MEDITERRANEAN.—ITALY.—WEST COAST.

(1.) *Amended Particulars of Harbour Lights at Leghorn.*

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 148 of 28th May, 1887, on the exhibition of two lights from the extremities of the Moles, at the entrance to Municipal Dock, Leghorn:—

Information was subsequently received that the colours of the lights had been reversed, and they are now exhibited as follows:—

A fixed red light, on the extremity of the Northern Mole, and a fixed green light on the extremity of the Southern Mole.

Position, lat. 43° 33' 5" N., long. 10° 17' 45" E.

ADRIATIC.—EASTERN SHORE.

(2.) *Pola—Additional Measured Mile Beacons.*

The Austrian Government has given notice, dated 9th April, 1888, that the following additional beacons, for the purpose of extending the present measured distance of a mile, have been erected westward and southward of Pola, eastern shore of the Adriatic:—

The northern rear beacon is situated on the summit of the hill, 107 feet high, westward of the Marine Hospital.

The northern front beacon bears S. 36° W., distant $1\frac{2}{5}$ cables from the northern rear beacon.

Position, northern rear beacon, lat. 44° 51' 40" N., long. 13° 50' E.

The southern rear beacon is situated on the southern slope of Mount Cope, eastward of Mount Bombista.

The southern front beacon bears S. 36° W., from the southern rear beacon, situated at about half the distance from the latter to the shore.

Position, southern rear beacon, approximate, lat. 44° 48' 50" N., long. 13° 53' E.

NOTE.—The distance from the line of the northern beacons, in line, to that of the southern beacons in line, on a course S. 54° E., is three miles.
