Rome, Octob. 7.

**O**N the first Instant arrived here an Expreſs from the French Court, with Letters from the Duke de Chaulnes their Ambaſſador here, who the next day had Audience of the Pope, to acquaint him, That neither the King his Maſter, nor the Clergy of France, did approve of the Project of Accommodation lately ſent thither by the Abbot of Pelgrac, but that the ſaid Abbot would be ſpeedily ſent back with ſome new Propoſals. After this the Ambaſſador had a long Conference with the Cardinals *Ottoboni*, *Bonifazio* and *Farin*; but notwithstanding all their Endeavours, and frequent Conſultations, there ſeems to be hitherto little appearance of bringing the Differences that have ſo long depended between the two Courts to an Adjustment. On the 4th the Senator *Lando* had his firſt publick Audience of the Pope, as Ambaſſador Extraordinary from the Republick. Yeſterday the Pope entered into the ſecond Year of his Pontificate, and was thereupon Complimented by the Colledge of Cardinals, and all the Foreign Miniſters.

*Milan, Octob. 11.* Our Governor-General the Count de *Fuenſalida* is ſtill in *Piedmont*, whither 50000 *Philippi* have been ſent this Week for the payment of the Spaniſh Forces, which with the Forces of the Duke of *Savoy*, continue encamped near *Moncalier*; but the general report is, That they are going to break up from thence, and to march towards the Enemy, who keep their Camp ſtill near *Racagni*. The Poſts of the ſeveral Forces, compoſing the Duke's Army, are now ſeſed in this manner: The Germans are to have the Van, the Italians the Main Body, and the Spaniards the Rear.

*Venice, Octob. 13.* On Monday arrived here a ſmall Veſſel from *Dalmatia*, with advice, That the Proveditore General *Molino* was marched with all his Forces to *Cattania*, where he expected the farther orders of the Captain General; That the Proveditore General *Duodo* was likewiſe arrived there with the Troops under his Command, and that together they made a Body of 8000 Men. There are no Letters come from the Fleet ſince thoſe that gave an account of the taking of *Vallona*; but by a Tartane, which came from *Durazzo* the 21ſt paſt, we are told, That the Turks there were in a great diſorder, expecting to be attack'd, and were therefore ſending away their Wives and Children, with their beſt Goods. A great Convoy will part from hence the next Week, with which will be ſent 3000 new raiſed Men.

*Vienna, Octob. 19.* We have now the particulars of the taking of *Belgrade* more circumſtantially than we could tell you in our laſt. As ſoon as the Duke de *Croy* was arrived there, (which was on the 8th Inſtant) Count *Aſpremont* gave him an account of the State of the Place, and the Enemies Attacks, upon Conſideration of which, it was reſolved, That an Officer ſhould be ſent to the Emperor, to inform him of all, and to beg ſpeedy Aſſiſtance, but the ſame day about four in the Afternoon, a Bomb unhappily fell into the Magazine of the Caſtle, where their Labaratory was, and ſet it on fire, to prevent the miſchief of which, the Duke de *Croy* and Count *Aſpremont* ran preſently thither and extinguished it as they thought, but an hour after the Fire broke out again in the ſame place, and with ſuch violence, that it immediatly ſeized the Powder Room, and blew it up, deſtroying almoſt 1700 of the Garifon, who were going to mount the Guard, over-

throwing the Walls and Ramparts, filling up the Ditch, and opening ſo large a Breach, that the Enemy who were juſt beginning the Aſſault, entered by entire Squadrons, and cut to pieces all they met. In the mean time the Flames ſpread on every ſide, and ſet Fire to all the Magazines, which were ſeperated in 11 ſeveral places. In this Confuſion every one that was able eſcaped as well as he could over the *Danube*, or the *Sava*, and among others the Duke de *Croy*, and General *Aſpremont*, who got to *Perer Waradin*, from thence to *Valkovar*, and ſo by Land to *Eſſecke*, where the Duke de *Croy* is gathering what Forces he can to ſtop the Enemy. The Town and Caſtle of *Belgrade*, by the blowing up of the Magazines, and the Conflagrations that followed, are it's ſaid ſo utterly ruined, that they are become a mere heap of Rubbiſh, and impoſſible to be repaired or put into any condition of defence. The Turks too had their ſhare in the loſs occaſioned by the blowing up of the ſeveral Magazines, and could not ſtay in the Town that Night, but returned to their Camp; It's reported that they have loſt 9000 Men in this Siege. The Baron d'*Areyzaga*, Commandant of *Leopolſtat* in *Hungary*, is ordered to repair with all ſpeed to *Buda*, and to ſee that place be furniſhed with all things neceſſary for its defence. The Letters from *Upper Hungary* confirm the News of Count *Schelicks* having with Two Hundred Dragoons, and 300 Huſſars defeated 400 Janſenaries, and 300 Horſe of the Garifon of *Great Waradin*, who were ſent to attack the Caſtle of *Belignes*. We have no freſh News from *Transilvania*. General *Aſpremont* arrived here this Evening.

*Ratiſbonne, Octob. 19.* Yeſterday arrived here General *Dunewalt* from the Confederate Army on the *Rhine*, and this day he continued his Journey towards *Vienna*, whither he will be followed by 5 Imperial Regiments, who are to reinforce the Emperors Army in *Hungary*.

*Heydelberg, Octob. 24.* The Forces on the *Rhine* are ſeperated and going into their Winter-quarters. 6000 Imperialiſts and 2000 Bavarians are it's ſaid ordered towards *Hungary*; the reſt will have their Winter-quarters in the *Black Foreſt*, and in *Suabia*. The Forces of *Saxony* are come to *Eppingen* and *Bretten*, where they expect Orders about their Winter-quarters, which are not yet fixed.

*Francfort, Octob. 25.* Major General *Meſlin*, who Commands the Suediſh Auxiliary Troops, is gone to confer with the Landgrave of *Heſſe*, and in the mean time thoſe Forces continue in the *Wateraw*; and 'tis not improbable, but that they may at laſt have Winter-quarters aſſigned them in the Country of *Suabia*.

*Cologne, Octob. 27.* Of the Troops of *Heſſe*, *Lunenbourg*, *Munſter*, and *Paderborne*, 8000 Men are to Winter in this Country; which, with the Forces of *Neubourg*, *Brandenburg* and *Liege*, will make a Line from the *Rhine* to the *Meuſe*, to ſecure the Country againſt the Incurſions and Ravages of the Enemy.

*Hambourg, Octob. 27.* The Letters from *Lemberg* in *Poland* of the 5th Inſtant, tell us, That the Poles had ſucceeded in their deſign upon *Soczawa* in *Valachia*, into which place they had put 200 Men, furniſhed with Proviſions and all other Neceſſaries for 6 Months. That the Convoy that went with them was come back, and that the whole Army

Army was thereupon on their march to repass the *Niester*, and go into Winter-quarters.

*Hague, Octob. 31.* The Elector of Brandenburg arrived the 27th of this Month at *Cleves*, where he will stay some time. The Letters from *Flanders* tell us, That Prince *Waldicke* was marching with the Forces of this State towards the *Meuse*, in order to put them into their Winter-quarters. The Heer *Schutz* Envoy from *Lussemburg* arrived here some days ago, and assisted yesterday at the meeting of the Allies. The President *de la Tour*, Envoy from the Duke of *Savoy*, is on his departure from hence for *England*.

From the Camp at *Kinsale*, October 15. On the 5th instant we opened our Trenches against the New Fort, and on the 9th had advanced them to the Counter-scarpe, but the ill weather hindered the coming up of our Cannon, till the 11th, when part of it arrived. The Twelfth in the Morning Six pieces were mounted at the Dances Attack, and two Mortars at the English, which fired all that day. The 13th, two 24 Pounders were placed on the same Battery. The 14th the rest of the Cannon arrived, 3 of which were placed on the English Battery; the Dances on their side had made a reasonable Breach, and the Night following to disturb the Enemy they made a false Attack. The 15th the Cannon continued to play all the Morning, and every thing was prepared to have laid our Galleries over the Ditch, but at one a Clock the Enemy beat a Parley, and desired Hostages might be exchanged in order to Treat about the Surrender of the Fort, which being done, the Articles were agreed on, and signed about Midnight, by which the middle Bastion is to be delivered up to morrow Morning, and the Garrison, consisting of about 1200 Men, is to march out the day after with their Arms and Baggage, and to be conducted to *Limerick*. We have had in the Attack of this place, about 250 Men killed and wounded.

The Enemy with 1500 Horse and Dragoons advanced to *Macrone*, the rest of their Troops, which in all were reckoned at 8 or 10000 Men, being about 5 Miles behind, but having notice that Lieutenant General *Ginkel* was marching towards them with the Forces quartered about *Cassil*, they retired again towards *Limerick*, and in their retreat plundered and burnt several Towns and Villages. The Enemy, as we are certainly informed, are in an extreme want of many Necessaries, so that they will hardly be able to subsist this Winter.

The Duke of *Grafton* died at *Carke* on the 9th instant of the Wound he received before that Place.

On the 12th, the *Breda* Frigate being at Anchor in *Cork* Harbour, took Fire, by what accident is not known, and blew up, most of the Men being lost; Captain *Tenent* the Commander was taken up alive, but died within an hour. There were on Board 26 Irish Officers Prisoners, of whom 3 or 4 were Saved.

*Kilkenny, Octob. 17.* On the 11th we had an account from Lieutenant General *Douglas* at *Molingbar*, That he had taken the Castles of *Bahan* and *Rea*, in which *Baldarock O'Donnell* had put about 100 Men, who were all made Prisoners of War; so that on that side the Irish are now confined to the Province of *Ulster*. On the 12th we were informed, that the Enemy had burnt *Mallow*, and attempted the same at *Bendon-bridge*, but were prevented by our Troops quartered there, and that 'twas thought they had the like design upon *Caperquin*, the other Pass upon the *Blackwater*; whereupon Lieutenant General *Ginkel* drew immediately what Troops he could together, and marched himself with them to *Clonmel*, but upon the News of his march the Enemy retired towards *Limerick*, having burnt several places, and among others the Lord *Orrery's* House at *Charleville*; so that part of our Troops that were ordered to *Clonmel* are sent back to their Quarters, & the rest have secured some Passes on the *Blackwater*. We hear that the chief Commander of the Rapperies in the County of *Carke*, and 15 or 16 of their Captains have Surrendered themselves. This Evening we have received an account of the Surrender of the New Fort of *Kinsale*.

*Whitehall, Octob. 26.* This day Don *Simon de Soza de Mapehanes*, Envoy from the King of *Portugal*, had his first publick Audience of Their Majesties, to Congratulate Their happy Accession to the Crown, being conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrel* Master of the Ceremonies, in the usual manner.
