

2. Theory of Construction.
 3. Strength and quality of materials, and description of workmanship, tools, and plant.
 4. Analysis of prices.
 5. Measurement and estimate of Builders' work, including taking off quantities from Drawings and preparing the Abstracts and Bills of Quantities.
 6. Sanitary Engineering.
- In addition to the above six subjects a Candidate may take up any of the following optional subjects:—
- A. Euclid (the first three Books).
 - B. Algebra, including quadratic equations.
 - C. Plane Trigonometry.
 - D. Geometrical Drawing and Freehand Sketches in Outline.
 - E. Chemistry and Mineralogy relating to Building Materials.

IV. A fee of £1 will be required from every Candidate attending the Preliminary Examination, and a further fee of £4 from every Candidate admitted to the Competitive Examination.

V. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made at such times and in such manner as the Commissioners may appoint.

* * Candidates must be ready to serve at any station at home or abroad.

Candidates will be expected to be familiar with the English system of building nomenclature and with English methods of building and pricing.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice, that on the 27th May, 1890, and following days, an Open Competitive Examination for the situation of Assistant Surveyor in the Royal Engineer Department of the War Office will be held in London under the above Regulations.

A Preliminary Examination will be held in London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, on the 9th May, 1890.

The number of situations to be filled will be the number vacant at the time of the Examination.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 26th April, 1890, an "application" in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
