That the Proveditore General Duodo was likewise arrived there with the Troops under his Command, and that together they made a Body of 8000 Men. There are to Letters come from the Fleet since those that gave an account of the taking of Vallona; but by a Tartane, which came from Darazzo the 21st past, we are told, That the Turks there were in a great disorder, expecting to be attacked, and were therefore sending away their Wives and Children, with their best Goods. Vienna, Oltober 19. We have now the particulanof the taking of Belgrade more circumstantially than we could tell you in our last. As soon as the Duke de Croy was arrived there, (which was on the 8th instant) Count Aspremont gave him an account of the State of the Place, and the Enemies Attacks, upon Consideration of which, it was resolved, That in Officer should be sent to the Emperor, to inform him of all, and to beg speedy Assistance, but the same day about four in the Asternoon, a Bomb un-happily sell into the Magazine of the Castle, where their Labaratoty was, and set it on fire, to prevent the mischief of which, the Duke de Croy and Count Affrement ran presently thither and extinguished it at they thought, but an hour after the Fire broke out again in the same place, and with such violence, that it immediately seized the Powder Room, and blew it up, destroying almost 1700 of the Garison, who were going to mount the Guard, over-

throwing the Walls and Ramparts, filling up the Ditch, and opening so large a Breach, that the Encmy who were just beginning the Assault, entred by entire Squadrons, and cut to pieces all they met. In the mean time the Flames spread on every side, and set Fire to all the Magazines, which were seperated in 11 several places. In this Confusion every one that was able escaped as well as he could over the Danube, or the Save, and among others the Duke de Croy, and General Afpremont, who got to Peter Waradin, from thence to Valkovar, and so by Land to Effecke, where the Duke d: Croy is gathering what Forces he can to stop the Enemy. The Town and Castle of Belgrade, by the blowing up of the Magazines, and the Conflagrations that followed, are it's faid so utterly ruined, that they are become a mere heep of Rubbish, and impossible to be repaired or put into any condition of defence. The Turks too had their share in the loss occasioned by the blowing up of the feveral Magazines, and could not stay in the Town that Night, but returned to their Camp; It's reported that they have lost 9000 Men in this Siege. The Baron d'Areyzaga, Commandant of Leopolstat in Hungary, is ordered to repair with all speed to Buda, and to see that place be furnished with all things necessary for its defence. The Letters from Upper Hungary confirm the News of Count Schelicki having with Two Hundred Dragoons, and 300 Hussars defeated 400 Januisaries, and 300 Horse of the Garison of Great Waradin, who were fent to attack the Caftle of Belignes. We have no fresh News from Transilvania. General Asprement arrived here this Evening.

Ratisboine, October 19. Yesterday arrived here General Dunewalt from the Confederate Army on the Rhine, and this day he continued his Journey towards Vienna, whither he will be followed by 5 imperial Regiments, who are to reinforce the Emperors Army in Hungary.

Heydelberg, Octob. 24. The Forces on the Rhine are feperated and going into their Winter-quarters. Good Imperialists and 2000Bavarians are it's faid ordered rowards.

Francsert, Octob. 25. Major General Medin, who Commands the Suedish Auxiliary Troops, is gone to conser with the Landrgrave of Hesse, and in the mean time those Forces continue in the Wetteraw; and 'tis not improbable, but that they may at last have Winter-quarters assigned them in the Country of Suabia.

Cologne, Octob. 27. Of the Troops of Hesse, Lunenburg, Munsser, and Paderborne, 8000 Men are to Winter in this Country; which, with the Forces of Neubourg, Brandenburg and Liege, will make a Line from the Rhine to the Meuse, to secure the Country against the Incursions and Ravages of the Enemy.

Hague, Oltob. 31. The Elector of Brandenburg arrived the 27th of this Month at Cleves, where he will itay some time. The Letters from Flanders tell us, That Prince Waldicke was marching with the Forces of this State towards the Meuse, in order to put them into their Winter-quarters. The Heer Schutz Envoy from Language arrived here some days ago, and assisted yesterday at the meeting of the Allies. The President de la Tour, Envoy from the Duke of Savoy, is on his departure from hence for England.

From the Camp at Kinsale, October 15. On the 5th instant we opened our Trenehes against the New Fort, and on the 5th had advanced them 10 the Counterscarpe, but the ill weather hinded the coming up of our Cannon, till the 11th, when part of it arrived.
