PROCLAMATION

Requiring the Attendance of the Members of both Houses of Parliament on the Second day of October next.

WILLIAM R.

THE King and Queen's most Excellent Majesties having Prorogued the Parliament to Thursday the Second day of October now next coming, with a full Purpose and Resolution to keep to that Time; And being desirous also, for Weighty Considerations, to have then a full Assembly of the Members of Parliament: Their Majesties therefore (with the Advice of their Privy-Council) have thought fit to Declare and Publish, and do hereby declare and Publish Their said Resolution. And also by this Their Proclamation do Require all and every the Peers of this Realm, and all and every the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses of the House of Commons, to give Their Attendance

at Westminster on the said Second day of October next, precisely; Wherein Their Majesties do expect a ready Conformity to this Their Royal Will and Pleasure.

Given at our Court at Whitehall the Twelfth Day of September, 1690. In the Second Year of Our Reign.

Edinburg, September 10. The Parliament hath sat these three last days, and has given Their Majesties a new Subsidy of three Months Cesse on Lands, and have laid a Tax of 12 d. upon every Fire-hearth, Hospitals and such as live upon Charity only excepted. The Parliament will Sit again to morrow, to pass an Act for preventing the Robberies and Depredations of the Highlanders, and then they will be Adjourned till Winter. We have just now received an account from Major-General Mackay, that the design of Bouchan and Canon in going Northward, was to have joyned the Earl of Seaforth, and the rest of the Mackenzies, and to have surpris'd the Garrison of Inverness; But Major-General Mackay pursued them so close, that he hindred their effecting it, and obliged the Earl of Seaforth, with all his Clan and Kindred, to deliver up their Arms, and surrender themselves, who are now in the Garrison of Inverness. In the meantime, the Rebels, commanded by Bouchan and Canon, marched Southward over the Hills, and are come within 18 miles of Sterlin, where the Earl of Drumlanrig was posted with 3000 Foot and Horse, who has received Orders to march towards the Rebels and to attack them, and the Major-General being at the same time in their Rear, we are expecting a very good account of them.

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London, September 9. This morning a Dutch Paper brought in here the following News of Success, which exceeds that of the 27th. The Master says, that before we departed thence, several French Vessels arrested them from the West-Indies with many Passengers, who gave an account, that the English had taken some of the richest Lands, and in all appearance would make themselves Masters of the rest; which had put the French in those Parts under a great Consternation.

Country, September 10. No sooner did we receive the joyful News of His Majesty's late Arrival in this Kingdom, but the Mayor and Aldermen met at the Mayor's Parlor, the usual place of Entertainment upon publick Occasions: at the same time two Troops of Dragoons, of the Lord Fitz-Harding's Regiment, quartered in this City, commanded by Captain Galloway, appeared in the Market-place, and gave several Volleys of Shot. The Mayor and Aldermen treated the Officers and Soldiers, drinking Their Majesties Healths, &c. And the Night ended with Bonfires, ringing of Bells, and all demonstrations of Joy imaginable.

Holland, September 12. On Thursday last, in the morning, the Lord Mayor, with the Court of Aldermen and the Recorder, attended the King at Kingsgrove, humbly to Congratulate His Majesty upon the happy Success of his Arms in Ireland; The wonderful Preservation of his Royal Person amidst the great and many Dangers to which He was exposed; And his safe Return into this Kingdom. After which they likewise waited on the Queen.

In the Afternoon the Lord Bishop of London, with the City Clergy, also attended the King and Queen, to pay their Duty and Congratulation to Their Majesties on this happy Occasion.

And this day the same was performed by the Lieutenanty of London, who attended His Majesty here at Whitehall.
