

(c.) Any Scholar may signify in writing to the Provost his wish not to receive the pecuniary emoluments of his Scholarship during any period of his tenure of the same, and thereupon such emoluments shall not be paid to him during such period.

19. If under the foregoing provisions of this Statute the number of Eton Scholarships or Open Scholarships be in any year increased beyond twenty-four, then not more than six such Scholarships shall be offered in any subsequent year until their number is again reduced to twenty-four.

And we do hereby also alter and amend Chapter IV. of the said Statute M hereinbefore set out by substituting therefor the following (that is to say)

1. The Vintner Legacy and the Purefoy, Price, Day, and Betham Funds shall be applicable for Exhibitions according to the following scheme :

(a.) A Vintner Exhibition to be awarded for proficiency in Natural Science and to consist of the whole or such part of the annual income of Dr. Vintner's Legacy as the Governing Body shall from time to time determine, after deducting what, if anything, may be necessary for the payment of examiners, and having regard to the proviso as to maximum value hereinafter contained :

(b.) Two Exhibitions to be awarded for proficiency in the ordinary studies of the College, each to consist of one-half or such other part of the net income of the Purefoy, Price, Day, and Betham Funds, as the Governing Body shall from time to time determine, having regard to the proviso as to maximum value hereinafter contained :

(c.) Each Exhibition shall be open to all Undergraduates of the College in their first or second year of residence, provided that no Exhibition shall be tenable with any Scholarship or Fellowship of the College :

(d.) Each Exhibition shall be tenable in the first instance for a period of one year or two years as the Council shall determine, with power of prolongation by the Council for a further period or further periods, provided that the total period of tenure shall in no case exceed three years.

(e.) No Exhibition shall exceed in value the emoluments of an Open Entrance Scholarship, and any surplus income shall be carried to a Capital account, and accumulated for the purpose of forming a Fund for a future Exhibition or Exhibitions, similar to the Exhibition or Exhibitions from the surplus income of which such accumulation shall have accrued, and so toties quoties :

(f.) The Exhibitions shall be awarded by the Council, who shall have power to appoint such examiners and make such regulations for conducting the examinations as they may think fit.

2. All other property (not being part of the general endowment of the College) held by the College upon any trusts, conditions or directions, which might lawfully have been modified by these Statutes, shall continue to be administered as heretofore, unless and until some other mode of administering the same shall be prescribed by some alteration of these Statutes, or by other competent authority.

THE following Statute, passed on the twenty-fourth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, by the Governing Body of Lincoln College, Oxford, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 :—

Amendments to the College Statutes passed in a Special Meeting, held on 24 January, 1890, by the Governing Body of Lincoln College, Oxford, under the provisions of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict. cap. 48).

1. In cap. 4, § 1, to omit the words 'et quod eligendus...partem sociorum.'

2. In cap. 4, § 3, to omit the words 'in sacerdotio constitutus et.'

3. In cap. 4, § 4, to omit the words 'Licet autem...non volumus' and to substitute the following :—

'Subject to the general provisions of these statutes, a Fellow shall hold his Fellowship for ten years from the date of his admission as "Collega perpetuus."

'He shall then vacate his Fellowship, and shall not be eligible for re-election, unless during any six years after such admission he shall have served the College in the office of Tutor, Lecturer, or Bursar.

'In that case, it shall be lawful for the College, by a majority of two-thirds of the voters present at a meeting held in full term and specially summoned by a notice issued at least a month before, to re-elect him for a further period of ten years without a probationary year ; provided always that every Fellow so re-elected, if he shall cease to serve the College in the office of Tutor, Lecturer, or Bursar, within six years from the date of his re-election, shall thereupon vacate his Fellowship ; provided also that there shall not be in the College at any one time more than three Fellows holding Fellowships after such re-election.

'It shall further be lawful for the College to re-elect for a further period of ten years, under the same conditions, persons who have been re-elected under the provisions of this clause.

'Nothing in these Amendments shall operate to alter the conditions of tenure under which existing Fellows hold : but it shall be lawful for the College, at the end of the tenure of any existing Fellow, to re-elect him under the provisions of these Amendments, provided that he has while Fellow fulfilled their conditions.'

4. In cap. 12, after § 2, to insert :—

'But the Rector and Fellows may, with the consent of the Rector, undertake the management of this Estate as an ordinary College Estate, and, after securing the stipend assigned to the Chaplain, and deducting all expenses of management and repairs, and all other liabilities hitherto attaching to the Rector, may pay him the remainder of the rent.'
