and a quarter or upwards shall be the Provisional Scale.

19. Nevertheless, it shall be sufficient from time to time to prove all breech-loading military barrels in the same manner as breech-loading military barrels made for the use of Her Majesty's Forces, and with the same weight of gunpowder as is now used, or from time to time shall hereafter be used, in the proof of similar barrels at the Government Factories.

20. As to any military barrel made for the use of Her Majesty's Forces, or for the late Honourable East India Company, which has ceased to belong to Her Majesty, but which bears, in addition to a Proof Mark authorized by Her Majesty's War Department, the letter "O" struck (prior to such cesser) over or upon the broad arrow or some part thereof by the said War Department, it shall, if it be a rifled barrel, be proved with Definitive Proof, or if it be a smooth-bore barrel with half the charge of powder, but with the same weight of bullet which will be applicable to the proof thereof if such barrel were an unproved barrel under this Act, and after either such proof, such barrel shall be marked as Proved Definitively; and as to any military barrel made for the use of Her Majesty's forces, or for the late Honourable East India Company, which has ceased to belong to Her Majesty, and which does not bear in addition to a proof mark authorized by Her Majesty's War Department the letter "O," or the letter "S" struck (prior to such cesser) over or upon the broad arrow or some part thereof by that Department, it shall (whether it shall or

shall not bear a proof mark authorized by that Department) be liable to proof as an unproved barrel according to its classification under this Act.

21. All breech-loading shot barrels of 10-bore or less, having chambers of three inches or longer, shall be so declared in writing by the sender, and be proved with one-sixth more powder than the

ordinary Definitive Proof Charge.

22. Barrels for arms of the Fourth Class, of larger gauge than four, and for which no service charge is laid down in the Scale, shall have the service charge declared in writing by the person or persons sending the same for proof, and be proved with a charge bearing the same proportion to such service charge as defined by Rule 16.

23. A barrel of any description to which the scales of proof are inapplicable or unsuitable shall be proved with such a bullet or charge of shot as shall be applicable to the dimensions of the bore of such barrel, and with such a charge of gunpowder as shall not be less than twice the service charge, or in case the barrel shall not be capable of holding twice the service charge, with as much powder as the barrel shall be capable of holding.

#### CONDITIONS PRECEDENT TO PROOF.

24. Barrels for arms of the First Class shall not be qualified for proof until they shall be in a fit and proper state for setting up, and the thread of the screws sound and full.

25. Barrels for arms of the Third Class shall not be qualified for proof until they shall be bored and ground and in a fit and proper state for setting up, with the squares set off, looped, and the proper breeches in, and all the threads of the screws sound and full; and all barrels for percussioned arms shall be percussioned, and shall be proved with the proper nipples in.

26. Barrels for arms of the Second, Fourth,

Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Classes :--

For Provisional Proof.—If of plain metal shall be bored and ground, having plugs attached, with touch-holes drilled in the plugs of a diameter not exceeding one-sixteenth of an inch. Notches in the plugs instead of drilled touch-holes shall disqualify for proof. If of twisted metal they shall be fine-bored and struck up with proving plugs attached and touch-holes drilled as in the case of plain metal barrels.

For Definitive Proof.—The barrels, whether of plain or twisted metal, shall be smoothed in the finished state, with the breeches and barrels in the percussioned state, huts filed up, inside of barrels shall be clean, the top and bottom ribs of double barrels shall be fairly struck up, pipes, loops, and stoppers on, the proper breeches and nipples in, the thread of the screws sound and full, and all

rifle barrels shall be rifled.

27. Barrels for breech-loading arms shall receive the final proof after the breech-loading action is attached complete, and both barrels and action are in the finished filed state.

28. Smooth - bored barrels converted into choke-bored barrels shall be subjected to a further Definitive Proof according to the Scale No. 4 provided in the Sixth Class.

29. All choke-bored barrels sent for proof shall be declared in writing before proof to be so, and unless so declared they will be marked as if they were not choke-bored.

30. Barrels for revolving arms shall have the cylinders or chambers with the revolving action attached and complete, and shall be proved with a cartridge containing the maximum service charge which the cylinder or chamber of the arm will receive.

#### MARKS OF PROOF.

31. The marks denoting provisional proof shall be as follows, that is to say:—

As to the Gunmakers' Company.

The letters "G P" interlaced in a cypher surmounted by a lion rampant (videlicet).



As to the Guardians.

The letters "BP" interlaced in a cypher surmounted by a crown (videlicet).



32. The marks denoting Definitive Proof shall be as follows, that is to say:—

As to the Gunmakers' Company.

The letters "GP" interlaced in a cypher surmounted by a crown, and the view mark being the letter "V" surmounted by a crown (videlicet)





As to the Guardians.

Two sceptres crossed, a crown in the top angle formed by the crossing of the Sceptres, the letter "B" in the proper right angle, the letter "C" in the proper left angle, and the letter "P" in the lower angle, and the view mark being two sceptres crossed, a crown in the top angle formed by the crossing of the sceptres, and in the lower angle the letter "V" (videlicet).





33. The marks denoting Provisional Proof of barrels proved in the state for Definitive Proof shall be as follows:—

As to the Gunmakers' Company.

The letters "V G P" interlaced in a cypher surmounted by a lion rampant (videlicet):



As to the Guardians.

The letters "VBP" interlaced in a cypher surmounted by a crown (videlicet).



#### Mode of Affixing Proof Marks.

34. On arms of the First, Third, and Fifth Classes the Definitive Proof mark and view mark shall be impressed at the breech end of the barrel, and if the barrel is constructed with a patent breech, or with revolving cylinders or chambers, the view mark shall be also impressed upon the breech or upon every cylinder or chamber, if more than one, with which the barrel is connected.

35. On arms of the Second Class, and single barrelled arms of the Fourth, Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth Classes Proved Provisionally and Definitively, the Provisional Proof mark shall be impressed on the round of the barrel near the breech end, and the Definitive Proof mark and view mark shall be impressed upon the barrel above the Provisional Proof mark, and if the barrel be constructed with a patent breech, or with a breech-loading action, or with a breech block or chamber, the view mark shall be also impressed upon the patent breech, breech-loading action, shoe, breech block, or chamber, with which the barrel is connected.

36. On arms of the Fourth, Sixth, Seventh, and Eighth classes being double breech-loaders, the barrels for which have been submitted for Provisional Proof before being put together, the Provisional Proof mark shall be impressed upon the round of the barrels near the breech, in front of the flats, or in a corresponding position when there are no flats, and the Definitive Proof mark and view mark shall be impressed upon the flats or in a corresponding position when there are no flats. If Provisionally Proved after being put together, the Provisional Proof mark shall be impressed upon the flats at the breech end, or in a corresponding position, and the Definitive Proof mark and view mark shall be impressed immediately following the Provisional Proof mark. The view mark shall also be impressed upon the action or shoe, breech block or blocks, chamber or chambers with which the barrels are connected.

37. On arms of the Second, and muzzle-loading arms of the Fourth Classes Proved Provisionally in the state for Definitive Proof, the proof mark shall be impressed in the same position as the view mark occupies according to Rules 35 and 36.

38. On all barrels the gauge size of the barrel shall be impressed at the Definitive Proof, and on all barrels for breech-loading arms, of the Fourth, Sixth, and Eighth Classes, the chamber gauge size, together with the letter "C," signifying Chamber, shall also be impressed following the Definitive Proof and view marks, and shall be enclosed in a device, thus:—




39. In all smooth-bore and choke-bored barrels, from 4 to 10 gauge inclusive, the gauge shall be divided into three parts and be marked accordingly: thus the divisions of gauge 8 would be marked 8, \frac{2}{3}, \frac{2}{3}; from 11 to 17 inclusive; the gauges shall be divided into two parts, thus the divisions of gauge 12 would be 12, \frac{1}{1}; all lesser gauges shall be marked as set forth in the Schedule hereto. In all smooth-bore and chokebored breech-loading barrels the gauge size of the barrel shall be taken at a point nine inches from the breech end. In all other barrels the gauge size shall be taken at the muzzle.

40. On barrels for arms of the Sixth Class the or are entitled to impradditional mark "Choke," shall be impressed, barrel, shall efface all to following the chamber gauge. On arms of the tive Proof therefrom.

Eighth Class the letter "R" shall be impressed immediately preceding the word Choke, thus: "R CHOKE."





43. All barrels proved as directed in No. 21 of these rules shall be marked additionally with the letter "L" incorporated with the chamber gauge, thus:—



44. Barrels proved according to No.10 of these rules shall be marked "EC" for powder know as "EC"; "Sch." for powder known as "Schultze's;" and for any other explosive a suitable abbreviation indicating the same, together with a number indicating the service charge in grains.

45. Barrels proved according to No. 22 of these rules shall have the proof charge impressed, in drachms and ounces, following the proof and view marks.

46. When a barrel of any arm, which barrel has been Proved Definitively, or which has been proved in the state for Definitive Proof but according to the scale for Provisional Proof, is brought to the Proof House, or any Branch Proof House of either of the said two Companies, to be proved again Definitively, or according to the scale for Provisional Proof, if such barrel upon being so proved again does not stand proof, the person or persons respectively who, under the said Act is or are entitled to impress marks of proof on such barrel, shall efface all the existing marks of Definitive Proof therefrom.
