Falmouth, April 29.

He 26th instant arrived at Pensance the St. John
Baptist of that place from Bayonne, telling us
that leveral English and Dutch ships had at her
comming thence, left the Port, upon the report
of an Imbargo that would have been laid upon
them, and that they ran much hazard in getting out, of
being cast away upon the Bar.

The 28th came in here t'e Milford and Francis, two of His Majesties Freçats, but without any news. Here is also one of His Majesties Pleasure-boar, intending in little

time for Ireland.

Pertsmouth, May 3. The Montague, Monk, Bristol, and Tiger, are now riding at Spitthead, and may sail to the Rendezvous of the Fleet, with the first sair wind.

The first instant two Hoyes with Wine and Brandy, the lading of a Dutch ship, two dayes before shipwrackt upon the Coasts of the Isle of Wight, were in their passage from the said Isle, cast away by storm.

The Eagle Fregat which put in the last week, is this

Morning gone off again to cruile upon the Coasts.

Vienna, April 22. Since the News arriving here of the greet probability of a h ppy conclusion of the Treaty between the Two Crowns, we have no farther discourse of any New Levies, or of any fresh recruits designed for Alfatia; but a Courrier is with a lifeed dispatch into Spain with a French Pass, to avoid all interruption on the way, his business not yet known.

The Sieur de Curalitz is to be suddenly sent with a great, Train to the Bassa of Buda, to complement him upon his new Government, and to make him a Present of Plate, as has been formerly practised upon the like occasion

The Count de Transfon is likewise designed to be sent by His Imperial Majesty into Smizzerland as Ambasta-

dour.

The Assembly of the States of Hungary lately held at Prefburg is broken off with some diffatisfaction, and the people thereupon much inclined to rebellion, but care is taken to prevenuit. 'Tis said another Assembly will be suddenly called at Cassovia, to compose all disturbances and disputes, and prepare them for a general Diet.

The Ambassador which the Abass Prince of Transluania some time since sent to the Grand Seignior, is said to be returned, with much satisfaction to his Masser, the Sultan habiting. Ordered the people in Walachia and Moldavia to take

armes if occasion require it, to assist him.

Hamberough, May 4. Our Neighbou ing forces continué still in their old Quarters, but the Field Heer Wrangle is gone into Pomeraria to be present at the Muster of the forces lately landed there.

Here are lately arrived fixteen slips richly laden from Spain and Portugal with their Convoy, who in their paffage were attended by several Turkish Pyrats, who took a view of them, but durst not make any attempt to engage them.

From Leipfich we are informed that at the beginning of the Fair lately held there, there happened a sudden fire in the Suburbs, which destroiced four houses, but by timely affissance was extinguished without any farther dammage about that immediately after two other files appeared in other places, by which two houles only were burnt, and two perfons killed by the fall of them: whereup n the Magistrates suspecting these fires to be kindled upon design, order'd all houses in the Town to be carefully searched; upon which several materials were discove ed in divers parts; supp sed to have been prepared for the stringof houses, and one perfon apprehended upon suspicion; who being a known thies, 'tis believed a Crew of that fort of Villains had compired to fire the Town, to make to themselves an opportunity of robbing with the greater security.

The Lunenburgh forces are now upon their March, and its believed may speedily be able to joyn with the forces of the United Prouinces, upon the Frontiers of it eff-

phalia.

Brussels, May 4 On Saturday last arrived here again from Antwerp, his Excellency the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo, and has taken up a new lodging in the Pallace, that whi he formerly had, being now surnished and prepared for the entertainment of Don Juan. The same day the Marquis received Letters by a Courrier extraordinary from Madrid, with a Katisscation in blank of the Treaty concluded at Aix la Chapelle.

The French notwithstanding the promited suspension of Arms, and the Negotiation for peace, continue still troublesome in the Countrey, committing several disorders, and drawing several great sums of money from the people. They have also drawn a considerable party into Engagen, and some other little Towns which were by mutual agree-

ment to have remained Neutral.

The first instant, dyed in this City the Chevalier Philippe Guillaume de Steenhujs, Baron de Pecderle of the Great Council of State to His Catholique Maj sty, and Chancellour of Brabant, in the 75th year of his age, and was the third instant with much state buryed in the Church of the Dominicans in the Tomb of his Ancestors.

Paris May 9. Letters of the second instant from Cortrick, advise us, that the Marquis de Crequy h s drawn out 10 Companies of the Queent Regiment, which are to be pare of the Army designed to be commanded by M nsieur, the other 14 Companies of the seme Regiment will be in sew days relieved, and sent to joyn them. The Chevalier de Lorain, and the Count de Plessis are by Post gone hence for the Netherlands, where they are to be entertain'd as Mareshals de Camp in Monsieur's Army.

They say likewise that the Dukes of Luxemburg and Recquelaur have order to march, but not to commit any acta of toostulity, sonly to be in a readiness in case the Treaty should not have to a happy iffue which is h ped for.

O: Sunday last Monsieur Van Eeuningbes in his resurry from Charenton was by a Courier dispatch: to him from Aix la Chapelle, assured that the Treaty was signed both by Monsieur Colbert on the beha's of His Most Christish Majesty, and by the Baron de Bergeick Plenipotentiary for Spain on the beha's of His Catholique Majesty, so that now they want nothing for the full Conclusion of the

Peace, but only the Ratification from the Queen of

Spain.

Tis faid, that upon the conclusion of this peace, His Majesty will resolve to send a considerable force to affish the Venerisms in the desence of Candia, but under the Popes name.

Here is lately arrived a Bull from His Holiness for the condemnation of the late Translation of the New Testament, confirming the tentence formerly given against it by the Arch-Bishop of Paris.

His Majesty inten s suddenly to reform his Forces, but to entertain all his old Officers; and it said that all Co.nets and Enfigns shall be law aside.

From Province they tell us that the Gal'ies and Men of War are not yet put to lea, but are in readiness to sail upon the first Orders.

Hague, May 11. A Courrier dispatcht hither from the Heer Man Beverningh, Plenipotentiary from the States General at Aix-la-Chappelle, informs that the Treaty of Peace was fully agreed and figned there the 2d instant, to the satisfaction of all Christendome; whereupon our New Levies are laid aside, and the Heer Van Beverningh suddenly expected, to give the States a more full account of all his Negotiation there.

On the 30th past and some dayes sollowing, the Heer de Nortwich drew up the Army at he Rendezvous near Bergop-zoomin Battalia, and exercised them before the States Deputies, to their great satisfaction; finding them much more expert in handling their Arms, then could have been expected; those forces are since ordered into convenient Quarters designed for them.

The Mareichal Wurts is yet with the States Deputies about Hardenbergh, with two Regimen's o ely of the Army, to expect the arrival of the Lunenburgh forces; whereof two Compnaies are already marched into Hardenbergh, the rest suddenly expected to follow; and after some sew dayes rest are to be disposed of into the Garrisons of Deventer, Campen, Zwoli, Hassist, Otdenzeet, Outmarsen, Euschede, and other frontier places.

On Wednesday last arrived here His Highness the Prince of Orange from the Leagure at Handenberg: The Heer de Groot has taken his leave of the Al'embly of the States, and is this day to begin his journey for swedeland in quality of Ambassador in ordinary.

Vice-Admiral Van G ent, with the rest of the Officers and Captains of that Admiralty, are all of them ready to put to sea upon the first Orders. They also tellus the Guns which were cast at the Elve, which seemed to be excellent pieces, prove otherwise upon the Tryal, every one of them breaking upon their discharge, killing one of the Canoniers, hutting others, with several persons, whose Curiosity led them to see the Tryal of them.

Brussels, May 12. On the second instant the Treaty of peace between the two Crowns of Spain and France was fully signed by the two Plenipotentiaries of the said Kings, since which the Baron de Bergeick lest Aix la Chapelle, and on Wednesday in the Evening arrived here, bringing with him the said Treaty, which on Friday night last was by a Courier Extraordinary dispatched away for Spain in Order to its Ratisfication.

Monfieur Colbert is from Aix gone for Cologne with the Bishop of Stratsburg. Monfieur Beverning likewise left that place the 8th instant, and the next day Sir William Temple, Plenipoten inter from His Majesty of Great Bristain intended also to depart thence on his way for Brassles. Notwithstanding this happy advance of the Negotiation for Peace, the French still continue in a great body, using spuch violence in the Country. Yesterday in the Evening had intelligence that they had passed the Channel of

Bruges ; ha this morning we are informed that they are an gain retired.

The A.chbishoptick of Malines having been for some time vacant, is now conterted upon Monsieur Fean de Wachtendone, of the Family of the Barons of that Name in the Dutchy of Guelderland; who some dayes since arrived here from Namer, where he has received the Complements of the Nobility.

Bruges, May 14. Since the 2d. of this moneth a Body of between 10 or 12000 French, with their Caunon, Bridges, and great flore of Provisions and Ammunition, have kepk together between this City and Ghens; having made two Bridges over the River, passed over a great pair of their Horse and Foot into the East Countrey, sending to the Lord of this City, and demanding a great summe 5 otherwise threatning the firing and spoil of that Countrey: for prevention whereof, the Lord at the last agreed with them for the payment of 5,5000 Florins, whereof 20 00 to be immediately paid, and the rest within eight dayes 3 upon, which agreement the French yesterday began to return homewards, freeing the Countrey from their sears. Even now about 20 of the French taken by the Countrey people, are brought in prisoners, several other straggers baving been killed and taken by them.

On Friday night last errived at Oslend a ship with 5 o soldiers from Corunna, with Letters be ring date April 28, informing that Don Juan was the going to embarish himself for this pace 5 so that we are in daily expectation of further news from him, yesterday Marquis Salazar, with several Granders, went hence to Oslend, in expectation of him.

We have for these five or six dayes to ether had great storms. On Thursday last a ship belonging to Middle-bourgh of 150 Tuns, laden with Wine and B andy, lasing spe tall her Anchors and Cables, made in for Oslenda but for want of water, struck upon the sands within the mouth of the Harbour, and the men leaving her, immediately, having all her sails up, broke in pieces: the men had also dubilesty perisht, no B at being willing to adventure out, had not 9 or to English Sailers hand in hand put themselyes into the Sea, and with much danger to themselves preserved them.

Tarmouth, May 4. On Friday in the afternoon happenned a great storm, which forced several ships to change their course. Intended for the Northwards, whereof sour are said to be cast away between Hasbourgh and this place, one of them a vessel of Hull from Nants with Wine and Brandy, and another of Lin, a new Ketch laden with Oats and Oyl, the men all saved; of the other two we have not yet any farther account, then that two of their men only are saved about Hasbourgh.

Portsmouth, May 5. The Montagne and Roebuck are now riding at Spitthead. The Mont, Briftel and Tygers sailed to the place appointed for the Rendesvouz of the Fleet. The Dragon and Rub will go out with the first fair wind, and be speedily followed by the York and Cambridge.

Whitehall, May 6. The 25th past, His Grace the Duke of Ormand fafely landed at Holyhead, and on Tuesday the 28th, arrived at Cheffer, the next day he came to Sir Thomas Delues his house, from whence he departed the day following to Lichfield, and on Friday come to Brazley to the Earl of Chefferfields houe, where he continued till Monday the 4th instant, on which day he went thence to Coventry accompanied by the Earl of Chefterfield, the Lord Duncanon, and divers other persons of quality, and was met upon the way by the Lord Viscount Conway, with several Gentlemen of the Countrey. The next day he went thence to Dunstable, and this day in the afternoon, his Grace arrived here, having been met some miles from hence by several persons of quality, and attended into Town by a Train of div rs Coaches with fix horses, where after his arrival he waited upon both their Majesties by whom he was very Graciously received.
