Vienna, July 30.

Prince Louis of Baden will part from hence to morrow for *Bulgaria*. A Poland, who had been several years a Slave in *Turkey*, is escaped from *Sophia* to *Nissa*, and reports, that the Enemy have laid up at *Sophia* abundance of Provisions, but that they had not there when he came away above 5000 Men, and the general Talk was, that they would only act defensively this year. They write from *Belgrade* of the 15th, that Count *Aspremont* was arrived there with Recruits for his own and other Regiments; That his Regiment was ordered to *Nissa*, and that he was gone himself to *Fritzlar* to command the Imperial Forces that are marching to observe the Enemies Motions. The Garrison at *Lippa* hath lately had a Rencounter with a Party of that of *Temeswarer*, in which they killed 50 Turks, and took 64 Prisoners, with the loss only of 8 killed and 20 wounded on our side. We have an account from *Croacia*, that Count *Erdeod*, Ban or Viceroy of that Kingdom, having certain information, that the Baia of *Bosnia* was encamped at *Zimni* with 10000 Turks, and several Pieces of Cannon, and designed to attack the Fort of *Novi*, he drew his Militia together, and marched with them towards the Enemy: And that one of our Parties had taken the Castle of *Crups* with little loss.

Basil, July 30. General *Souches*, who went lately to confer with the Elector of *Bavaria*, returned on the 25th to his Camp at *Schopffen*, and came on the 26th to this place; Our Magistrates, upon notice thereof, would have received him publicly, but he excused it. In the afternoon he rode with some of his Officers towards the French Territories on this side the *Rhine*, and viewed the situation of *Hunningen* and the neighbouring Country, and returning thither in the evening, repassed the *Rhine* over our Bridge, and went back to his Camp. We have an account from *Rhinfelden*, that divers Pieces of Cannon for Battery have been lately brought thither, and other Preparations made for a Siege; from whence, and the Imperial Army's advancing this way, it's concluded, that the Confederates have a design upon *Hunningen*. This is certain, that the French are very much allarmed; and that their Ambassador does earnestly sollicite the Cantons to reinforce the Troops appointed to guard the Pass of *Augst*, between this City and *Rhinfelden*.

Frankfurt, August 6. The Forces of *Lunenburg* and *Hesse*, making together about 10000 Men, have passed the *Maine* here, at *Rumpfenheim*, and *Upper Reinheim*, and march towards the Palatinate to join the Saxon Forces, and so to form a Body on that side, while the Imperial Army, commanded by the Elector of *Bavaria*, advances towards *Hunningen*. The Landgrave of *Hesse* arrived here the 4th instant, and the next day he followed his Troops. The Duke of *Prussia* continues his march toward *Alice* to

observe the Imperialists; and it's said, that he intends to pass the *Rhine* at *Fort Louis*.

From the Brandenburg Camp at Genap, August 6. On the 2d instant Prince *Waldeck* joyned us with 27000 Men at *Waveren*, where we rested 3 days. And here Mr. *Johnson*, Envoy Extraordinary from *England*, who had his Quarters in the Castle of *Bavette*, about an English mile from the Town, made a splendid Entertainment on occasion of His Majesties happy Successes in *Ireland*. There were five publick Tables prepared; at the first was the Elector, Prince *Waldeck*, the Prince of *Frizeland*, the Elector's three Brothers, the Envoy, the Resident of *Holland*, and some Officers of the Elector's Court. At the second was Duke *Schomburg*, (who did Honour to the Table as an English Peer) Major-General *Talmish*, and other General Officers of the *Brandenburg* and *Holland* Armies. At the third, were Officers of the English and Scotch Regiments. At the fourth, the Elector's grand Musketeers, who were upon Duty. And at the fifth, his Pages: Which were all served with great Plenty, and more exactness than could be expected in a Camp. The Elector had ordered 9 Field-Pieces to be brought to the top of the Hill, which were discharged at every Health. In the middle of the Entertainment came a Trumpet from the Duke of *Maine*, to desire a Pair for some Horses; His Electoral Highness ordered him to be called in, and bid him at his return acquaint the Duke, that he found us rejoicing for the great Victory which the King of *England* had gained in *Ireland*. In the Evening we had a great Bonfire, which made a good appearance from the top of the Hill. We shall stay here to morrow, and march the day following towards the Enemy.

Cologne, August 11. The French Troops under the Command of the Count de *Tiffi*, have made an Incurtion into the Country of *Julers*, where on Monday night last they burnt 14 Villages, and afterwards advanced to *Cornelis Munster*, and obliged the Magistrates of *Aix la Chapelle*, (in which place there is no Garrison at present) to send Deputies thither to agree with them about their Contributions. The Generals of the *Nubourg* and *Munster* Forces sent a strong Detachment of Horse in pursuit of the Enemy, but they came too late. The Letters from the Palatinate of the 8 instant tell us, that the Imperial Army was still encamped near *Durlach*, whither the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, the Velt-Marschal *Chauvet*, and the Count de *Lippe*, went that day from *Hadberg* to confer with the Electors of *Bavaria* and *Saxony*, and other Princes, who were to be present at this Conference; after which, 'twas believed the Army would decamp and march towards the *Black Forest*. That the Troops of *Lunenburg* and *Hesse* were going to pass the *Neckar*, in order to join the *Saxons*, who were encamped at *Eppenheim*; And that the French Army continued on this side the *Rhine*, moving towards *Strasbourg*. Since the late Battel of *Fierus*, above 2000 French Deserters have passed through this City, being for the most part *Sussers* and *Germans*. The last Letters from *Tunis*, by the way of *Dusseldam*, are of the 25th part, and only tell us, that the Armies on that side continued in the same stations mentioned in our former Advices.

Brussels, August 9. The *Brandenburg* and Dutch Armies marched yesterday towards *Bois Seigneur Jac*, within two hours march of the Spanish Camp

near *Hall*. The Marquis de *Gastanaga* went last night to visit the Elector of *Brandenburg*; and this day will be held a great Council of War. Our Armies, which consist together of above 60000 Men, will march to-morrow by the way of *Feluy* and *Effcaffines*, and so by *Mons*, towards the Enemy; who are removed from *Quevrain* and *Bavay* nearer to *Maubeuge*, their right Wing reaching to a place called *Omont*, where they have been reinforced by the Troops that were posted at *Pottes* and *Cadraff*, as likewise by the Forces commanded by the Marquis de *Boufflers*, so that their Army is said to be now 40000 strong. The Letters from *Germany* tell us, that the Imperial Army marched towards *Friburg* and *Hunnigen*, and the French towards *Fort Louis*; and that the Elector of *Saxony* with his own Forces, and those of *Lunenburg* and *Hesse*, was going to encamp near *Bruchsal*.

Hague, August 11. Mr. *Harbord* had this day his Audience of Leave of the States-General, and goes to-morrow to *Rotterdam* to Embark for *England*. There will sail with him 5 Dutch Men of War from the *Maeze*; and the 6 from the *Texell* will be at Sea at the same time. The Letters from *Flanders* say, that the three Confederate Armies are joyned, of which the Elector of *Brandenburg* has the chief Command. And that a great Council of War was to be held yesterday, to resolve what to do. The Duke of *Luxemburg* has drawn together all the Troops he could to reinforce his Army, and keeps between *Maubeuge* and *Mons*, beyond the River *Haisne*.

Hague, August 15. This morning four Capital Men of War sailed out of the *Maeze*; and it is believed, those from the *Texell* are now likewise at Sea. The Confederate Armies in *Flanders* are all joyned and encamped in two Lines from *Hael* to *Tubize*. The Duke of *Luxemburg* is encamped between *Mons* and *Valenciennes*; the *Marschal de Mairies* had joyned him with part of his Forces, but is returned again with them to guard the Line between the *Lys* and the *Scheldt*. The Elector of *Brandenburg* has sent out several Parties of 2 and 3000 Horse, but they have not met with any of the Enemies.

Dublin, August 2. His Majesty went yesterday from *Chapelizod* to the Army, which will be on Monday or Tuesday next before *Limerick*. There are People that come every hour from thence, and the Country about it, to our Camp, who all give an account of the Consternation the Enemy are in upon the approach of our Army, and that they were retired beyond the *Shannon*, being about 25000 strong with the French that are in the Town of *Limerick*, but ill Armed, and in a despicable condition; They had had several Debates about demanding Terms, but were at last prevailed with by the Earl of *Byconnell* to stand upon their defence. The Town of *Youghall* is surrendered, upon 50 of our Dragoons appearing before it; The manner thus: The Garrison that marched from *Waterford* was conducted as far as *Youghall* by 50 of *Leveson's* Dragoons, under the Command of Captain *Pownall*; who telling the Governor of that place (the same that gave up *Carrikerferus* the last year) the certain Ruine he would bring upon himself, if he thought of holding out, and therefore advising him to surrender; the Governor desired him to expect his Answer till 10 at night, at which time he marched out with 3 Companies of Foot, and gave him possession of the Town, where he found 14 Guns mounted, and two without Carriages, (but neither Powder nor Ball,) 350 Barrels of Oats, 215 Stone of Wool, and several other sorts of Provisions.

Plimouth, August 5. The French Fleet sailed yesterday in the evening from *Lorbey*; But the Gallies, who could not endure the Sea that was then pretty high, continued there till this morning, and then followed their Fleet; which appeared about 5 this morning before our Harbor,

and by Noon was clear of *Pentlee Point*, standing Westward, and 'tis not doubted but they are going having, as we are certainly informed, great number of Men on Board. My Lord *Lansdowne* is returned with divers of the Deputy-Lieutenants from *Torbay*, who, together with the whole Body of the Gentry, shewed a very forward and active Zeal in putting the Country into a very good posture to oppose any attempt the Enemy might make upon them.

Plimouth, August 8. We have advice, that the French Fleet was seen on the 5th instant, in the evening, at *Falmouth*, and on the 6th off of *Mount-Bay*, standing Westward.

Deal, August 9. Last night sailed by the back of *Goodwin* 30 English Men of War, besides Fire-ships, Tenders, under the command of Sir *Ralph Delaval*, came to an Anchor off of *Dover*; and this morning weighed again, and stood to the Westward.

Warrick, August 9. Sir *Richard Haddock*, Sir *Kilgrew* Knt; and Sir *John Ashb*, are appointed Admirals of Their Majesties Fleet.
