From the Venetian Camp near Vallona, Sept. 19.

ON the 18th of the last Month, the Captain-General *Cornaro* set Sail with the Fleet from *Napoli di Malvasia*, having detached 16 Men of War and 2 Fireships under the Command of Signior *Delfino* to observe the Enemies Fleet, and left a good number of Troops, commanded by General *Navigier* to guard the *Isthmus of Corinth*. The winds proved very contrary, so that 'twas the 10th of this Month before we arrived in sight of *Corfu*, the 10th we anchored near *Saffno*, the weather being very Tempestuous, by which our Ships and Gallies received some Damage. The 12th we sailed towards *Vallona*. The Turks in the mean time had drawn together about 7000 Foot and 1500 Horse, to oppose our descent, notwithstanding which it was resolved to Land on the 13th, and all things were disposed accordingly. The Enemy were drawn up near the *Strand*, and fired very smartly upon our Men, as they approached towards the Shore. The Chevalier *Gimmetines* General of the Troops of *Malta*, was the first that Landed with his Battalion, and was presently followed by the rest of the Forces; the Cannon of our Gallies playing upon the Enemy all the while; The Turks hereupon fled to the Hills; and our Forces formed themselves without any disturbance; The General *Guadagne* took the Main Body, Serjeant General *Spaw* the Right, and Serjeant General *Borri* the Left, Serjeant General *Rapetta* commanded the Reserve, and Signior *Francisco Grimani*, Provéditore General of the Field, assisted where his Presence was necessary. In this order we began our march, and driving the Enemy from the Hills, advanced to a great Bourg called *Camina*, situated on a Hill, and defended by a Castle being about 3 Miles from *Vallona*. The Capt. General *Cornaro* came in the Evening into the Camp, gave Orders for approaching nearer to the place, caused a Battery to be raised of 2 Pieces of Cannon, and at the same time sent our strong Detachements to disperse the Enemy, who had posted themselves not far from thence, which they effected. In the Night we took the Bourg of *Camina*, by Assault, and fixed our Miners to the Wall of the Castle. The next Morning the Turks hung out a white flag, and proposed Conditions, which the General would not grant them, but at last it was agreed, that they should march out with their Arms and Baggage: Accordingly they surrendered the place on the 15th, the Garison consisted of 550, and the Inhabitants that went out with them, were near 4000 Men, Women, and Children. In the mean time our Galeasses plaid their Cannon and the Palanders their Bombs upon *Vallona*, which is fortified with a good Wall and Ditch; and on the 16th the Captain-General sent a Summons to the Bassa of this place, who said he would return an Answer the next day, but in the night he retired with the Garison, and their best Goods, so that the Officer that was sent the next Morning with a new Summons, found the Gates open. On the 18th the Captain-General made his Entry into the Town, and caused *Te Deum* to be sung in the Principal Mosque. In these two Places were found 134 pieces of Cannon of all sorts, with considerable quantities of Ammunition. We have likewise taken 3 Standarts and a Horfes Tail; and in all this Expedition have not had above 100 Men killed, and 300 wounded. The Serjeant-General *Borri*, who commanded the Popes Troops, was killed, the Chevalier *de Gemetines*, General of the Battalion of *Malta*, the Chevalier *de Benoit*, the Count *de San Felice*, and some others, were wounded. From hence the Captain-General intends to go towards *Durazzo* and *Dulcigno*. The Fleet he has with him is composed of 19 men of War, 3 Fireships, and as many Palanders, six Galeasses, 22 Gallies, 24 Gallions or Brigantines, 10 Feluccas, and 50 Transport Vessels, besides the Popes Gallies and

those of *Malta*; and the Land Forces consist of 9000 Foot and 900 Horse, besides a great many Voluntiers.

Lemberg in Poland, Sept. 21. The Letters from our Army of the 16th Instant, tell us, that a Council of War having been held, and consideration had of the great difficulties which their march into *Valachia* would be subject to at this time of the year, when the ways are, by reason of the great Rains become almost unpassable, and Forage is grown very scarce; it was resolved to change their first design, and to send only a detachment of 800 Foot and 300 Horse, with 8 pieces of Cannon towards *Valachia*, with Orders to possess themselves of *Mirme* and *Szaczaw*, and to remain there this Winter; That they marched accordingly on the 13th, the *Sieur Zabolsky* with 6000 Horse and Dragoons being sent with them, to cover them in their march; and that at the same time the rest of the Army advanced towards *Bukowine* to be the better able to second these detachments, if there should be occasion, where they will continue till the return of that commanded by the *Sieur Zabolsky*; and then the Forces will be put into their Winter Quarters. Just now arrive Letters of the 19th, which say, that *Sultan Nuradin* was come with a Body of Tartars to *Cecorze*; and that our Army upon the news of it hastened their march to *Bukowine*, to assist the *Sieur Zabolsky* if it should be needful. There is a report that the Cham of *Tartary* is dead.

Warsaw, Octob. 2. We hear from *Gracow* that an Express was passed through that City, going to the Court of *Poland* with the Emperor's Ratification of the Treaty of Marriage between the Prince of *Poland* and the Princess Palatin of *Neubourg*.

Vienna, Octob. 15. The Letters from *Belgrade* of the 6th Instant gave an account, that on the 3 Instant the Turks again furiously assaulted our Redoubts, but were repulsed with great loss; on the 4th they gave 3 other vigorous Assaults to the said Redoubts, and made themselves Masters of one of them, but were soon beaten out again by General *Aspremont*; on the 5th the Enemy retook the same Redoubt, and advanced to the Passades of the Town; but the Besieged fallying out presently after, once more beat back the Enemy, and recovered all they had gained; But after all this Bravery, an Express arrived here last night, with the unhappy news of the taking of the Town by Storm, and that all the Garison was put to the Sword, except the Duke *de Croj*, who had the chief Command, General *Aspremont*, and about 300 more, who found means to escape by water. This misfortune is said to have been occasioned by one of the Enemies Bombs falling into and firing our Magazine, which blew up above 1000 of the Garison; during the astonishment and confusion of which accident, the Turks stormed the Place in 4 several places, and at last entred it, tho' with the slaughter of a great number of their Men. We have an account from *Upper Hungary*, that Col. *Schelick* had cut off 500 Turks of the Garison of *Great Waradin* (who were sent to attack the Castle of *Bellemseck*) and taken two pieces of Cannon which they had with them. We have nothing new from *Transylvania*. The Elector Palatine parted from hence yesterday, towards *Neubourg*.

Francfort, Octob. 22. The Swedish Auxiliary Troops are come back from the Palatinare, and having repassed the River *Main* at *Hochst* and *Schaffembourg*, are returning towards *Pomeran* and *Bremen*, in order to go into their Winter Quarters.

Cologne, Octob. 24. The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel* arrived here the 21st instant from his Camp at *Bullinguen*; and the same day gave notice to the States of this Diocesis assembled here, that his Troops

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with those of *Luxemburg* were going to repair the *Rhin*, but that if they thought it necessary he would leave part of them for the defence of this Country, which Proposal the said States are now deliberating upon, and it is believed they will desire that some of these Forces may remain hereabouts till the arrival of the *Brandenburg* Forces, which are expected from the *Spanish Netherlands*; and about whose Winter-Quarters they are sending Deputies to treat with the Elector of *Brandenburg*, who we hear is on his way towards *Cleves*, General *Swarts*, who Commands the Troops of *Minster* and *Paderborne*, is likewise come hither, and has made the same offer to the States of this Archbishoprick. The Armies on the *Upper Rhine* are likewise preparing to go into their Winter Quarters. The Letters from *Switzerland* say, That the Cantons assembled at *Baden* being informed that the French designed to build a new Fort between *Basel* and *Hunningen*, from whence they would not only have it in their Power to bombard the Town, but likewise to ruine the Bridge of *Bisse*, they had resolved to oppose the same with their whole Force, and not suffer themselves to be amused with fair words, as they were when the French assured them that they only intended to make a small Redoubt at *Hunningen*. That the Canton of *Berne* had sent positive Orders to their Officers in the French Service, not to serve but for the Defence of such Places as *France* was possessed of in 1663. And that the Magistrates of *Geneva*, upon the Advices they had received of the Design of the French upon their City, have reinforced their Garrison with some Troops sent to their Assistance by the Canton of *Berne*.

Paris, Octob. 20. The Squadron commanded by the Marquis *d'Amfreville* arrived at *Brest* on the 9th of this Month from *Ireland*, having brought from thence the Count *de Lausun*, the Earl of *Tirconnel*, and the French Troops, who embarked at *Galloway* the 16th of the last Month, but failed not from thence for want of a fair Wind till the 23; a great number of the Soldiers are sick, and many dyed by the way. The Count *de Lausun* and the Sieur *de Baizeau* are come to *Fontainebleau*, and the latter is made Brigadier-General. Our Army in *Germany* was encamped on the 13th at *Stauffen*, a strong detachment being sent to the Valley of *St. Pierre*, to consume what Forage might be still remaining there. By our last advice from *Piedmont* Monsieur *Catinat* was still posted at *Racconigi*.

Brussels, Octob. 25. The Confederate Forces are separated, and going into their Winter Quarters. The French have done the like, except a small Body of them, which continues as yet about *Harlebecke*. The Prince of *Hannover* came hither this Morning, and in the Evening returned again to his Quarters at *Grimbergen*.

Hague, Octob. 27. The Elector of *Brandenburg* was expected the 24th of this Month at *Breda* in his way to *Cleves*, where his Electoral Highness will continue some time. On the 19th instant arrived here from *England* Sir *William Hussy*, His Majesty's Ambassador to the Ottoman Port, and on the 21st he proceeded on his Journey. The Letters that came in this Morning from *Vienna* brought the ill News of the taking of *Belgrade* by Storm; which was occasioned by a Bomb falling into the Magazine of Powder, and doing much damage to the place and Garrison, which the Turks took the advantage of, and fell on furiously, and the besieged being in a great Contusion, they gained the Town, putting all the Garrison to the Sword, except the Duke *de Cray* and General *Apremont*, who with about 300 more escaped by Water.

Philadelphia, Octob. 19. The last Week arrived here the *Providence of London*, and the *Employment* of this place from the *Barbadoes*, whence they came on the 29th of *August*, with their Company & above 30 Sail more of Merchant Ships, from whom they were separated in bad weather; but two days before they came in, they saw again several of their Company, which they believe are gone up the Channel. Here are likewise arrived about 40 Ships from *Virginia*; they came out 110 Sail, under the Convoy of the *Sir Samuel and Henry* and *Scepter*, the rest being gone for *England* and other Ports; they met with very ill weather, in which 3 Ships of their Company foundered, but the Men were all saved.

Chesler, Octob. 20. The 17th Instant set Sail from *Hicklake*, Col. *Matthews*'s Regiment of Dragoons; and this

Morning marched thither Count *Schomberg*'s Regiment of Horse, in order likewise to their Transportation for *Ireland*.

Dept, October 21. On Thursday last, The Majesty's Ship the *D. Anne*, going from *Portsmouth* to the *Race*, founded about 5 Leagues from the *North Foreland*, and the Men were all saved; she was on a Slip, and no longer fit for Service, and had in her but 20 Guns. Last Night a Dutch Man of War was cast away on the *Golden Sands*, but the Men saved.
