Sunken Rock Westward of Cape Palmas.

INFORMATION has been received from the Commander-in-Chief on the Cape of Good Hope Station that Commander Annesley, H.M.S. "Icarus," has reported that there is a rock in the approach to the anchorage westward of Cape Palmas :-

. This rock (Congo Rock) is of small extent and pyramidal in shape, having a depth of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  fathoms on it, with 5 fathoms close around, and 7 fathoms a quarter of a cable off. It is situated with Cape Palmas Lighthouse bearing S. 65° E., distant 114 cables.

Position, lat. 4° 22′ 15" N., long. 7° 45′ 25" W. Also, a can buoy, painted red, is moored N.W. by N., distant half a cable from this rock.

It is probable that the rock now found is that reported by the African Steam Navigation Company's vessels "Congo" in 1875, and "Volta" in 1879; and which was searched for unsuccessfully by H.M.S. "Firefly" in 1879," though it lies further to the northward than the position given by either of those vessels. It has therefore been named Congo Rock in the Admiralty Charts.
