THE Regiments of *Montecuculi*, *Toff*, and *Savooy*, with a Battalion of that of *Savooy* are marched to *Calentine*, where they lay some days to refresh themselves, to the Camp at *Munster*, and the rest of the German Successors are not far behind.

The next Week a general review will be taken of our Forces, which will then decamp, and advance towards *Monseur Carinot*, who lies still between *Raconitz* and *Crimasole*. The *Canadians* and French Protestants have within these two or three days cut off a Regiment of the Enemies Horse, and taken 60 laden Waggon, and several Mules that were going under their Convoy to *Pignorel*. The *Swedes* have obtained another considerable advantage at a Pass of the *Alps*, of which we know not yet the particulars.

Vienna, Sept. 24. The News of the taking of *Nissa* and *Widin* by the Turks is confirmed; The former was Surrendered after three Weeks attack, upon condition to march out with Arms, Ammunition and Baggage, and to be conducted to the first Imperial Garrison. The Turks did not keep the Capitulation, but disarmed and plundered the Garrison, and the Tartars had cut them off, if the Prudence of Count *Guido* of *Starenberg* had not prevented it by passing the *Danube* at *Semandria*, and marching to join Prince *Louis* of *Baden*. *Widin* resisted but 4 days, and the Garrison of 800 Men was conducted to *Orsova*, and the Capitulation well observed.

Vienna, Sept. 28. The last Letters from *Seravia* give this further account of the march of Prince *Louis* of *Baden*. That on the 12th of the last Month he moved with the Imperial Army from *Petrovizza* to the River *Karas*, which he passed the 13th, On the 14th they encamped near a narrow Pass, where the Foot and a Regiment of Dragoons stay'd for the coming up of the Baggage; The Horse arriv'd the 16th at *Carnisibus*, where they were joined by the Baron *Hessler* with the Regiments of *Capovra*, *St. Croix*, and *Erbevillie*; The 17th the Infantry with the Baggage likewise arriv'd there; And on the 18th the whole Army prepar'd to march with all possible hast towards the Iron Gate, having received advice that *Petrovizza* advanced with about 1000 of *Teckely's* Horse to defend that Pass. *Teckely* himself was gone with the main Body of his Forces towards *Alba Tul*, or *Wisslingberg*, to hold the Assembly of the States which he had Summoned; where he expected a further Succor from the Turks, with several Pieces of Great Cannon from *Trasbacha*. The Letters from *Belgrade* of the 21st say, that Count *Guido* of *Starenberg* being come near to *Semandria* with the Garrison of *Nissa*, they discover'd a great Body of Tartars who intended to have fallen upon them, but failing in their Design by the Precaution of the Count de *Starenberg*, they ravaged the Country thereabouts, and carried away several Slaves. The Garrison of *Widin* arriv'd at *Orsova* the 11th past; but the Governor is like to be question'd for demanding the place no better, having held out but 4 days, and there being no breach made, when it was Surrendered.

Hildesberg Oct. 3. The Electors of *Bavaria* and *Saxony*, having upon the advice they received of the Enemies motions decamp'd from *Loor*, and sent a strong Detachment towards *Rainfelden*, they pass'd through the Valley of *Kentzenow*, and marching by the way of *Schalchen* and *Ilisk* encamp'd the 21st near *Waldingen*, where according to our last advice they still continued. The French Army lay at the same time about *Neuenburg*, designing, as 'twas said, to take Winter-Quarters in the Bishoprick of *Bispe*, which the Swissers are not a little disturbed at; and we must expect to see what Resolutions they will take for their own Security, at their General Meeting that's going to be held at *Baden*.

Coburg, October 6. The Forces of *Hesse*, *Lunenbourg*, *Bayler* and *Nassburg* continue encamp'd about *Schnitzen*. The *Marquis de Boufflers* is removed to *Bastogne*, where

he has received another reinforcement of two Regiments of Foot, and one of Horse. We have an account from *Liège* that 3000 *Brandenburgers* and 2000 *French* had join'd the Forces of that Count, and that they expected a Battalion of *Brandenburgers* in 10, and 1500 Horse from the Army in *Blancens*, upon whose arrival, they design'd to march into the Country of *Luxembourg*. The Dyer of *Ratisbonne* has enter'd into a Guaranty of the Treaty of Alliance between the House of *Austria* and the Duke of *Savooy*, and desired the Emperor to lend to all the Princes of *Italy* that hold Fiefs of the Empire, to require them to assist the Duke of *Savooy*.

Brussels, October 2. The Armies on this side continue in their old Stations; but it's believ'd they will now quickly go into Winter-Quarters; A strong Detachment was sent from our Camp two or three days ago, but they return'd with out meeting with any of the Enemies Troop. The Confederate Forces between the *North* and the *North* design (as 'tis believ'd) to take their Quarters in the County of *Luxembourg*.

Hague, Octob. 10. On Saturday we had advice of the arrival of Eleven of our *East-India* Ships richly Laden. There are four still behind, but News is come that they too are near the Coast. The Advices from the *Upper Rhine* tell us, That the Imperial Army continues near the French, having sent a Detachment to cover the Forest Towns. The Elector of *Bavaria* had likewise sent Count *Sachs* with Instructions to assist at the General Dyet of the *Salt* Cantons, to be held the 27th past at *Basel*, in which chiefly will be debated the guarding the *Passages*, and the Security of the Forest Towns.

From the Camp at Cashill, September 22. This Morning we received advice of my Lord *Marbleborough's* arrival in *Cork* Harbor, upon which, Major General *Scravenmore* with 1200 Horse and Dragoons, who together with Major General *Teren*, and two Battalions of *Danes*, was posted near the *Blackwater*, march'd to join him; and to Morrow will march from hence Detachements out of the Dutch and French Regiments, who with the *Danes* (whom the Prince of *Wirtemberg* commands himself) will make a Body of about 4000 Foot.

Letters of the 19th from Lieutenant General *Douglas* inform us, that the Irish (who are said to be 7 Regiments of Foot, 6 of Horse and 4 of Dragoons, with 7 Field Pieces) had re-pass'd the *Shannon*, and lay encamp'd near *Banchar* Bridge, being Commanded by the Duke of *Berwick*, who now styles himself General Commander of *Ireland*; Lieutenant General *Douglas* followed them in their Retreat from *Bir*, with a resolution to attack them, but was hinder'd in that Design by the Bogs that cover'd the Enemies Camp.

Two Persons come from *Galloway* confirm the former account we had of *Tyrconnel* and *Laufin's* being gone off with the French Forces for *France*, of whom divers are left Sick behind in the Suburbs of that place. They set sail two days sooner than they design'd upon a report that a Squadron of English Ships was coming that way.

From on Board Their Majesties Ship the Kent in Cork Harbor, Sept. 26. On the 21st instant, the whole Fleet arriv'd before this Harbor; where we Anchored, the Flood being done, and little wind. The 22d we enter'd into the Harbor, receiving some shot from a small Battery of 8 Guns, but having sent 2 or 3 Boats ashore, they forced the Enemy from their

The 24th Instant, a detachment of 500 Men, consisting of 200 Foot and 300 Cavalry, were detached to be employed in mounting and planting the Cannon to batter the Town. The 25th Instant, 2000 Men with armed Men were sent up to assist in attacking the Town; and this day came to the Allies with Storm and Provisions from *Witcomb*. The weather has been very fair ever since we arrived here.

From *Caen* the 27th Instant, the English sent a detachment of 1000 Men to the *Palage*, and the French Army were sent to the same place. On the 28th Instant, the French drew out, but upon our firing from each Place of Cannon a Troop of their Infantry they all retired. That Evening 1000 Men were detached to order to park themselves of several Artillery Pieces within the Walls of the Town; upon which the English being the more, they sent a detachment with several Officers to view the Town and find the Enemy had gained a place called *Cote de Fort*, which the advanced Detachment immediately possessed. The same day the Camp advanced within Musket shot of the Town, and the Danish Forces under the Command of the Duke of *Mecklenburg* did the like on the North. The 29th Instant, our Garrisons into the Ruins of the Suburb and placed up in the Old Fort on two Batteries. The next day, the 30th Instant, in the East part of the Wall from 2000 Men of our Foot, and 1000 Pounds of Cannon, battering the Enemy beat a Parley, and sent out an Officer, Captain, and 100 Men to exchange. But the English being against the Terms proposed, the 31st Instant, 1000 Men were appointed, under the Command of *Major General G. O'Brien*, to pass over to an Island between the Wall, where the breach was made, which they did with great Courage, passing through the French Lines. The Tide was up to their Armpits. The 1st Instant, the Garrison of the *Cote de Fort* having the Garrison exposed to all the Enemies fire, the Garrison of the Island within 20 yards of the Wall, the Garrison who went on with this first Detachment, were the Duke of *Mecklenburg* (who was dangerously wounded) the Lord *O'Brien*, Col. *Greenwell*, Capt. *Compton*, Capt. *Leighton*, Capt. *Farlow*, Capt. *Noble*, and several other Officers. Immediately after this the Army did beat a Parley, but my Lord *Mecklenburg* would not allow any other Conditions than to be Prisoners of War, which they yielded to, and the Capitulation was signed, which is to this effect.

That the Garrison should be received Prisoners of War. That there should be no Parley done either to Officers, Soldiers or Landstaves. That the Garrison should be allowed to obtain the Military Chests, towards them. That they should be sent to the Old Fort with the *Howitz*, and the two Gates of the City, the next day at 2 in the Morning. That all the Prisoners that are in Prison should be sent to a safe place. That all the Arms of the Garrison and Landstaves should be put into a secure place, and that an Honourable Account should be given of the Magazines, and Ammunition of the Garrison.

Accordingly the same Night 200 Men entered into the Old Fort, which is very strong; and this Morning we took Possession of the Town, the Garrison which consisted of between 4 and 5000 Men, being made Prisoners; of which number are the *Duke of Mecklenburg* and *Thom*, Col. *Margrave*, who was Governor, and several other Officers of Note. We have not lost in all this Siege above 50 Men. After the Surrender of the place, a good Detachment of Horse and Dragoons went out with a Summons to *Kennel*, where we hear they have but a weak Garrison; and the rest of the Forces are preparing to follow.

Phenix, Sept. 20. This Afternoon passed by this Port a great Fleet of English Merchant Men under the Conduct of three Men of War, bound home from the *Streights*.

Dover, Oct. 1. The Master of the Packet-Boat, who arrived here this day from *Newport*, reports, That the French with 10 or 12000 Men had endeavoured to pass the Canal between *Oxford* and *Bowen*, to get the Country on the other side under our Ambition, but 3000 Men of War, who lay on the River to guard it, having brought all their

Cannon on one side, fired so severely upon the French, that they made them give way, killing 1000 or 1200 upon the place. The Spaniards in the mean time sending 4000 Men, sent 2000 to the Canal, and pursuing the Enemy, killed 1000 of the French, consisting of 600 Foot and 400 Cavalry. The whole Action lasted 45 Hours, and ended yesterday morning, the news which came to *London* just as our Packet-Boat was sailing away. One of the Spanish Men of War was killed, but whether by accident or by the Enemy, was not known.
