CEREMONIAL observed on the morning of Saturday, the 13th of April, 1889, at half-past eight o'clock, the Remains of HER LATE ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUCHESS OF CAMBRIDGE, Aunt to HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN, were privately removed from Saint James's Palace to Cambridge Cottage, Kew, which was reached at eleven o'clock.

The Route was by Constitution Hill, Hyde Park, Kensington Road, Hammersmith, Turnham Green (left Road), over Kew Bridge, and thence to Cambridge Cottage, Kew.

On arrival at Cambridge Cottage the Royal Coffin was placed in the Hall, which was arranged with palms, wreaths, and flowers.

The Queen left Windsor Castle at a quarter-past eleven o'clock, and travelled by the South Western Railway to Kew Gardens Station, accompanied by Their Royal Highnesses The Grand Duke o' Hesse, K.G., and The Prince and Princess Henry of Battenberg, and attended by The Lady Churchill, Lady of the Bedchamber-in-Waiting, Honourable Harriet Phipps, Maid of Honour-in-Waiting, The Honourable Lady Biddulph, in attendance upon Her Royal Highness The Princess Particles Princes Determined Biddulph, Compared Biddulph, Sin Herriet Phipps, Compared Highness The Princess Beatrice, Princess Henry of Battenberg, General Right Honourable Sir Henry Ponsonby, G.C.B., Keeper of Her Majesty's Privy Purse, General H. Lynedoch Gardiner, C.B., and Major-General Sir Henry Ewart, K.C.B., the Equerries in Waiting, and Major Sir Fleetwood Edwards, K.C.B., Assistant Keeper of Her Majesty's Privy Purse.

The Queen's Carriages were in waiting to convey Her Majesty to Kew Church, where The Earl of Lathom, The Lord Chamberlain, received and at once conducted Her Majesty to the Seat prepared in the centre of the Church, the air, "O Rest in the Lord," from Mendelssuhn's Elijah, being played on the Organ.

The Queen's Route from Kew Gardens Station to the Church was lined with Troops, furnished by the 3rd Battalion Grenadier Guards, and 1st Battalion Scots Guards, commanded by Colonel Thynne, C.B., and Colonel Gascoigne, respectively, and a Troop of the Royal Horse Guards, commanded by Captain Spicer.

Their Royal Highnesses The Grand Duchess of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, attended by The Lady Adeliza Manners ; The Duchess of Teck with The Princess Victoria Mary of Teck, attended by The Lady Catherine Coke; The Princess of Wales with The Princesses Louise, Victoria, and Maud of Wales, attended by The Dowager Countess of Morton ; and The Duchess of Albany, attended by Miss Heron-Maxwell and Sir Robert Collins, K.C.B., arrived at Kew Church at a quarter to twelve.

Their Royal Highnesses The Grand Duchess of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, The Duchess of Teck, The Princess of Wales, and The Princess Beatrice, Princess Henry of Battenberg, occupied Seats near Her Majesty.

The other Princesses were conducted to Seats prepared for Their Royal Highnesses.

The Royal Family and others in the Procession were shown to seats as they arrived at the Transept by Mr. E. H. Anson and Captain Philips, Gentlemen Ushers in Waiting to Her Majesty, where they remained until the conclusion of the Service.

On arriving at the Door of the Church the Procession was met by The Reverend Edgar Sheppard, Sub-Dean of Her Majesty's Chapels Royal and Domestic Chaplain to Her late Royal Highness, The Very Reverend Randall T. Davidson, The Dean of Windsor, Domestic Chaplain to Her Majesty, and The Reverend W. H. Bliss, Vicar of Kew, with the Choir of Kew Church, who sung the opening sentences of the Burial Service to Croft's Music, as the Procession advanced up the Aisle.

The Hymn " Lead, kindly Light " was then sung.

On arrival at the steps of the Altar, The Royal Coffin was placed on a Dais and the Coronet and Cushion laid thereon, and the Service proceeded.

The part of the Service before The Interment having been read, and a Hymn, "Thy Will be Done," sung, The Queen and The Princess Beatrice placed Wreaths upon The Royal Coffin, which was then borne to the Reredos by the men of the Coldstream Guards, and lowered into the Mausoleum as the Service proceeded.

At the conclusion of the Service, the Hymn, "Now the Labourer's task is o'er," was sung, and The Blessing pronounced, after which The Queen was conducted out of the Church, while Chopin's Funeral March was played on the Organ, and returned to Windsor Castle by the same route as on arrival, before two o'clock.

The Royal Family after visiting the Mausoleum followed, and returned to Cambridge Cottage.

The Service was conducted by The Reverend E. Sheppard, the Lesson being read by The Very Reverend The Dean of Windsor, who also pronounced The Blessing. The Musical portion of the Service was sung by the Choir of Kew Church, under the direction of Mr. Breadmore. Mr. Warner presided at the Organ.

The Marquis of Salisbury, K.G., The Right Honourable H. Matthews, Secretary of State for the Home Department, The Duke of Richmond and Gordon, K.G., Executor of Her late Royal Highness, and many other personal friends of Her late Royal Highness occupied Pews in the Church, as well as large numbers of the Parishioners.

A Guard of Honour of Coldstream Guards was mounted at the Church, under the command of Major The Honourable A. Henniker-Major, the Band playing Chopin's Funeral March as the Procession passed.

The Route from Cambridge Cottage to the Church was lined with Coldstream Guards, who also kept the Ground near the Church, under the command of Colonel Wigram, C.B.

\*\* A Special Service in memory of Her late Royal Highness was held on the previous day, Friday, the 12th of April, in The Chapel Royal, St. James's Palace, at one o'clock, at which The Bishop of London, The Dean, and The Reverend Edgar Sheppard, Domestic Chaplain to Her late Royal Highness, and Sub-Dean of Her Majesty's Chapels Royal, officiated.
