The Letters from Germany tell us, That the Saxon Forces would joyn the Imperial Army on the 22d of this Month. And that those of Neuburg, Munster and Palerborne, making a Body of about 12000, would remain between the Meufe and the Moselle, to cover the Country against the Enemies Incursions.

From His Majestics Camp at Benets-bridge, We are now encamped within 15 Miles July 19. of Waterford, whither we shall march to morrow. There are three Regiments in the Town, but we believe they will make very little Resistance. The Enemy had fortified Clonnell, a very considerable Pass, and Sarsfeild was posted there with 4 or 5000 Men, but yesterday they quitted it, and retired towards Limerick, and our Troops are now possessed thereof. Four French Officers are come over to us, and give an account, That the Earl of Tyrconnel, and the Count de Laujun, are at Limerick with the remains of their Army, but in a very ill condition, having lost all their Baggage; and that they are fortifying that place, though it's thought, their only defign is to endeavour to make Terms for themfelves. Colonel Eppinger found a confiderable quantity of Provisions at Wexford; and our Men have taken several Hundred Head of Cattel from the Rapperies, who are fled to the Mountains. The last Letters from Lieutenant-General Douglas faid, that he would be the 18th instant before Athlone. Majesty is gone this day to dine with the Duke of Ormand at Kilkenny.

Exon, July 26. On the 22d instant, the French Fleet came to an Anchor in Torbay, being with their Gallies about 118 Sail. And this Morning about five a Clock, the Gallies drew-very near the Shoar, at a small place called Tongmouth, and having for the space of an Hour play'd their Canroon, and forced the Inhabitants to retire, they Landed in their Boats, about 1000 Men, who fet the Town on Fire.
