Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing

Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing

regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—in the township of Pendleton, in the borough of Salford, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north by Smithy Brow in the Pendlebury district, on the west by Swinton Park also in the Pendlebury district, on the south by Claremont House in Claremont-road, in the borough of Salford, and on the east by a line about three hundred yards from the Pendleton Colliery, Whit-lane, also in the borough of Salford,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the sixteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall, as from the

commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-fifth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

**GENERAL ORDER** of the Local Government Board, National Debt Redemption Act, 1859, 52 Vict., Ch. 4.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions in England and Wales named in the Schedule to this Order:—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by Sections 1 and 2 of the National Debt Redemption Act, 1889, it is enacted as follows:—

(1) Every person who is on the sixth day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine a holder of Consolidated Three Per Cent. Stock or Reduced Three Per Cent. Stock shall on that day be paid off by the payment of a principal sum at the rate of one hundred pounds sterling for every one hundred pounds of the capital sums in respect of which the annuities constituting his stock are payable, together with all arrears of those annuities at the rate of three pounds per cent. per annum, including the proportionate part accrued since the last date for the payment of dividends, and thereupon the

said annuities shall cease and be understood to be redeemed.

(2) The payment may be made either by warrant in manner provided by this Act, or at the Bank, or by crediting the stockholder in the books of the Bank with the amount of cash due to him.

It shall be lawful for the Treasury to pay off any holders of Consolidated Three Per Cent. Stock or Reduced Three Per Cent. Stock in advance at any time or times before the sixth day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, with such consideration for the proportionate part of dividend accrued up to the date of payment as may be agreed on between the Treasury and the stockholder, and it shall be lawful for any trustee or other fiduciary holder of stocks by assent signified in the prescribed manner, to accept any offer of such payment, and on such payment the annuities constituting the stock shall cease and be understood to be redeemed. Any such consideration shall be charged on and payable out of the Consolidated Fund in like manner as the dividend in respect of which it is payable, and may be treated by trustees and others as income.

And whereas the Boards of Guardians of the several Unions named in the Schedule to this Order have, in pursuance of Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners, the Poor Law Board, or the Local Government Board, invested moneys in either or both of the above-named Three per Cent. Stocks upon the Trusts mentioned in such Orders;

And whereas it is requisite that provision should be made for the investment of such money or moneys as will be receivable by such Guardians in redemption of the Stock now held by them.

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order, with respect to the Guardians of the Poor of each Union named in the Schedule to this Order, now holding Stock of either or both of the aforesaid descriptions, as follows:—

**ARTICLE I.**—The Guardians shall, within one calendar month of the receipt thereof lay out and invest the moneys received by them as aforesaid in respect of the principal of the said Stock in the purchase of Two and Three-Quarters per Cent. Consolidated Stock, or Local Loans Stock, or Two and a Half per Cent. Stock.

**ARTICLE II.**—Immediately after the investment of such moneys, as required by Article I., the Clerk to the Guardians shall, where more than one Parish is interested, duly and accurately apportion the Stock so purchased amongst the several Parishes entitled to share therein.

**ARTICLE III.**—Within ten days after the investment of such moneys, the Clerk to the Guardians shall transmit to us the Stock Receipt relating to the investment, together with a statement showing the amounts of the Stock so purchased severally belonging to Parishes in the Union.

**ARTICLE IV.**—All the provisions of any Order at present in force with respect to any sum invested in either of the aforesaid Three per Cent. Stocks, and to the dividends thereon, shall continue in force and shall apply to the stock which shall be purchased, in pursuance of this Order with the money received in respect of the principal of such sum and to the dividends on the Stock so purchased.

The "Champion" in March, 1889, steamed along the land from San Sebastian Bay in lat. 53° 10' S., long. 63° 20' W. on the north-east coast, to Sloggett Bay in lat. 55° 0' N., long. 66° 20' W. on the south-east coast. Between San Sebastian and Good Success Bays, natives were seen at most parts of the coast. Some Europeans engaged in gold mining were seen at Nombre Head, about ten miles northward of San Sebastian Bay, where there were several buildings and a flagstaff flying the Argentine flag. Also near Cape Medio some Europeans were found searching for gold.

At Good Success Bay an Argentine Government settlement was found (as mentioned in Notice to Mariners, No. 534 of 1887). At Sloggett Bay, a gold mining company is established.

The coast is visited every three months by an Argentine Government vessel.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, do hereby, subject as hereinafter mentioned, grant to the Incumbent of the vicarage of Saint Michael and All Angels, Belgrave, in the county of Leicester, and in the diocese of Peterborough, and to his successors, Incumbents of the same vicarage, one yearly sum or stipend of two hundred pounds, such yearly sum or stipend to be payable out of the common fund under our control, and to be calculated as from the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and to be receivable in equal half-yearly portions, on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year: Provided always, that the said yearly sum or stipend of two hundred pounds, hereby granted by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to the Incumbent for the time being of the said vicarage of Saint Michael and All Angels, Belgrave, shall be, and be taken to be, in lieu of, and in full substitution for, the yearly sum or stipend of one hundred and twenty pounds, heretofore payable by us (subject to certain conditions as to the employment of an Assistant-Curate) to the Incumbent for the time being of the vicarage of Belgrave, with the chapelry of Birstall annexed, in the said county of Leicester, under the authority of an instrument which was sealed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, on the twenty-sixth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and published in the London Gazette on the fourth day of July, in the same year: And provided also, that if at any time lands, tithes, or other hereditaments sufficient, in our opinion, to produce the said yearly sum or stipend of two hundred pounds, or any part thereof, shall be annexed by us to the said vicarage of Saint Michael and All Angels, Belgrave, in substitution for such yearly sum or stipend, or for such part thereof, our liability for the payment of such yearly sum or stipend, or of such part thereof, as the case may be, shall thereupon and thereafter cease and determine.
