Rome, August 19.

THE Ambassador of Malta has had Audience of the Pope, to acquaint him with the Death of Don Gregorio de Caraffa, (Brother to the Cardinal of that Name) Great Master of that Order; and the Election of his Successor, the Chevalier de Vignacourt. On Thursday last died Cardinal Cavalieri in the Forty Second year of his Age, and the Fourth of his Cardinal-ship, by whose Death a Second place is become void in the Colledge of Cardinals. We are expecting the return of the Express that was lately sent to the French Court with a new project of an Accommodation, and that with the more impatience, because several private Letters from Paris say, the French King did altogether dislike it, and wondered his Ambassador the Duke of Chauines would consent to it; so that this may afford matter of fresh Differences between the two Courts. The Princes of Italy seem to take very much to heart the Invasion of the Dukedom of Savoy by the French, and it's believed they will enter into Engagements for their common safety.

Milan, August 23. Our Governor has upon the News of the late battle between the Duke of Savoy and Monsieur Catinat, ordered 4000 Men of the Forces of the Milaneze, to march forthwith to joyn the Dukes Army, which lies at present near Carmagnole; and the Succors from Germany are daily expected. They write from Turin, That the Marquis de Boglio, Colonel of the Regiment of Savoy, the Count de San Felice, Lieutenant Colonel of the Red Dragoons, the Chevalier Grimaldi, and the Marquis de la Pierra, were killed; and the Prince Eugene of Savoy, Don Giuseppe d'Arza, General of the Spanish Horse, the Marquis di Parella, Lieutenant General of the Foot, and Don Giuseppe Guidici, Commissary General of the Neapolitan Horse, were wounded in that Action.

Venice, August 25. A Regiment of German Foot was Ship'd the 18 instant at the Lido, and parted from hence with the last Convoy for the Morea. The Advices from Dalmatia say, That the Plague rages very much in Bosnia, and the other Turkish Territories on that side; but that our Frontier places continue very clear of it. However, all Vessels that come from Dalmatia are obliged to perform a very strict Quarantine.

Warsaw, August 18. The Forces of this Crown are drawing together at Barritz; whither the Palatine of Kiovia is

marching with the Train of Artillery; and we are told, that the whole Army will be in the Field by the end of this Month. Our Frontiers have of late been very quiet, the Tartars who were encamped near Caminiec, being march'd towards Valachia to assist Tischeley, whom the Turks have declared Prince of Transylvania. The Hospodars of Moldavia and Valachia have by the Command of the Port, sent likewise some Troops to his Assistance; in order to the Establishing him in that Principality. The Bishop of Posnia continues his preparations for his extraordinary Embassy to the Emperor, but the time of his setting out will not be fixt till we hear farther from Vienna. The Moscovites lie at present very still; The last Advices from Moscow do not speak of any Preparations they have made this Summer for the War; but say, they design to have a great Army in the Field again the next Year.

Vienna, August 27. We have not heard from Bulgaria since the account we had of the Grand Vissiers being come with the Turkish Army before Nissa, and that Prince Louis of Baden was gathering together all the Imperial Forces, with a Resolution to march towards the Enemy, so soon as he saw where they fixed their design; for some are of opinion that it is not upon Nissa, seeing when the last Letters came away, they had not yet opened their Trenches, or made any attack upon the place, though they had been several days before it.

Ratisbonne, August 27. The Conclusion of the three Colledges of the Dyet, upon the Memorials presented by the Minister of Lorraine, (of which mention has been already made) is in Substance as follows. The States of the Empire have resolv'd that they will heartily Espouse the Interests of the Duke of Lorraine; and take upon them to obtain the full Restitution of that Dutchy, and whatever belongs thereunto, with all farther reasonable Satisfaction to the present Duke of Lorraine; and that when a Treaty shall be set on Foot, his Ministers shall be admitted thereunto, and to that end the necessary Passports procured for them.

Hamburg, September 5. The 12 Suedes Men of War were according to our last advice

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vice still at *Musfrans* expecting farther Orders. Our Convoy from the *Mediterranean* arrived here the last Week.

Edinburgh, September 4. The Parliament met yesterday, and the new Members took the Oaths and Signed the Declaration. This day an Act was brought in declaring it a capital Crime to rob or stop the common Pacquet or an Express. Then a Committee was appointed to prepare several Matters, and the House Adjourned till *Monday* next. Major General *Mackay* was by our last Letters from the North at *Inverness*, having sent out several parties to suppress the Rebels who have committed great Depredations in the County of *Murray*.

Pembroke, Aug. 29. On *Wednesday* last between 9 and 10 at night here happened a strange sort of a trembling in our Houses, the Glass Windows visibly shaking, which lasted some Minutes. And about 12 at Night was felt another Trembling somewhat more violent than the first; it was felt likewise in several places in the Country 10 Miles distant; but we hear of no hurt is done; and know not whether it was the effects of an Earthquake, or the Concussion of the Air.

Ile of Wight, Septemb. 8. Last Night came into *Coxs Road* a small Vessel from *Nevis*; whence she parted on the 23d of *July*. The Master says, That the English had made themselves Masters of the Island of *St. Christopher*, having taken the Fort which the French retired into upon the first Landing of our Forces. And that he saw a Hoop full of French, who came out of the said Fort, and were by their Articles to go to *Martinico*. He adds, That the English had likewise reduced the Fort on the Island of *Stati*.

Southampton, September 8. We have an account by a small Vessel come from *Guernsey*, that two of our Privateers fell in lately with 12 French Merchant Ships who were going from *St. Maloes*, under the Convoy of a Frigate of 12 Guns, that they took 4 of them, and forced the rest ashore about *Cherbourg*, where they were all Shipwrackt, (except the said Frigate) and most of the Men drowned.

Westminster, Sept. 8. This day the Parliament met in pursuance of the last Prorogation. The House of Peers Adjourned till *Friday*, and the Commons till *Thursday* next.

Whitehal, September 10. His Majesty having thought fit by reason of the ill weather to withdraw his Forces from before *Limerick*, the Cannon and heavy Baggage were sent away on the 30th past; and the next day the Army decamped, and marched off in very good order, and without any Disturbance from the Enemy, towards *Clinnell*; from whence a strong Detachment was ordered towards *Cork* and *Kinsale*. His Majesty having named the Lord Viscount *Sidney*, and *Thomas Coningsby* Esq; to be Lords Justices of *Ireland*, went, accompanied with the Prince of *Denmark*, to *Duncannon Fort*, where they embarked the 5th of this Month in

the Afternoon, and arrived on the 6th towards Evening in *King-Road*, with three Yachts, two Men of War, and some Tenders. His Majesty being come a Shore, lay that Night at *Kings-Wharfen*, not far from *Bristol*. On *Sunday* His Majesty went to *Bath*, and lay the Night following at the Duke of *Beauforts* at *Bathampton*. On *Monday* His Majesty lay at the Duke of *Sarrefets* at *Marleborough*, and last Night at *Windsor*. His Royal Highness the Prince of *Denmark* arrived here yesterday in the Evening. And this day about 4 in the Afternoon His Majesty came to *Kinsington*, attended by the great Officers of the Court, and other Persons of the chiefest Quality, who went to meet him. His Majesty was received in all the places he passed through with most zealous Demonstrations of Duty and Affection, and Joy for his safe and happy Return. And the same were this Evening Universally expressed in *London* and *Westminster*. The great Guns being fired from the Tower, the Streets filled with Bonfires, and the Houses Illuminated, together with Ringing of Bells, and other publick Rejoycings.
