No. 158.—MEDITERRANEAN STATION.

MEDITERRANEAN.—SICILY—NORTH COAST.

Port Milazzo—Light-vessel Withdrawn, and Red Light Exhibited on Mole Extension.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 220 (2) of 1885, on a light-vessel having been placed to mark the extension of the Mole at Port Milazzo, north coast of Sicily:—

The Italian Government has given further notice, dated 10th March, 1890, that the extension of the Mole is completed, the light-vessel withdrawn, and the following permanent light exhibited:—

A fixed red light is shown from the extremity of the masonry of the mole at Milazzo, 44 yards within the submerged extreme, and elevated 19 feet above the sea.

PATAGONIAN CHANNELS—SMYTH CHANNEL.

Particulars of Shoal Island Beacon.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 382 (1) of 1889, that a beacon had been erected on the summit of Shoal Island, Smyth Channel:—

The Chilean Government has published the following information concerning the beacon:—Shoal Island Beacon, 22 feet high, constructed of iron, pyramidal in shape, and three-sided, is surmounted by a frame globe.

Position, lat. 52° 33' S., long. 73° 38' W.
