MERSEY CONSERVANCY ACT.

THE Commissioners for the Conservancy of the River Mersey hereby give notice, pursuant to the 9th section of the Act 5 and 6 Victoria, cap. 110, intituled "An Act for better preserving the Navigation of the River Mersey," that they have received from Mr. William Owen, F.R.I.B.A., of Warrington, a notice, given pursuant to the provisions of the above-mentioned Act, of his intention to construct a wharf with piles and timber framing in Bromborough Pool, for Messrs. Lever Brothers, of the Sunlight Soap Works, instead of the stone wharf advertized in the London Gazette of the 30th November, 1888, a copy of which notice is subjoined.

AFRICA—EAST COAST.—MOZAMBIQUE CHANNEL.  
*Amended Particulars of St. Lazarus Bank.*

An error of five miles having crept into the latitudes quoted in former Notice to Mariners on this subject, No. 107 of 1889, the amended particulars are herein republished; and the former Notice is hereby cancelled.

The following information relating to St. Lazarus Bank has been received from Commander T. F. Pullen, being the result of an examination made by H.M. Surveying Vessel "Stork" and her boats, extending over six days, from 3rd to 8th February, 1889 :—

The area of the bank within the depths of 100 fathoms is of oblong shape, 11 miles long north and south, with an extreme breadth of six miles, and is included between the parallels of 12° 7' and 12° 17' S., and long. 41° 20' and 41° 26½' E.

The general depth was found to be under 20 fathoms, the nature of the bottom being sand and coral. The shoalest part within the depth of 10 fathoms is near the northern end of the bank, and is about four miles long in a north-west direction and two miles broad; the least depth
