CEREMONIAL observed on the morning of Saturday, the 13th of April, 1889, at half-past eight o'clock, the Remains of HER LATE ROYAL HIGHNESS THE DUCHESS OF CAMBRIDGE, Aunt to HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN, were privately removed from Saint James's Palace to Cambridge Cottage, Kew, which was reached at eleven o'clock.

A Captain's Escort of 2nd Life Guards, under the command of Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel Neeld, accompanied The Hearse, and The Queen's Guard of St. James's Palace turned out as a Guard of Honour as the Procession moved off.

The Route was by Constitution Hill, Hyde Park, Kensington Road, Hammersmith, Turnham Green (left Road), over Kew Bridge, and thence to Cambridge Cottage, Kew.

On arrival at Cambridge Cottage the Royal Coffin was placed in the Hall, which was arranged with palms, wreaths, and flowers.
