

wards at Schuttern; from thence he marched to Ros- zingen and Endingen, at which last place, about 2 Leagues from Fribourg, and 3 from Bruck, he was encamped on the 12th instant, being covered by the River Tois, and a Wood on his Right, and a Moras on his Left. The Electors of Saxony and Bavaria marched after the Enemy with all the diligence possible, and having passed the River Kinzig near Offenau, advanced to the River Lohr, which they have in Front, their Right reaching to Kiback, and their Left to Huggsbof, within 3 hours march of the Enemies Camp.

Cologne, September 19. The Forces of Hesse and Lunenburg, who lately passed the Meuse at Coblenz, and have since been encamped for several days at Meyen, are now advanced to Ummenborg. At the same time the Troops of Munster and Neuburg are to be up from Enskirken, and are marching to join them, and together they will make above 24000 Men. We are told, that a Body of Brandenburgers, Commanded by General Spaen, with some Dutch Troops from Maastricht, are to join with those of Liege, and that they intend to march into the Country of Lunenburg. The 6000 Swedes are arrived on the Rhine; and will join with the Forces of the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel. The Marquis de Boufflers lies with his flying Camp about Artois.

Brussels, September 22. The Confederate Army continues encamped near Wanbeke, not far from the River Dendre. And the Duke of Luxemburg at Lessines. The Elector of Brandenburg has sent a Detachment of 6000 Men towards the Rhin, under the Command of General Spaen, who will join with the Forces of Liege, and march as it's believed, towards the Country of Secunde and Malmedy, while the Forces of Luxemburg, Hesse, Munster and Neuburg give the Enemy a diversion on the Meuse.

Brigue September 22. The States General have put out a new Placat, containing a severe prohibition against the bringing any French Commodities into these Countries. We have advice of the safe arrival of our Ships from East India, in Norway, having been met by the 8 Men of War that were sent out to Convoys them. The Letters from Paris of the 19th tell us, that the Count de Tourville was arrived there from Brest, where, and at their other Ports on the Ocean, they had laid up all their Fleet, except about 25 or 30 of their lightest Ships, some of which had been sent out to favour the Return of the Count de Luxun with the French Troops from Gallway.

From the Camp at Tipperary, September 7. The Army, which is now Commanded by the Count de Solms, is come by short marches to this place, about 20 Miles from Limerick. Lieutenant General Douglas marched this day with several Regiments of Horse and Foot towards the North. Most of the English about Limerick have brought away their Families, Cartel, and Goods; and the Country is so wasted, that the Irish will find it a very difficult thing to subsist this Winter. The Deserters that come daily over to us Report, that the French at Gallevany are in a miserable Condition, having neither Bread nor Money, and say, they are Shipp'd, in order to their Return to France.

From the Camp at Tipperary, September 10. On Monday last Monsieur de la Forest was sent with 600 Horse, 200 Foot, and four pieces of Cannon to Kilmallocke, 13 Miles from hence, in which the Enemy had a Garrison of 200 Men, who submitted upon Condition to march away without their Arms and Baggage. This is a very useful place, for that it intercepts the direct passage between Cork and Limerick.

Edinburg, September 11. Yesterday the Parliament passed the Act for preventing the Depredations and Robberies of the Highlanders, and then Adjourned to the 22d of October next. The Rebels, who we told you in our last had appeared about Sterling, are upon the approach of the Forces Commanded by the Earl of Drumlanrig, fled again to their Holes. This Afternoon we had an account of His Majesties safe and happy Return into England, for which here is great Rejoycing this Night, by ringing of Bells, firing of Guns, Bonfires, and all other imaginable Expressions of Joy.

Plymouth, Sept. 14. This day sailed from hence about 20 Sail of Vessels laden with Stores and Provisions under the Convoys of several Men of War for Ireland.

Deale, September 14. This Morning Lieutenant Admiral Evertzen with 17 Dutch Men of War, besides Fire-ships and Tenders, which had layn some time in the Downs Wind bound, Sailed together with several English

Men of War to the Westward. The Eleven Dutch Men of War that came last from the River, continue in the Downs.

Portsmouth, Sept. 16. Yesterday the Dutch Squadron Commanded by Lieutenant Admiral Evertzen, with three English Men of War, and about 30 other Vessels, came to an Anchor at Spithead. The whole Fleet, both English and Dutch, are now weighing their Anchors, and the Blue Squadron is already under sail.

Dever, September 16. This Morning arrived here the Packet Boat from Newport, the Master whereof gives an account, that about 14 days ago there were forced ashore by a violent Storm, between Boulogne and Dunkin, 30 or 40 French Ships laden with Wine and Brandy, bound for Calais and Dunkin, and that three Men of War (greater Ships) their Convoys, were at the same time driven there between Dunkin and Graveling; that of all the Vessels that came ashore, none got off, and very few of the men were saved.

Whitehall, September 14. The Deputy Lieutenants and Justices of the Peace for the County of Middlesex, attended His Majesty this day with a Congratulatory Address, upon his safe Return, and happy Success in Ireland.
