(1.) Intended Discontinuance of Low Light.

THE Trinity House, London, has given notice, dated 22nd March, 1888, that owing to the rapid encroachment of the sea, it will be necessary to abandon the low lighthouse at Orfordness as early as practicable, and in lieu thereof a new lighthouse will be established at Southwold:—

The low light will be discontinued about 1st August, 1888.

(2.) Intended Alteration in Character of High Light.

Also, has given notice, that on the same date that Orfordness Low Light is discontinued, the following alteration will be made in the character of the light shown from Orfordness High Lighthouse.

The light will be an occulting white light; or will, once in every forty seconds, suddenly disappear for three seconds, and then as suddenly reappear at full power.

To the northward, the light will show red, from the bearing of S.W. Sly. to the land.

To the southward, the light will show red, between the bearing of N.E. & E. and N.E. by E. & E.; and green from N.E. by E. & E. to the land.

A subsidiary white light will also be shown to the north-eastward from a window 60 feet below the high light, visible over an arc of about 25°, covering Aldborough Ridge, and to assist vessels in rounding Orfordness. (3.) Southwold—Intended Occulting White Light.
Also, has given notice, that at the same time that the above alterations take place, a light will be exhibited from a temporary structure, pending the completion of the permanent lighthouse, situated at the southern end of the town of Southwold:—

The light will be a occulting white light, with two short occultations in quick succession, every twenty seconds. To the northward it will show red from the bearing of S.W. by W. to the land, that bearing leading 2 cables eastward of South Barnard Buoy; to the southward it will show red from the bearing of N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. to the land, that bearing leading 2 cables eastward of Sizewell Bank Buoy.
