Vienna, July 30.

Rince Louis of Baden will part from hence to morrow for Bulgaria. A Polander, who had been several years a Slave in Turkey, is scaped from Sophia to Nissa, and reports, that the Enemy have laid up at Sophia abundance of Provitions, but that they had not there when he came away above 5000 Men, and the general Talk was, that they would only act defensively this year. They write from Belgrade of the 15th, that Count. Afpremost was arrived there with Recruits for his own and other Regiments; I that his Regiment was or-dered to Nissa, and that he was gone himself to Fixillas to command the Imperial Forces that are marching to observe the Enemies Motions. The Guison at Lipps hath lately had a Rencounter with aParts of that of Temesivaer, in which they killed So Turks, and took 6.1 Pritoners, with the lots on-if of 8 killed and 20 wounded on our fide. Basle, July 30. General Souches, who went lately to confer with the Elector of Bavaria, returned on the 25th to his Camp at Schopffen, and came on the 26th to this place; Our Magistrates, upon nofice thereof, would have received him publickly, but be excused it. In the afternoon he rode with some ofhis Officers towards the French Territories on this file the Rhine, and viewed the situation of Hunningen and the neighbouring Country, and returning hither in the evening, repailed the Rhine over our Bridge, and went back to his Camp. We have an account from Rhinfelden, that divers Pieces of Cannon for Battery have been lately brought thither, and other Preparations made for a Siege; from whence, and the Imperial Army's advancing this vin, it's concluded, that the Confederates have a defign upon Hunningen. This is certain, that the French are very much allarmed; and that their Ambassador does earmestly sollicite the Cantons to reinforce the Troops appointed to guard the Passe of Augst, between this City and Rhin.

Fransfore, August 6. The Forces of Lunenburg and Hese, making together about 10000 Men, have passed the Maine here, at Rumpenberm, and Upper Iteinkeim, and march towards the Palatinate to 1914 the Saxon Forces, and so to form a Body on that side, while the Imperial Army, commanded by the Elector of Bavaria, advances towards Humingson. The Landtgrave of Hesse arrived here the 4th initial, and the next day he followed his Troops. The Damphin continues his march foward Alice to

observe the Imperialists; and it's said; that he intends to pass the Rhine at Fort Louis.

From the Brandenburg Camp at Genap, August 6. On the 2d Inftant Prince Waldeck joyned us with 27000 Men at Waveren, where we rested 3 days. And here Mr. John'on, Envoy Extraordinary from England, who had his Quarters in the Castle of Bavette, about an English mile from the Town, made a splendid Entertainment on occasion of His Majesties happy Successes in Ireland. There were five publick Tables prepared; at the first was the Elector, Prince Waldeck, the Prince of Frize-Lind, the Elector's three Brothers, the Envoy, the Resident of Holland, and some Officers of the Ele-Ctor's Court. At the fecond was Duke Schomberg, (who did Honour to the Table as an English Peer) Major-General Talmash, and other General Officers of the Br.indenburg and Holland Armies. At the third, were Officers of the English and Scotch Regiments. At the fourth, the Elector's grand Mulquetiers, who were upon Duty. And at the fifth, his Pages: Which were all ferved with great Plenty, and more exactness than could be expected in a Camp. The Elector had ordered 9 Field-Pieces to be brought to the top of the Hill, which were dif-charged at every Hcalth. In the middle of the Entertainment came a Trumpet from the Duke of Maine, to defire a Pais for fome Horses; His Electoral Highness ordered him to be called in, and bid him at his return acquaint the Duke, that he found us rejoycing for the great Victory which the King of England had gained in Ireland. In the Evening we had a great Bonfire, which made a good appearance from the top of the Hill. We shall stay here to morrow, and march the day following towards the

Cologne, August 11. The French Troops under the Command of the Count de Tiss, have made an Incursion into the Country of Juliers, where on Monday night last they burnt 1.4 Villages, and afterwards advanced to Cornelis Munster, and obliged the Magistrates of Aix la Chapelle, (in which place there is no Carison at present) to send Deputies thither to agree with them about their Contributions. The Generals of the Neubowg and Munster Forces sent a strong Detachement of Horse in pursuit of the Enemy, but they came too late. The Letters from the Palatinate of the 8 instant tell us, that the Imperial Army was still encamped near Durlack, whither the Landtgrave of Historial, the Velt-Mareschal Chauvet, and the Count de Lippe, went that day from Historials to confer with the Electors of Bavaria and Saxing, and other Princes, who were to be present at this Conference; after which, twas believed the Army would decamp and march towards the Black Forest. That the Troops of Limenburg and Hisse were going to pass the Neckar, in order to joyn the Saxons, who were encamped at Eppenheim; And that the French Army continued on this lide the Rhine, moving towards Straining. near Hall. The Marquis de Gastanoga went last night to visit the Elector of Brandenburg, and this day will be held a great Council of War. Our Armies, which couse t together of above 60000 Men, will march to morrow by the way of Felig and Efcuffines, and fo by Mons, towards the Enemy; who are removed from Quevrain and Bavay nearer to Maubeuge, their right Wing reaching to a place called Omont, where they have been reinforced by the Troops that were posted at Pottes and Canaff, as likewife by the Forces commanded by the Marquis de Boujsters, so that their Army is said to be now 40000 itrong. The Letters from Germany tell us, that the Imperial Army marched towards Fribing and Hunningen, and the French towards Fore Louis; and that the Elector of Saxony with his own Forces, and those of Lunenburg and Heffe, was going to encamp near Bruchfal.
