

Bremen and the young Prince-Son to the Dr-
essing Prince-Albert, and singularity to observe
the French, by whom the last mentioned
is now the Imperial Maximilian Polytechnic, And
to observe their most gaudy Extravagances, and to
see them again to the Knights of the Empire. Ge-
neral Blücher is now arrived from the Upper
and Lower Rhine. He is an Commander of the Duke of
Burgundy, one of the best and best known Generals
in the Army of Holland. We hear from Paris
now, That the Duke upon the Incursions made
by the English Duke of Lancast. some time
ago into the Dutch, and those performed by the
Emperor Bonaparte on behalf of the present
Duke has been, have resolved not to make any
More of France with France without including
him therein, and according a full Restoration of
the Dukedom of Lancast., as being an ancient
Member of the Empire.

Straßburg, Augt 21. This Week arrived
here two Battalions from the Camp Command-
ed by Major-General Büffet, who were ordered
to Bâle, in case the Elector of Bavaria had
continued his march that way; but now they
are to return towards the Moësa. The Duke, having
captured all the French Garrisons on
this side to reinforce his Army, passed the Prince
the 13th, 14th and 15th instant at Fort Louis,
and is now encamped in the Margravate of
Bâle.

Frankfort, Augt 24. The last account we
had from the Palatinate was, That the Elector
of Bavaria had repassed the Moësa with the
Imperial Army, and was marching to join the
Elector of Saxony near Brüssel. And that the
French Army lay near Stollerten. We are told
from Ratisbonne, that the Electoral Prince Pa-
latin passed through that City the 15th instant
in his Journey towards Nîmes. It's said, a
Marriage is treating between him and the
Prince of Baretz. The Landgrave of Hesse,
and the Baron de Chavas, General of the Lu-
neburg Forces have their head Quarters at
Freib., about two hours march from hence.

Edimburg, May 31. The forces to give you an account of
the said Expedition of our late Expedition to Fort Royal, in
Nouva-Jesua, where the French lay in Garrison. We were
about 7 or 800 strong, under the Command of Sir William
Phipps, having with us 2 or 3 Ships, and arrived about a
Month since before the said Fort. Sir William Phipps sent a
Summons to the Garrison to Surrender the Fort to Their Ma-
jesties King William and Queen Mary, and after some
Parley, they refused to submit, their Lives being promised
them, but with this strict Condition, that they should not
carry any thing away; but before our Men came ashore,
they broke up their Stores, and conveyed away many
Things, and having thus broken the Articles on their part,
our Commander caused them to be secured, and about 70
of them are this day brought Prisoners hither; and Sir
William and all his Men, except two that died of the Small
Pox, are safely returned home. The Planters all about
Fort Royal came in afterwards and took the Oath of Alleg-
iance to Their Majesties. We are now preparing for an
other Expedition to Canada, with 4 or 5000 English and
Indians; having had notice, that the great Magazine the
French had at Mart-Royal, is by some accident blown up,
and that they are very much distressed for want of Food.

Edinburg, August 23. The Letters
from the North say, That Major Gene-
ral Mackay having put a sufficient Garison
into Aberdeen, was gone with the Forces
under his Command after the Highland

Rebels, who were retired towards Di-
sire, and that he was come within Eight
Miles of them, and endeavoured to cut
off their Retreat to the Hills.

Edinburg, Augt 27. A Dutch Caper has
brought in a Prize, which came from the River
of Lissabon the 1st instant, the Master says,
That the French left Lissabon the beginning
of this Month, with intention to quit that
Kingdom, giving their Affairs there for lost,
and retired to Galway as a more convenient
Port to embark at, and that at the same time
their Sick Men, of which they had a great
Number, were put on Board the French Men
of War and Provincials, which were then at
Lissabon, to the number of about Twenty five,
all small Ships; but knows not whether they
went from thence to France, or Cadiz, where
the French expected from Ships to carry them
off. As to the Siege of Limerick, he says, That
when he came away the Batteries were raised
against the Town.

Pertham, Augt 29. Their Majesties Fleet
came yesterday in the Evening to an Anchor
at Spithead, and having taken on Board the
Land Forces that lie ready here to Embark, and
which will be all Ship'd to-morrow. Comman-
ded by the Earl of Marlborough, Lieutenant Gen-
eral of Their Majesties Forces, will Sail again
with the first fair Wind.

Dover, Augt 29. This day Vice Admiral
Almonde sailed out of the Downs with the
Dutch Men of War that came lately from Pi-
rmouth, to join the Fleet.
