(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 10th day of September, 1888.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1873 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twelfth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

SCHEDULE.

An Area comprising the civil parishes of Buckhorn Weston and Kington Magna, and the portions of the parishes of Gillingham and Silton lying within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at a point in the parish of Gillingham where the north-eastern boundary of the parish of Kington Magna adjoining Gillingham terminates, along the Gillingham parish boundary to the river Stour, along the river direct to Loddon Green Bridge, and continuing by the river to Loddon Bridge, then along the south-western and western fences as the case may be of the main-road commencing at Loddon Bridge through High-street, Gillingham, Peacemarsh, and Milton, and along Martin's-lane, passing Bagmore Farm and Fitz Farm to the boundary of the parish of Silton near Bourton Bridge, along the north-west boundary of Silton to the county boundary, and along the county boundary to the north-east boundary of the parish of Buckhorn Weston; the whole Area being situate in the parishes of Buckhorn Weston, Gillingham, Kington Magna, and Silton, in the county of Dorset.
