NOTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales will, by command of The Queen, hold a Levee at St. James's Palace, on behalf of Her Majesty, on Saturday, the 17th instant, at two o'clock.

It is The Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at the Levees shall be considered as equivalent to Presentations to Her Majesty.

N.B. The Knights of the several Orders are to appear in their Collars, (it being St. Patrick's Day), a Collar-day.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

THE PLEURO-PNEUMONIA SLAUGHTER ORDER OF 1888.

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 6th day of March, 1888.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Slaughter of Cattle exposed to Infection of Pleuro-Pneumonia.

1.—(1.) A Local Authority shall cause all cattle being or having been in the same field, shed, or other place, or in the same herd, or otherwise in contact, with cattle affected with pleuro-pneumonia to be slaughtered within ten days after the fact of their having been so in contact has been ascertained or within such further period as the Privy Council may in any case direct.

(2.) A Local Authority shall cause all cattle which have been certified by an Inspector of the Privy Council to have been in any way exposed to the infection of pleuro-pneumonia to be slaughtered within such period as the Privy Council may direct.

(3.) All cattle by this Article required to be slaughtered shall be kept in a shed or other place approved by the Privy Council and shall not be moved therefrom except for slaughter as hereinafter provided.

(4.) Every such head of cattle shall be immediately marked by clipping the hair off the end of the tail.

(5.) No cattle other than cattle dealt with under this Article shall be moved into or kept in such shed or other place so long as any cattle are

detained there under the provisions of this Article.

(6.) Any head of cattle may at any time be moved for the purpose of being slaughtered from such shed or other place with a Movement Licence of a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority to a slaughter-house approved by the Local Authority for the purpose of being there forthwith slaughtered, in which case the following provisions shall apply:

(7.) The Licence shall be available for twelve hours and no longer.

(8.) The Licence shall specify the slaughter-house to which the head of cattle is to be moved for slaughter, and it shall not be moved to any other slaughter-house or place.

(9.) The head of cattle so moved shall be moved to the approved slaughter-house under the direction and in charge of an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority; and he shall enforce and superintend the immediate slaughter there of such head of cattle, and shall forthwith report to the Local Authority the fact of the slaughter there.

(10.) If the movement is to be into the District of another Local Authority, there must also be a Movement Licence of that other Local Authority indorsed on or referring to the first-mentioned Licence; which second Licence must be granted before the head of cattle is moved into the District of that other Local Authority.

(11.) The head of cattle so moved into the District of that other Local Authority shall be moved to the approved slaughter-house under the direction and in charge of an Inspector or other officer of the Local Authority out of whose District it is moved; and he shall enforce and superintend the immediate slaughter there of the head of cattle, and shall forthwith report to both the Local Authorities the fact of the slaughter there.

(12.) The Local Authority shall cause any head of cattle to which this Article applies to be forthwith slaughtered if the owner at any time so require.

Compensation.

2.—(1.) The Local Authority shall out of the local rate pay compensation as follows for cattle slaughtered under the authority of this Order:

The compensation shall be the value of the animal immediately before it was slaughtered, but so that the compensation do not in any case exceed forty pounds.

(2.) The following provisions of the Act of 1878 and of The Animals Order of 1886 and of The Animals (Amendment) Order of 1887, No. 3 shall, so far as the same are applicable, apply to the case of cattle slaughtered under the authority of this Order:

(i.) Section 30 (*General provisions relative to slaughter and compensation*) of the Act of 1878:

(ii.) Article 179 (*Withholding of compensation*) of The Animals Order of 1886:

(iii.) Article 180 (*Ascertainment of value for compensation*) of The Animals Order of 1886 as amended by Article 2 of The Animals (Amendment) Order of 1887, No. 3:

(iv.) Article 181 (*Record of slaughter*) of The Animals Order of 1886.

Saving for The Animals (Amendment) Order of 1887.

3. Nothing in this Order shall apply to the case of any head of cattle certified by a Veterinary Inspector as suspected by him to be affected with

pleuro-pneumonia under Article 6 of The Animals (Amendment) Order of 1887.

Disinfection.

4. A Local Authority shall at their own expense cause the shed or other place in which a head of cattle has been kept in accordance with the provisions of this Order to be cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Privy Council, and no cattle shall be moved into such shed or other place until the same has been so cleansed and disinfected.

Production of Licences: Names and Addresses.

5.—(1.) Every person in charge of cattle being moved for slaughter under the provisions of this Order shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a Constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Movement Licence authorizing the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or Constable, or Inspector or other officer.

(3.) If a person in charge of cattle being so moved under the provisions of this Order, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Offences.

6.—(1.) If a head of cattle is moved in contravention of this Order, or of the conditions of a Movement Licence thereunder, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order, allows a head of cattle to stray he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Extent.

7. This Order extends to England and Wales and Scotland.

Interpretation.

8. In this Order—

The Act of 1878 means The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878:

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1878.

Short Title.

9. This Order may be cited as THE PLEURO-PNEUMONIA SLAUGHTER ORDER OF 1888.

Commencement.

10. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.
