Rome, August 5.

**T**HE Inquisition has of late met very frequently to suppress the Opinions of the *Quiesisti*, which spread every day more and more; some Persons accused thereof, they have Condemned to the Gallies, and others to Fine and Imprisonment; and Signior *Arcani*, Nephew to the Cardinal *d'Albici*, and the Marquis *de Buffalo* have been likewise taken up on this account. The French Ambassador, with the Cardinals of his Faction labour very earnestly to accommodate Matters between this Court and France, but hitherto there appears no great Fruit of their Negotiation. The Chief obstacle that still remains seems to be about the French Clergies revoking the Four Propositions, which the Pope insists upon, and they are as unwilling to comply with; and hitherto none of the Expedients proposed by those that most zealously endeavor this Accommodation have Succeeded. However the French still promise themselves an Adjustment of this Affair, from the Credit the Cardinal of *Fourbin* is in with the Pope, being assured that he will omit nothing that may contribute thereunto.

**Venice, August 11.** The Master of a Vessel, which arrived here this Week from *Smirna*, reports, That he saw the Turkish Fleet, divided in two Squadrons, off of *Canea*, and that he heard they designed to attempt the Relief of *Napoli di Malcastia*. The last Letters from our Fleet tell us, That the Forces of the Republick continued to keep that place very closely blockt up both by Sea and Land; and that the Garrison, the better to manage their Provisions, had put out of the Town 150 Women and others unfit for Service, but that the Venetians would not suffer them to pass, so that those poor Wretches lay perishing under the Walls of the Town. We have an account from *Cyprus*, That above 1500 of the Inhabitants of that Island were in Arms against the Turks, and that they were Headed by one who had been formerly Governor there for the Port.

**Genova, August 15.** On the 2d instant arrived here the English and Dutch Convoys from *Cadix*. The Great Master of the Teutonic Order came with them from *Alicant*, intending to return for *Germany* by the way of *Milim* and *Suifferland*.

From the Imperial Camp near *Widin*, July 27. The Count *de Trautmanstorf*, who lay encamp-

ed near the *Danube*, with about 12 or 14000 Men, being informed that the Turks were come with 60 Armed Saques, and four Gallies before *Widin*, and had begun to play their Cannon upon it, he decamped the 25th with all his Forces, and arrived here the next day, and having viewed the place, and the posture the Enemy were in, he put Six Hundred Foot into several small Boats to alarm the Enemy, and attack them if they saw an opportunity, and the night following ordered six pieces of Cannon to be planted on the Shore, which played so successfully upon the Enemy, that they cut their Cables, and fell down the River in great disorder. We shall march from hence to morrow or next day to joyn the rest of the Imperial Forces which are drawing together at *Fagedina*. *Teckeley* is in *Valachia* with a small Body of Turks and Tartars, and seems to intend an Incurtion into *Transilvania*. But General *Heusser* who Commands there, has so posted his Troops that 'tis not doubted but he will prevent it.

**Vienna, August 17.** The News of the Count *de Trautmanstorf's* having forced the Turks to retire from before *Widin*, and of his marching afterwards with the Forces under his Command to the General Rendezvous of the Imperial Army near *Fagedina*, is confirmed by the Letters of the 6th instant from *Nissa*, which add, That General *Weserani* (who has the chief Command of the Emperors Forces on that side, till Prince *Louis* of *Baden* arrives) had received advice from the Governor of *Petro*, That the Grand Visier was on his march from *Sophia*, and that 'twas given out he would attack *Nissa*; but that his Army was composed of new unexperienc'd Troops, and had not with them Artillery fit for such an Attempt. The Turks seem likewise resolv'd to make an Effort in order to Establish *Teckeley* in the Principality of *Transilvania*; to which end, they have sent Orders to Sultan *Galgas*, who Commands a strong party of Tartars, and to the Hospodars of *Moldavia* and *Valachia* to assist him; and our last advices from those parts said, That *Teckeley* was marching with a Body of Turks and Tartars towards the Frontiers of *Transilvania*, and had Published a Declaration of his Pretensions to that Principality. But we hear at the same time, That the States thereof had in a General Assembly, not only unanimously rejected them, but had also resolv'd firmly to adhere to the Interests of the Empe<sup>r</sup>

Engagement this morning Prince Saxe was De-  
 feated Prince Eugene and his army to preserve  
 the Treaty by which they had been promised  
 a certain Imperial Assistance. And  
 notwithstanding their great Victories, and the  
 great success of their designs of the Empire. Ge-  
 neral Saxe is now arrived with the Imperial  
 Regiments, under his Command at Weissen  
 Brunn, where on the 10th of the last Month he was  
 met by the Duke of Savoy. We hear from Paris  
 that the Duke of Savoy upon the Instance made  
 by the late Duke of Lorraine some time  
 before his Death, and that promised by the  
 Emperor Dowager on behalf of the present  
 Duke her Son, have resolved not to make any  
 Peace or Treaty with France without including  
 him therein, and obtaining a full Restitution of  
 the Duchy of Lorraine, as being an essential  
 Member of the Empire.

*Strasbourg, August 19.* This Week arrived  
 here two Regiments from the Camp Comman-  
 ded by Monsieur Buffers, who were ordered  
 to Harringer, in case the Elector of Bavarria had  
 continued his march that way; but now they  
 are to return towards the Moselle. The Duke  
 having ordered all the French Garisons on  
 this side to reinforce his Army, passed the Rhine  
 the 13th, 14th and 15th Instant at Fort Louis,  
 and is now encamped in the Marquisate of  
 Baden.

*Frankfort, August 24.* The last account we  
 had from the Palatinate was, That the Elector  
 of Bavarria had repulsed the Army with the  
 Imperial Army, and was marching to join the  
 Elector of Saxony near Brunsfel. And that the  
 French Army lay near Seltzen. We are told  
 from *Reims*, that the Electoral Prince Pa-  
 latin passed through that City the 15th Instant  
 in his Journey towards Vienna. It's said, a  
 Marriage is treating between him and the  
 Princess of Bavarria. The Landgrave of Hesse  
 and the Baron de Chocart, General of the Lun-  
 denburg Forces have their head Quarters at  
*Hroft*, about two hours march from Mainz.

*Boston, May 21.* This serves to give you an account of  
 the good Success of our late Expedition to Fort Royal, in  
 Nova Scotia, where the French lay in Garrison. We were  
 about 7 or 800 strong, under the Command of Sir William  
 Phips, having with us 6 or 7 Ships, and arrived about a  
 Month since before the said Fort. Sir William Phips sent a  
 Summons to the Garrison to Surrender the Fort to Their Ma-  
 jesties King William and Queen Mary, and offer some  
 Parley, they refused to submit, their Lives being promised  
 them, but with this express Condition, that they should not  
 carry any thing away; but before our Men came ashore,  
 they broke up their Stores, and conveyed away many  
 Things, and having thus broken the Articles on their part,  
 our Commander caused them to be secured, and about 70  
 of them are this day brought Prisoners hither; and Sir  
 William and all his Men, except two that died of the Small  
 Pox, are safely returned home. The Planters all about  
 Fort Royal came in afterwards and took the Oath of Alle-  
 giance to Their Majesties. We are now preparing for an  
 other Expedition to Canada, with 4 or 5000 English and  
 Indians, having had notice, that the great Magazine the  
 French had at Mont Royal, is by some accident blown up,  
 and that they are very much distressed for want of Food.

*Edinburg, August 23.* The Letters  
 from the North say, That Major Gene-  
 ral Mackay having put a sufficient Garrison  
 into Aberdeen, was gone with the Forces  
 under his Command after the Highland

Rebels, who were retired towards De-  
 line, and that he was come within Eight  
 Miles of them, and endeavoured to cut  
 off their Retreat to the Hills.

*Amsterdam, August 20.* A Dutch Caper has  
 brought in a Prize, which came from the River  
 of Limosine the 17th Instant, the Master says,  
 That the French left Limosine the beginning  
 of this Month, with intention to quit that  
 Kingdom, giving their Affairs there for lost,  
 and retired to Galway as a more convenient  
 Port to embark at; and that at the same time  
 their Six Men of War, of which they had a great  
 Number, were put on Board the French Men  
 of War and Privateers, which were then at  
 Limosine, to the number of about Twenty five,  
 all small Ships; but knows not whether they  
 went from thence to Brest, or Galway, where  
 the French expected more Ships to carry them  
 off. As to the Siege of Limosine, he says, That  
 when he came away the Batteries were raised  
 against the Town.

*Perth, August 29.* Their Majesties Fleet  
 came yesterday in the Evening to an Anchor  
 at Six end, and having taken on Board the  
 Land Forces that he ready here to Embark, and  
 which will be all Ships to-morrow. Comman-  
 ded by the Earl of Marlborough, Lieutenant Ge-  
 neral of Their Majesties Forces, will Sail to-  
 morrow with the first fair Wind.

*Duis, August 29.* This day Vice Admiral  
*Almonde* sailed out of the Downs with the  
 Dutch Men of War that came lately from *Pün-  
 muth*, to join the Fleet.
