Vienna, July 23.

**Y**esterday morning the Emperor was brought to bed of a Princess, who was Childen'd the same afternoon by the Names of *Maria, Margarita, Gabriela, Magdalena, Johana, Antonia*. The Letters from *Nisa* of the 15th Instant tell us, that General *Katana* had reinforced the Garrison of *Puro*, upon the News he received, that 6000 Turks and Tartars were marching towards him with several Pieces of Cannon. That General lay with a flying Camp near *Orfowa*; and that another Body of Imperialists was posted on the Continents of *Mohavia*, to oppose the Enemies Incursions. From the Blockade of *Great Warasin* we have an account, that the 6th Instant the Count *de Corbelli* received a Letter from the Divan of that place, praying him to come to a Conference with such persons as they should send out for that purpose; upon which, he went with 600 Horse to the place agreed on near the Town, where 5 Deputies met him from the Balla and the Divan, who demanded a Cessation of Arms, which the Count *de Corbelli* refused, unless they would Treat of a Surrender. The Deputies pretended, they had no power to enter upon that matter, and thereupon the Conference was broke off; But if we may give credit to the account we have from all hands, of the ill condition that Place is reduced to, they will be quickly obliged to solicit a new Parly. Two days since Count *George Brancowitz*, a Valachian, was brought hither under a strong Guard, for holding Correspondence with *Turkey* and the Turks.

*Mentz*, July 24. The Count *de Colonitz* arrived here the 20th Instant with 600 *Hussars* from the Imperial Camp at *Bruchsal*. The 21st in the night, he marched out again towards the Enemies Camp, (the Gates of the Town having been kept shut all day, that they might not gain any notice of his design) and advancing as far as *Niederwalden*, met a Detachment of 500 French Horse commanded by *Monsieur de Buffiere*, who covered their Foragers; He immediately charged them, and put them to rout, killing 200, and taking about 40 Prisoners, among which was a Lieutenant-Colonel, (who is since dead of his wounds) 2 Captains, 11 Lieutenants, and 9 Cornets: On our side only 3 were killed, and 7 wounded, and Count *Colonitz* himself is slightly hurt in the Arm. The *Hussars* brought back with them above 100 Horses, and a great deal of other Booty, which they had taken from the Enemy.

From the Imperial Camp at *Bruchsal*, July 27. The Electors of *Bavaria* and *Saxony*, and the Veit-Marchchal *Caspera*, had yesterday a Conference at *Eppingen*; and in pursuance of the Resolutions taken therein, it is believed we shall decamp to-morrow. The Count *de Colonitz*, who was lately detached with 600 *Hussars* to *Mentz*, meeting on the 22d with 500 French Horse, charged them with that vigour, that above 200 of the Enemy were killed upon the place, and divers taken Prisoners, the chief of which are brought hither. This day his Electoral Highness caused our Cannon to be fired with 3 Salvo's of all our small Shot, for the Victory obtained by His Majesty of *Great-Britain* in *Belgium*.

*Frankfort*, July 28. The Electors of *Saxony* and *Bavaria* had a Conference at *Eppingen* the 27th Instant, and the next day the Imperial Army decamped from *Bruchsal*, and marched towards *Dorlach*. The French Army under the Dauphin is broke up from *Fronheim*, and marches towards *Nagbach*.

*Cologne*, August 1. There was this day a review of the *Nassau* Troops at *Endelcker*, and to-morrow they will join with those of *Multer* and *Paderborn*. The last Letters from *Toury* give an account, that Monsieur *de Mar* was still encamped near *Pignat*; but that he began to be very much frightened for want of Provisions. That 600 French Dragoons, who were ordered to attack the bridge at *Congnor*, in order to their gaining a passage over the River *Pe*, had been repelled, and most of them cut off. That the Duke of *Savoie* had quitted his Camp at *Monastor*, and was approached nearer to the French Army, with a resolution to attack them, to soon as the Imperial Succors, which were daily expected, had joined him; and in the mean time, to hinder the Enemy from receiving any fresh Supplies of Men or Provisions. That the Governor of *Milva* had been to visit the Duke in his Camp, and to concert Matters with him, in relation to the War. And that the *Landis* continued their Incursions into *Dauphine* with very good Success.

*Brussels*, August 2. On the 30th past the Elector of *Brandenburg* encamped at *Gras*, two Leagues from *Warvoren*. Yesterday Prince *Waldeck* decamped from *Dighem*, and marched to *Loftal*, and this day to *Waworen*, where he joined the Elector of *Brandenburg*; and to-morrow they are to meet our Governor, with the Spanish and *Hannover* Forces, at *Hull*: These Armies make above 60000 Men. The Duke of *Luxemburg* is still encamped near *Quevrain*; and the Marquis *de Boufflers*, who was marching towards the *Moselle* with his flying Camp, and was advanced as far as *Alden*, is come back to the *Moselle*, which his Foot repelled the 27th, and his Horse the next day, and thence took their march by *Braumont* towards *Munbeuge*, to cover that place and *Paupertelle*, or else to join the Duke of *Luxemburg*.

*Hague*, August 4. Prince *Waldeck* joined the Elector of *Brandenburg* at *Warvoren* on the 2d Instant, and together they make 45000 Men effective. The Marquis *de Gassmaga* marches this day with the Spanish and *Hannover* Forces, which are 16000, and they will keep so near as to be able to join Prince *Waldeck* if there be occasion. The Duke of *Luxemburg* is about *Quevrain*, and the Marquis *de Boufflers* is not far from him. The Men of War fitted out by the Admiralty of the *Mas*, for the reinforcing the Dutch Fleet, are very near ready, and those of *Amsterdam* will be so in few days. The last Letters from *Paris* say, that the late King *James* arrived at *Bress* the 20th past; that he parted thence the 21st, and arrived the 25th at *St. Germain*, accompanied by the Duke of *Burton*, who was sent by the French King to meet him. The Forces of the Duke of *Savoie* have gained a considerable advantage over the French in *Piedmont*, but we have not yet the Particulars.

*Edinbu*, July 24. Yesterday the Parliament was Adjourned to the 2d of *September* next, having passed divers Acts. Major-General *Stucken* having left a good Garrison at *Lowrie*, is on his return towards *Perthshire*. Several Thousands of the West-County Men have offered to serve Their Majesties against the Highlanders, (who are in small Bodies wandering on the sides of their Hills as near the Low-Countries as they dare come) where the Council shall order them.

From His Majesty's Camp at *Canick*, July 28. On the 20th we decamped from *Bombach*, and marched about 7 miles to a place called *Ruffenauer*, and the next day we came hither. His Majesty commanded a Trumpet to be sent with a Summons to *Walters*, requiring them to surrender the place. They agreed unto this the next morning, when they sent our Articles; but the King not approving of them, let them know, That they should go out with their own Arms and Baggage only.

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and that if they did not accept thereof, but stayed till they were attacked, he would give them no Quarter. However, they durst not of their Scruples again yesterday, and Major-General Keke was sent thither with five Regiments, and several Pieces of Cannon, to answer them. This Affair on the Captivity was signed, by which the Garrison to march out to morrow with their Arms and Baggage, and are to be conducted 12 miles under His Majesty's Protection, in their way to *Limerick*. The Lord *Loxley*, and the Lord *George Howard*, with several others, have submitted themselves to the King's Mercy.

The last account we have from Lieutenant-General *Douglass* was by Letters of the 20th, wherein he says, That up to this approach to *Limerick*, the Irish burnt the Town, broke down the bridges, and retired into the Castle; but that he had sent a Detachment, who pulled the River at *Laneborough-bridge*, and he had raised a Battery against the Castle, and had begun to play his Cannon and Bombs, and doubted not but to be quickly Master of it.

The Earl of *Ipworth* and the Count de *Ladun* are at *Limerick*, of which place the French have taken possession, so as not to suffer any of the Militia Troops to come into the Town.

To morrow the King goes to *Waterford*, from whence the Forces will march out: But His Majesty's Affairs in this Kingdom, by the great and happy progress He has made towards the Reducing of it, being now in such a Posture, as not to need his Royal Presence here any longer, His Majesty has resolved to return immediately for *England*; and we are told, that His Majesty intends to be at *Dublin* on the 30th Instant, and to Embark there the day following.

*Pembroke, July 23.* Yesterday Captain *Fennings* in the *Experiment* brought into this Harbor a Ketch, which he took off of *Korsika*, having on Board Colonel *Roscoe*, *Hacker*, and 12 Sailors more, who were making their escape to *France*.

*From the Camp at Torbay, July 27.* The Lord *Lansdown* having given the necessary Orders at *Plimouth*, came hither on the 25th with the *Stannary* Troop under the Command of Sir *John Fowell*, where he found Sir *Bowdler* *Wemy* with his Regiment of Horse, Sir *William Drake* the Sheriff, and Major *Rolls*, with several other Deputy-Lieutenants of *Devon*. The next morning, upon Information that the French Gallies were gone towards *Tingmouth*, a small Town to the Eastward of *Torbay*, he immediately marched thither with all the Horse, but being come to *Newton*, within 5 miles of *Tingmouth*, understanding that the French Gallies, after playing their Cannon for about half an hour, had early that morning landed there some Men, who set the Town on fire, and some Vessels in the Port, and after that returned about noon to their Gallies; which afterwards fired some Guns upon a little Town called *Torbay*. Whereupon the Lord *Lansdowne* went back with the Forces to *Torbay*. At their return thither in the Evening, they saw the whole French Fleet under sail standing to the Westward, the Wind at S.E. But the Wind coming Westerly, they returned this morning into *Torbay*, where they still continue. And the Militia remains here to observe them.

*Whitchell, July 28.* The Parliament met this day at *Whitchell*, and was further Prorogued to the 18th of the next Month.

Whereas in a Letter to a Friend, written by Mr. Lawrence Maddon, touching the Murder of the late Earl of Essex, an account is given (Page 54. and 55.) of some discourse that the Countess-Dowager of Essex and the Bishop of Salisbury had upon that Subject at a Meeting with several Lords: The Countess-Dowager and the Bishop find themselves so much wronged in that Relation, that they have thought it became them to disprove it entirely, the whole Discourse fastened on them being false, and nothing to that purpose having been upon that occasion mentioned by either of them.
