

Country, which are posted about *Chenay*; It's believed, their design is to march into the County of *Luxemburg*. The Enemy have a flying Camp of 8 or 10000 near *Vianen*, under the command of the *Marquis de Boufflers*.

Cologne, September 22. The Forces of *Luxemburg*, *Hesse*, *Munster*, and *Newbourg*, are now joined together near *Varenberg*, making an Army of about 24000 Men. The Landgrave of *Hesse* is with them; and it's said, they will march towards *Chenay*; and it's said, they will march towards *St. Me* and *Limburch*. Another Body is forming towards *Chenay* of the Forces of *Liege*, with a Detachment of *Brandenburgers*, and some Dutch Troops drawn from *Mastricht*.

Eli burz, September 16. Major-General *Mackay* continues his march Southwards, having the Earl of *Saforth* with him; And all those that followed the said Earl, especially the *Mackenzies*, have laid down their Arms, and submitted themselves. Upon the approach of the Earl of *Dramlanerz*, with the forces under his Command, the Rebels all deserted themselves, having plundered and burnt several Gentlemen's Houses that would not comply with their Demands.

Falmouth, September 18. On the 16th instant, in the morning, Sir *Claude Shovell*, with the Squadron under his Command, was seen off of the *Lizard* standing to the Westward, the Wind at E.S.E. The same day three Dutch Privateers arrived in *Mounts-Bay* from the *Groyne*, where they had been cruising, and brought in with them 7 Prizes. Near the *Lamb-end* two French Privateers came up with them, but upon Sir *Claude Shovell's* appearing in sight, they bore away, and two of our Frigats made chase after them.

St. Ives, September 17. Yesterday about 5 in the Evening, Sir *Claude Shovell* with his Squadron passed by this place with a fair Wind for *Ireland*.

Plimouth, September 19. Yesterday in the evening the English and Dutch Fleet, commanded by the Admirals, Sir *Richard Haddock*, *Henry Kinsgrove* Esq; and Sir *John Ashby*, passed by this Port to the Westward with a fair Wind. We have advice, that three *Blushing* Privateers, one of 20, another of 16, and a third of 14 Guns, have brought into *Mounts-Bay* 9 Prizes; several of which are laden with Sugars, Indigo, and Tobacco, from the *West-Indies*, some with Wine and Brandy, and the rest were bound from *Ireland* to *France*.

Weymouth, September 20. Captain *Young*, in the *Grafton* Sloop, having notice on Thursday last, that a French Privateer of 6 Guns, 2 *Paterrocks*, and 50 Men, had taken about *Portland* a small Vessel belonging to *Poole*, he immediately sailed out of this Harbor, and being got up with the French Man, after some Dispute took him, and carried him to *Dartmouth*. A Dutch Caper has brought in here a French Vessel of 40 Tuns.

Lime, September 22. The *Grafton* Sloop has brought into *Dartmouth* a French Privateer of 6 Guns and 43 Men belonging to *Dunkirk*, which she took the 18th instant, after a running fight of 8 hours, in which the French had 9 Men killed, and as many wounded. Of the English, only 4 were wounded.

Dover, September 23. This morning 10 Dutch Men of War sailed out of the *Dognes*, and are now (at one in the afternoon) going about the *South-Sand Head*.

Chester, September 22. The Letters from *Dublin* of the 15th instant say, that on the 12th the Army was still encamped at *Tippenny*.

Whitehall September 15. This day the Committee of the *East-India* Company waited on His Majesty at *Whitehall*, to Congratulate his Majesty's Success in *Ireland*, and the Return. His Majesty received them very graciously, and was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on *Jos. de Herpe* Esq; Governor, and *Tho. Cook* Esq; Deputy-Governor of the said Company.
