From the Camp at Kinsale, October 4.

ON the first instant the Earl of Marlborough, with the Forces under his Command, marched from Corke to Five Mile Bridge, and arrived here on the second, a Detachment being sent before, who possessed themselves of the Town, and prevented its being burnt by the Irish. Towards Evening the Forces encamped, and took their Posts about the new Fort; And Major-General Tetlow was ordered with 800 Men to attack the old Fort, in which the Deserters and others reported, there were but 150 Men; In order whereunto he passed the River, (having found here a sufficient number of Boats to carry over his Men, for otherwise they must have marched 10 Miles about) and on the 3d, a little after Day-break, he Stormed the Fort, making a shew of attacking it where it was weakest, while in the mean time he caused a Detachment to make an Assault in another place, where the Enemy least apprehended it; which succeeded so well, that our Men all at once gained the little Bastions. At the same time several Barrels of Powder took fire, and blew up above 50 of the Enemy, many others were killed, and the rest fled into an old Castle, which is in the middle of the Fort; Instead of 150, we found in it 450 Men, of whom about 220 were killed and blown up, and the rest made Prisoners; some endeavoured to escape in Boats to the new Fort, but the Tide being against them, most of them were killed by our Shot from the Shore. The Governor, with several other Officers, were found slain upon the Ramparts. Our Soldiers found a great deal of Plunder. My Lord Marlborough sent a Summons to the Governor of the new Fort, who answered, *That it would be time enough to Capitulate a Month hence;* but we doubt not (if the ill weather does not hinder us) in 2 or 3 days after the arrival of our Cannon for Battery,

which we hourly expect, to reduce the Enemy to the same Terms we did the Garrison of Corke; & in the mean time we are preparing to make two Attacks, the English on the Right, and the Danes (who are Commanded by the Prince of Wirtemberg) on the Left; We hear from Corke, that the Duke of Grafton is in a hopeful way of Recovery.

Dublin, Octob. 8. We have an account from the Camp at Kinsale, that our Forces have possessed themselves of the Town, and taken the old Fort by Storm; There were in it about 450 Men, of whom near 250 with the Governor were killed. Yesterday Morning happened here a small Earthquake, which gave one very sensible shock to all the Houses, but did no harm.

The Lords Justices of this Kingdom being informed that several of Their Majesties Protestant Subjects, and others, who live peaceably under Their Majesties Protection, are Robbed and Plundered of their Goods and Cattle, whereby many Families are Ruined, and Tillage hindered, and that this is chiefly occasioned by the Encouragement given to disorderly Persons in buying from them the said Cattle, have thought fit, to put forth a Proclamation, forbidding all Persons to buy any Goods, Cattle or Horses, except in Fairs or publick Markets, unless from such of whose Property they are well assured, and declaring that what Sales shall be otherwise made shall be at the Peril of the Buyer; and that if any Stolen Goods, or Cattle, shall be found in the Possession of any Person notwithstanding they pretend such Illegal Buying for their Excuse, yet they shall be proceeded against as Accessories to the Felony, and the Goods restored to the Right Owners.

Holyhead, Octob. 9. On the 7th instant about 7 in the Morning was felt here an Earthquake, which shook the Houses, but lasted a very little while. It was perceived at the same time at several Miles distance from this place, but did no harm.

Falmouth, Octob. 9. All the homeward bound Merchant Men that were in this Port, Sailed on Monday last under the Convoy of several Men of War to the Eastward.

Burnstaple, Octob. 9. On Tuesday the 7th instant we perceived here a kind of an Earthquake, which shook most of the Houses in this Town. It happened about 7 in the Morning.

Weymouth, Octob. 11. On Thursday Night we had a very great Storm, which forced ashore in this Bay a Dutch Man of War, called the *Courteen*, of 50 Guns: The Ship is broke in pieces, but all the Men except about Forty are saved.

Weymouth, October 13. Yesterday came into *Portland Road* the *Plimouth*, Captain *Carter* Commander, who has been cruising with several other of Their Majesties Ships in the *Scundings*. On the 4th he discovered two French Men of War of about 60 Guns a piece, but could not come up with them. On the 10th he got sight again of the biggest of the said French Ships, and gave chase to her for several hours, but the weather growing very thick, he at last lost her, and this chase brought the *Plimouth* into the Channel.

Portsmouth, Octob. 12. On the 9th instant came into *St. Helens Road* from the Westward, 6 Dutch Men of War under the Command of Rear Admiral *Skey*, where they continued about two hours, and then Sailed to the Eastward. We have had very Tempestuous Weather, the Wind at S. W.

Deale, Octob. 14. The Fleet continues still in the *Dorynes*, the Winds having been so high for these five Days last past at S. W. that the Ships designed to the Westward do not think fit to stir. But we hear of no damage; only 2 or 3 small Vessels have been forced from their Anchors, who it's believed are put into *Dover* Peer.

Witchall, Octob. 15. Yesterday Morning the Princess of *Denmark* was delivered of a Daughter, who lived about two hours and was Christned, and privately buried last Night in *Westminster Abby*. Her Royal Highness came about two Months before Her Time; but is, Thanks be to God, very well.

Whitehall, Octob. 15. His Majesty has been Pleased to appoint *Thomas Baker Esq;* to be His Consul at *Argiers*, who is accordingly preparing for his departure, in order to enter upon that Employment.
