

"The Guardians shall pay to any Vaccination Officer such salary or remuneration, and such only, as the Local Government Board may direct or approve, whether for ordinary duties or for occasional services; and such salary or remuneration may be increased or reduced as that Board may from time to time direct or approve."

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Order as hereinafter mentioned, so far as regards the said Altrincham Union:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, We hereby Order that with respect to the said Altrincham Union, the above-cited Article shall be amended by the addition of the following proviso:—

Provided that the Guardians, with the approval of the Local Government Board, may pay to any Vaccination Officer a reasonable compensation on account of extraordinary services, or other unforeseen circumstances connected with his duties or the necessities of the said Union.

THE Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice, that the following Regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, viz:—

SPECIAL REGULATIONS (Supplementary to the General Regulations issued 8th April, 1872, and amended by subsequent notices in the London Gazette), respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Assistant to the Lecturers on Chemistry, Heat, and Electricity at the Royal Artillery College.

N.B.—*These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.*

I. The limits of age for this situation are 25 and 30, and Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of the Competitive Examination.

II. The Competitive Examination will be in the following subjects, viz:—

1. Chemistry and Heat.

[Skill in the preparation of apparatus, gases, explosives, and compounds required for lectures, and the assistance of students at practical work in the laboratory.]

2. Electricity.

[Skill in the preparation of Batteries, and setting up of apparatus required for lectures, and the assistance of students at practical work.]

3. Metallurgy, Steam, Mechanism, Hydraulics.

[Sufficient knowledge for the arrangement of diagrams, specimens, and models required for lectures.]

* * No Candidate will be eligible who fails to satisfy the Commissioners in any of these subjects.

III. No Candidate can be admitted to the Competitive Examination who has not previously satisfied the Civil Service Commissioners that he

possesses the requisite amount of proficiency in the following subjects:—

1. Handwriting.
2. Orthography.
3. Arithmetic (to Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.)

With this view, Preliminary Examinations in these subjects will be held at such times and places as the Commissioners may appoint.

IV. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made in the writing of the Candidate, at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Commissioners.

V. A fee will be required from every Candidate attending an Examination, according to the scale laid down under the Order in Council of 22nd March, 1879, by notice in the London Gazette of 29th April, 1881.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held in London, under the foregoing Regulations, on the 24th July, 1888, and following days. A Preliminary Examination will be held in London on the 17th July, 1888. The number of situations to be filled will be the number vacant at the time of the Examination.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, has not received, on or before the 3rd July, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
