Warsaw, August 13.

They write from Lemberg of the 4th instant, That they had advice of the march of a Body of Tartars under the Command of Sultan Galga, to joyn with Count Teckley, who is declared by the Port, at the Solicitation of the French Ambassador, Prince of Transylvania: And that the Grand Signior had likewise sent orders to the Hospodar of Moldavia to assist him. The Forces of this Crown are ordered to Rendezvous at *Bar*; but they march very slowly.

Vienna, Aug. 17. The last Advices from *Bulgaria* say, That the Grand Visier was on his march from *Sophia* with a design to attack *Nissa*; and that another Body made up of Turks and Tartars was marched towards *Hirschbain*, either to relieve *Temeswar* or *Waradin*, or (which is most likely) to invade *Transylvania*. But the Imperial Forces were in a good Condition to receive the Enemy. Our Main Army which is to be Commanded by Prince *Louis of Baden*, had its Rendezvous at *Jagodina*, while the Count *de Trautmanstorf* was marched with the Forces under his Orders. *Nissa* and *Widin* are very well provided with all things necessary for their Defence. And General *Hewler* is strongly encamped on the Frontiers of *Transylvania*, at the Pass of *Bosau*; from whence he had sent the Marquis *Tay of Wemmell*, with a Detachment of Horse and Dragoons to secure the Pass of *Vereforne*, 5 Miles from *Hermanstadt*. We have an account from *Poland*, That Sultan *Galga* having relieved the Garrison of *Caminiec*, received Orders to march into *Valachia*, and joyn *Teckley*, in order to support his Pretensions to the Principality of *Transylvania*.

From the Imperial Camp near Hendsheym, August 21. On the 18th instant we passed the *Necker*, and encamp't at this place, about an hour from *Heydelberg*, with intention to continue our march the next day towards *Mentz*; On the 19th, the Elector of *Bavaria* was informed by an Express from the Elector of *Saxony*, who lay with his own Forces, and a Detachment of Imperialists, Commanded by General *Dumwaldt* at *Bretten*, not far from *Philipsburg*, to cover the *Palatinate*, that the Dauphin with the whole French Army had passed the *Rhine*, and moved towards *Durlach*; whereupon Orders were given for stopping our march, and his Electoral Highness of *Bavaria* writ to the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, who had passed the *Main* with the *Hessian* and *Lunenburg* Forces in their way towards *Mentz*; to give him notice thereof,

and to desire he would likewise stop his march till they had a farther account of the Enemies Motions. On the 20th, a Detachment of 1000 Horse was sent out under the Command of Major General *de la Tour* towards *Gerspaeterbad*. This day arrived here an Officer from General *Dumwaldt* with the Confirmation of the Dauphins having passed the *Rhine* at *Fort Louis*, and that he had his head Quarters at *Stolboven*; upon which we are going to decamp, and to march back towards *Bruchsal* in order to joyn with the Elector of *Saxony*, and endeavour to engage the Enemy to a Battle. A Party of *Bavarians* meeting one of the Enemies two days ago, killed 25 of them, and brought in 3 Prisoners.

Heydelberg, August 22. Yesterday in the Evening the Imperial and *Bavarian* Foot with the Artillery repassed the *Neckar* near this City, and the Horse at *Webbelingen*; and this Morning the whole Army is marched to joyn the Elector of *Saxony*, who is encamp't near *Bruchsal*. The French Army has passed the *Rhin* at *Fort Louis*, and the Dauphin's head Quarters is at *Stolboven*. The Deserters say, the Enemy are about 40000 strong.

Francfort, August 24. The Imperial and *Bavarian* Forces which had passed the *Necker*, and were encamp't at *Hendelsheim*, are upon the news of the French Armies having passed the *Rhin* at *Fort Louis*, marched back to meet and fight the Enemy. The *Lunenburgers* and *Hessians* lie between this place and *Mentz*, where they will continue till farther Orders; The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel* having his head quarters at *Hochst*. On the 21st the Elector of *Mentz*, who has been some time at *Aschaffenburg*, passed by this City with two Yachts, going to *Mentz* the place of his usual Residence. He was Complemented by the Deputies of this City, and Saluted with a discharge of all our Cannon.

Cologne, August 25. The Letters from the *Palatinate* of the 22d tell us, That the Elector of *Bavaria* upon advice of the Dauphins having passed the *Rhine* on the 15th, 16th, and 17th instant, was marched back to joyn the Elector of *Saxony*, who was encamp'd the 22d at *Bretten*, and that General *Dumewalt* had possessed himself of a Bridge, and a very advantageous Post towards *Durlach*. The Forces of *Lunenburg* and *Hesse* lie between *Francfore* and *Mentz*; and those of *Munster*, *Paderborne* and *Neuburg* at *Enskirken* in the Country of *Juliers*.

Liege, August 20. The Forces of *Liege*, which are come back from *Brabant*, repassed the *Meuse* the 18th instant, and are now encamp'd between *Chenoy* and *Soumange*. We are told, That they will joyn with those of *Neubourg* and *Munster*, which lie at present in the Country of *Juliers*. The Elector of *Brandenburg* sends likewise some Regiments to joyn them.

Hamburg

Hamburg, August 25. Of the 21st instant two Suedish Regiments, one of Horse, and another of Foot, passed through *Magdeburg* in their march towards the *Rhine*; and we hear, That the rest of the Suedish Troops that are to joyn the Confederate Army are arrived in the Neighbourhood of *Minden*.

Brussels, Aug. 27. Our Army continues near *Hall*. The Duke of *Luxemburg* is encamped at *Ligny*, between *Aeth* and *Tornay*. And the Marquis de *Boufflers* is gone back with 10000 Men towards the *Meuse*. The Letters from *Herzberg* of the 22d tell us, That the *Dauphin* had passed the *Rhine* at *Fort Louis*, and was encamp'd in the Country of *Baden Durlach*, from whence he intended to march towards the Elector of *Saxony*, who lay at *Batten*, not far from *Bushfal*. And that the Elector of *Bavaria* had upon advice thereof, repass'd the *Neckar* with the Imperial Army, and was marching to joyn the Elector of *Saxony*, after which they would advance towards the Enemy; so that we are in expectation of a Battle.

Hague, August 29. According to the Letters from *Flanders* of the 26th, the Confederate Armies continued in their Camp near *Hall*. One of our Parties had brought in a French Lieutenant and 15 Troopers, whom they took within half an hours march of the Enemies Camp. The Advices from *Germany* tell us, That the Elector of *Bavaria* understanding that the *Dauphin* had passed the *Rhine* at *Fort Louis*, after having reinforced his Army with the Garisons of *Brissac*, *Strasbourg*, *Fribourg*, &c. he had repass'd the *Neckar* with the Imperial Army, and was marching to joyn the Elector of *Saxony*, who had with him 52 Squadrons and 20 Battalions. But the Landgrave of *Hesse*, with his own Troops, and those of *Luxemburg*, making 12000 Men, continued his march down the *Rhine* in order to joyn between that River and the *Meuse* with the Forces of *Munster*, *Neuburg* and *Liege*, and a Detachment of *Brandenburgers*, who together would make an Army of above 30000, and would act towards *Luxemburg* and *Triers*, which Country is at present only covered by the Forces Commanded by the Count de *la Tefle*, which are not above 4 or 5000 Men. The President de *la Trave*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Saxony*, will have his Audience of the States General in a day or two. The Letters from *Paris* say, That the Nephew of Monsieur *Catinat* was arrived there with the news of an Action between the Duke of *Saxony* Army, and that Commanded by Monsieur *Catinat*, in which they pretend the latter had the advantage, and remained Master of the place of *Ficht*, though the number of the *Spain* was almost equal on both sides; but considering how grossly the French impose upon the World in the Relations of their publick News, we have reason to suspend the giving Credit to this, till it comes from his suspected Hands.

Edinburg, August 21. This day we have Advice from the North, That the Highland Rebels, after having plundered several places

in the Shires of *Argus* and *Mairnes*, were upon the approach of Their Majesties Forces, retired towards *the Sea*, whence they came, and that Major General *Mitchell* followed them, being joyned by the Master of *Forbes*, and Colonel *Cunningham*, with the Troops under their Command.

Chesler, August 25. By a Letter of the 16th, from the Camp before *L. 1014*, we are told, That our Troops had attack'd the Enemy in their Out-Works, which in half an hours time they made themselves Masters of, killing about Eighty of them. They add, That Lieutenant General *Gingie* was with 1000 Horse and 600 Dragoons, in pursuit of a strong Party of the Enemies, of whom they hourly expected to have a good account.

Portsmouth, August 26. A Dutch Caper has brought in a Prize, the Master whereof says, he saw the French Fleet about 12 days ago off of *Tshant*.

Denle, August 26. Yesterday about three in the Afternoon, Admiral *Killigrew* arrived in the Downs with the Ships from *Primsouth*; He went immediately on Board the *Revel Sovereign*, and the English Men of War that came with him joyned Their Majesties Fleet, which was then under Sail and stood to the Westward.
