WITH reference to the Notification respecting the Passports of travellers crossing into Alsace-Lorraine from France, which appeared in the Gazette of the 1st instant, it is hereby notified that Passports of British Subjects proposing to cross that frontier can be visé at the German Embassy in London on payment of the fee of 10s.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

An Area comprising the whole of the parish of Ledbury, in the county of Hereford.

(SWINE-FEVER.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 22nd day of June, 1888.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),—the yards and the pig-stys and other buildings therein and all other yards and fields and the buildings therein, being the whole of the premises known as Hill Street Farm in the occupation of Robert Dunning, and situate at Holwell, and also the whole of the yards and gardens and other premises, and the pig-stys therein adjacent to Hill Street Farm, in the occupation of Josiah Walden,—which was declared by order of the Sub-Committee of the Local Authority for the Sherborne Division of the county of Dorset on the eleventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, to be a Place infected with swine-fever, is hereby declared to be free from swine-fever, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.
