

# The London Gazette.

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From Monday August 4. to Thursday August 7. 1690.

Turin, July 15.

**T**his week 15 Pieces of Cannon for Battery were sent from hence to our Camp, under the Convoy of the Regiment of *Mondovi*. The Count de *Louvigny* General of the Forces of the Milaneze, has been at *Cannoglio*, to view the place, and finding it to be a considerable Pass, a good Garrison is put into it; Several Forts are likewise building on the *Po*, to hinder the Enemy's passing that River, which they have several times attempted, in order to make Incursions into the Country on the other side, and to draw some Subsistence from thence, but they have been still repulsed with loss. Monsieur *Catinat* continues encamped at *Brillane* near *Pigneyrol*; He has sent a Trumpet to our Camp, to enquire after some French Officers, who he believed were taken Prisoners, but we know nothing of them, and imagine they may have been killed by the Country People; who do the French a great deal of mischief, and particularly to their Foragers, whom they often surprize, and cut off. In the Rencontre that happened lately near *Carignan*, the French own to have lost 140 Men and 5 Officers, besides wounded; On our side, there were but 27 killed, and 25 wounded. The French Soldiers continue to desert, and there does not pass a day that several do not come over to us, who all complain of the scarcity there is of Provisions in their Camp. Monsieur *Catinat* has withdrawn the Troops which he had left at *Lucerne* and the Neighbouring places, fearing they would have been forced from thence by the Savoyards, who are in Arms, and have possessed themselves of the Fort of *Barreun*, within two Leagues of *Montmelian*. Three Regiments are raising for our Duke, one of Foot, and two of Dragoons.

*Milan, July 20.* Our Governor the Count de *Fuenfaldia* has, since his return from the Camp in *Piedmont*, sent thither 100000 Livres for the payment of our Troops, and has ordered more Forces to march that way. This week arrived here several Troops of the Regiment of *Cuirassiers*, raised in *Germany* for the Service of this State, and the rest are expected in few days; They will make together 800 Men. Divers Companies of Foot, and 1000 Grisons, are likewise arrived here, being raised by Commission from our Governor.

*Warsaw, July 5.* The Tartars have of late made frequent Incursions into the Provinces of *Russia* and *Podolia*; and, according to our late advice, a great Body of them lay encamped under the Cannon of *Cannize*, who design, as it's feared, to ravage the Country thereabouts. The Crown-General had posted a Detachment of Horse to guard the Passa-

ges on that side, but a stronger Party of the Enemy forced them to quit their Station, with the loss of above 100 of our Men who were killed or taken. The Tartar Envoy is still here, and has had several Conferences with the Ministers of this Court, upon the Proposals he was charged with; But there will be no final answer given him, till the Express that was lately dispatched to *Vienna* with an account of the Offers he had made, is come back with the Emperor's Resolution in this matter.

*Vienna, July 27.* Yesterday being the Birth-day of the King of the *Romans*, who then entered into the 13th year of his Age, was observed here with much solemnity. Prince *Louis* of *Baden* will part from hence in 2 or 3 days to command the Imperial Army in *Lugaria*. The Letters from *Nissa* of the 15th tell us, that a Party of *Rasciens*, under the command of Captain *Strabina*, had made an Incursion as far as *Sophia*, surprized the Enemy in several places, and taken a great many Slaves and Horses; They were in their return attack'd by some Turkish Troops, who had gathered together upon the news of their march, but the *Rasciens* repulsed them, and killed 150, of which number was *Te rifa Bafsa*. This Party brought an account, that the Grand Visier moved with his Army (which was not near so considerable as was given out) the 22d of the last Month from *Adrianople*, and that the Bassa of *Passerzeck* was gone to meet him. The same Letters add, that the Count de *Trautmanjdorf* had received advice, that a great Body of Tartars lay ready in *Valachia* to joyn with *Teckeley* and the Turks, in order to some attempt upon *Widin*, or to make an Incursion into *Transilvania*. And that *Teckeley* had published a Declaration, containing his Claim to the Principality of *Transilvania*, which he had sent to the several Cities and Bourgs of that Country. We have an account from *Moldavia*, that the Sultan *Galga*, with his Hords of Tartars, was marched from *Budziack* to make an Incursion into the Territories of *Poland*. There are arrived in *Muscovy* Ambassadors from *Persia* to this Court and that of *Poland*, but the Czar will not allow them passage.

*Ratisbonne, July 27.* The Deputy of *Saxony* has declared to the Dyet, that the Elector his Master, in consideration of the present juncture of Affairs, will not now insist on his Pretensions to the Dutchy of *Saxe Lawemburg*, but is willing that this matter be laid by till after the ending of the Campaign, provided it be without any prejudice to his Right. The same Declaration has been made by the other Parties, who likewise pretend to this Succession.

*Hydeberg, August 1.* The Imperial Army marched the 29th past from *Bruchal*, and is now encamped at *Durlach*; It's believed, their design is upon

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upon *Hunningen*. The French Army marches likewise to observe them. The Saxon Forces are come to *Sintzheim*.

*Mentz, August 2.* The Armies on this side are now in motion, and we expect to hear very quickly of some great Action. The Imperialists move towards *Friburg*; and the Dauphin has thereupon drawn what Troops he could out of *Montroyal*, and other Garrisons, to reinforce his Army, and marches towards *Affice*. The Forces of *Saxony, Hesse, and Lunenburg*, are likewise on their march, but 'tis not yet certain, whether they will joyn the Imperial Army, or act separately.

*Frankfort, August 2.* The Troops of *Hesse and Lunenburg* have received Orders to hasten their march, in order to joyn the Imperial Army, which is advanced to *Darlach*. The *Lunenburg Velt-Marechal*, the *Baron de Charvet*, stays in the mean time in this City to confer with the Landgrave of *Hesse*, who is expected here to morrow or next day.

*Cologne, August 4.* The Forces of *Neubourg and Munster* are now encamped together at *Cochern*, where 4000 *Brandenburgers*, who are on their march from *Nuis*, will joyn them to morrow. The advices from the Palatinate say, that the Imperial Army was come to *Darlach*, and from thence would march higher up towards *Friburg and Hunningen*. And that there was a report, that the Dauphin would pass the *Rhine* at *Fort Louis*. They write from *Basse* of the 29th inst, that General *Stadel* commanded the Imperial Forces that are encamped near that place, to the number of about 8000 Men, in the absence of the Count de *Souches*, who was gone to confer with the Elector of *Bavaria*, and that great store of provisions was laid up at *Rhinfelden*, and the other Fortress Towns, for the use of the Imperial Army, in case they should advance that way. From *Suisserland* we have advice, that 1000 Refugees, being all very well Armed, were marched from *Geneva* to joyn the *Vaudois* in the Valleys of *Piedmont*.

*Hamburg, August 4.* The *Baron de Welling*, Major-General of the Suedish Forces, parted from hence the first instant, upon the Orders he received from the Count de *Bielke* Governor of *Pomeran*, to march with the 6000 *Suedes* that are to joyn the Imperial Army on the *Rhine*. The Duke of *Wolfembuttel* has sent the *Sieur Crofbecke* to the *Hague*, to Treat with the States about recruiting his Troops, in their Service, which were in the Battel of *Fierus*. The Duke of *Zell* went the last week to *Ratzbourg*, to view the new Fortifications that are making there; And yesterday his Highness repassed the *Elbe* at *Lawenburg*, on his return to *Zell*. They write from *Copenhagen*, that the King of *Denmark* had not yet fixed the time of his Journey to *Hollstein*: And that they had advice, that the 12 Suedish Men of War were still at *Masstrand*.

*Edinburg, July 31.* Major-General *Mackey* returned hither yesterday from the North, having left the Forces, that went with him to *Loquabor*, at *St. Johnston*. The Highland Rebels that appeared the last week about *Stirling*, are, upon the approach of our Troops, retired again to the Hills. And the West-Country Men, who gathered together in great numbers at *Glasgow*, to offer their Service to Their Majesties, are allowed to go home again.

*Chapel-Isord, July 31.* The King goes back to morrow to the Army; which marched from *Carriek* the 27th inst, under the command of the Count de *Sohns*, and came that day with

in 2 miles of *Cannel*. The 29th they marched 7 miles farther, and encamped the 29th at *Goollin-bridge*, (about 24 miles from *Limerick*) where Lieutenant-General *Douglas* was to joyn them the next day; and then they would march directly to *Limerick*. It is confirmed, that the French have possessed themselves of that place, and that they will not suffer any of the Irish Troops to come into the Town.

*Pembroke, August 1.* Their Majesties Ship the *Pembroke* has taken and sent into this Harbor two Ships bound from *Waterford* to *France*, and forced another ashore near *Cork*. The Masters of these Vessels say, that all the French Ships, as well Men of War and Privateers, as Merchant Men, that are on the Irish Coasts, are ordered to *Limerick*.

*Plymouth, August 3.* The French Fleet is still in *Torbay*.

*Chester, August 4.* On Friday last arrived in *Highlake* one of the Troops of Guards, with two Regiments of Horse and one of Dragoons, from *Ireland*: They are since landed, and are now marching towards this place.

Whereas in a Letter to a Friend, written by Mr. Lawrence Braddon, touching the Murder of the late Earl of Essex, an account is given (Page 54. and 55.) of some Discourse that the Countess-Dowager of Essex and the Bishop of Salisbury had upon that Subject at a Meeting with several Lords: The Countess-Dowager and the Bishop find themselves so much wronged in that Relation, that they have thought it became them to disavow it entirely, the whole Discourse assestion on them being false, and nothing to that purpose having been upon that occasion mentioned by either of them.
