A T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 27th day of October, 1888.

#### By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Moet Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Place (namely),—comprising all that part of the Duchally Estate, including Duchally Hill, bounded on the north by the road leading from Auchterarder to Glendevon-road, in the parish of Blackford and county of Perth, in the occupation of Mr. John M. Cairns,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twenty-fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-eighth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Mest Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The limits of the following Areas in the counties of Dorset and Somerset which are declared by Orders of Council to be Areas infected with pleuro-pneumonia (namely),-(1.) the whole of the parish of Bourton, in the county of Dorset, (2.) round Arthurs Bridge Farm, in the parish of Lamyat, in the county of Somerset, comprised within the following boundary, that is to say, from the corner of Evercreech-road through Cuttern-lane to Mr. Perry's and Mr. Welsh's Farms both wholly within the Area, thence to Lamyat crossing through land in the occupation of Mr. Norman, and thence by Brutonroad to Waddon Farm across a field called Mashstone, thence across Simsfield to Looks Orchard and Barber's field, thence by the brook to Long Hill Farm wholly within the Area, thence across Hill's fields to Owley Farm both within the Area, and thence by Evercreech-road to Cuttern-lane aforesaid, (3.) at Ansford, in the county of Somerset, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at the Bridge of the Somerset and Dorset Railway near Cole Station and following the north-westerly fence of the road from Cole Station to Hadspen Village, from Hadspen Village by Hadspen Farm to Cary Hill Gate, thence by the northerly-fence of the road to Smallways, thence by the easterly fence of the road by the Wheatsheaf Inn to South Cary, thence by the north-easterly fence of South Carylane to Bonford's Cross, thence by the north-
