THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and with reference especially to Article 96 of The Animals Order of 1886, do hereby license the Local Authority for the West Riding of the county of York, to dig up or cause to be dug up, within fourteen days after the date of this Licence, the carcase or carcasses of one or more pigs which have recently been buried at Bramhope by Thomas H. Moore, subject to the following conditions :

1. When dug up the Local Authority shall forthwith cause each carcase to be examined with a view to ascertain whether the animal or animals were affected with contagious or infectious disease, and the Local Authority shall then cause each carcase to be re-buried as soon as possible, and shall cause it to be covered with a sufficient quantity of quick lime or other disinfectant, and with not less than six feet of earth.
2. The expenses of and incidental to the digging up, examination, and re-burial of each carcase shall be defrayed by the Local Authority.
3. This Licence is revocable by the Privy Council.
