With reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 28 (2) of 28th January, 1888, on the intended exhibition of an occulting light from the north-east pier head, southern outlet of Sunderland Harbour:-

The Commissioners of the River Wear have given notice, dated 13th August, 1888, that the

light is now exhibited.

The light is an occulting white and red light, with two eclipses every ten seconds, in the following manner: light of seven seconds' duration, an eclipse of one second, then a light of one second duration, followed by an eclipse of one It is visible seaward over an arc of 96° as follows: as a white light, over an arc of 34° 30', northward of Hendon Rock; as a red light, over an arc of 19° 30', marking Hendon Rock; as a white light, over an arc of 15° southward of Hendon Rock; as a red light, over an arc of 15° 30', marking the White Stones; and as a white light, over an arc of 11° 30', southwestward of the White Stones; also visible shoreward as a red light over an arc of 35°. It is elevated 45 feet above high water.

The illuminating apparatus is of the fifth order. Position, lat. 54° 54′ 20″ N., long. 1° 21′ W.

SCOTLAND-EAST COAST.-MONTROSE HARBOUR. (1.) Occasional Beacon Leading Lights on Rossie Island.

INFORMATION has been received from Lieutenant W. J. W. Barnard, R.N., Inspecting Officer of Montrose Coast Guard Division, that leading lights are shown, when vessels are expected to enter the harbour at night, from beacons erected on Rossie Island, Montrose Harbour, River South Esk :-

The lights are green lights.

The beacons, which are iron tripods painted white, are situated at the eastern end of Rossie Island, and bear about W. by N. 1/3 N. and E. by S. \(\frac{1}{3}\) S., distant about 200 yards, from each other. The front beacon is 40 feet high, surmounted by a black ball; the rear beacon, 50 feet high, surmounted by a black triangle.

Note.—These beacons or lights in line, bearing

about W. by N. $\frac{1}{3}$ N., lead up the harbour from the bar, which is being dredged so as to give a depth of 3 feet more than at present to the mooring

buoys off the dock.
