

Her Majesty received from Her Royal Highness and from all Her family, as well as from His Royal Highness The Duke of Cumberland, K.G., and all his family, a present on the occasion of the Jubilee.

Her Majesty afterwards received presents at Buckingham Palace from members of The Royal Households and of The Household of His Royal Highness The Grand Duke of Hesse, K.G., from The Marquis and Marchioness of Salisbury, from the Women of England, and from Deputations from various Towns.

Her Majesty, accompanied by The Royal Family, and attended by The Duchess of Buccleuch (Mistress of the Robes), The Dowager Duchess of Roxburghe (Lady of the Bedchamber in Waiting), The Hon. Harriet Phipps and The Hon. Evelyn Moore (Maids of Honour in Waiting), The Earl of Lathom (Lord Chamberlain), General The Viscount Bridport, K.C.B. (Lord in Waiting), and The Lord Burghley (Groom in Waiting), entered the Ball Room at 3 o'clock, where the members of The Queen's Household, past and present, were assembled.

The members of the Household of Their Royal Highnesses The Prince and Princess of Wales, and the members of the Junior Royal Households were also present.

The Lord Steward, The Earl of Mount-Edgcumbe, on the part of Her Majesty's Household, past and present, presented the gift offered by them, with an album containing an Address of Congratulation, and List of the Subscribers.

The Duke of Abercorn, C.B., presented the gift from the Household of Their Royal Highnesses The Prince and Princess of Wales, and The Lady Emma Osborne presented that from the junior Households.

These presents Her Majesty graciously accepted.

The Queen then proceeded to the White Drawing Room, where the Deputation consisting of 210 ladies from the Woman's Jubilee Offering of Great Britain and Ireland were assembled.

The Countess of Strafford, as President of the Committee, presented Her Majesty with a beautifully illuminated Address emblazoned with the arms of various towns of the kingdom, and the names of subscribers in England, Scotland, and Wales, the scrolls of names being enclosed in an historical box which once belonged to George III. The Countess informed Her Majesty that the subscriptions were contributed by nearly 3,000,000 women in England, Ireland, Scotland, and Wales.

Her Excellency The Marchioness of Londonderry then, on behalf of the Women of Ireland, presented The Queen with a handsome Coffe, carved out of Irish bog oak. Major Tully, the Secretary, was present.

Her Majesty having graciously accepted these offerings proceeded to the Green Drawing Room, where the servants of Her Majesty's Household were assembled, and graciously received a present from them.
