

vants, &c. became Prisoners. The Earl of Seaforth is expected here to morrow under a strong Guard of Horse. We hear from the Isle of Mull, that on the 9th instant the *Darvenach* being at Anchor in the sound of Mull, there arose a very violent Storm, which forced the said Boat from her Anchors, and drove her upon a Rock, where she broke to pieces, and Captain *Paterson* in Command, with most of the Men, was drowned. The same Letters add, that the Earl of *Byng* is in the Illness of the Sea, with about 3000 Men under his command, sailing with no success.

Perthmouth, October 26. The 24th instant came from the Harbor Three Majesty's Ships the *Alford* *Adventure*, with several Vessels under their Command from the Eastward. At the same time arrived here a Dutch Pink of 8 Guns and 13 Men bound to *St. Indies*, who 4 or 5 days before met off of *Portland* a French Privateer of 24 Guns; The French presently boarded her, but the two above-mentioned Men of War appearing in fight, the Privateer bore away, and the Dutch defended themselves so well against the French that were put on board the Pink, that they killed eight of them, and brought in here 17 Prisoners, among whom is the Lieutenant of the French Privateer. Yesterday a Dutch Caper brought into this Port two Prizes, taken off of *Ushant*, one of 20, and the other of 60 Tons, belonging both to *Dunkirk*, but having nothing in them but Ballast.

Perthmouth, October 28. The 26th instant sailed from *Spithead* to the Westward Vice-Admiral *Alemans* with several Dutch Men of War; as also Sir *Clouesly Shovel* with his Squadron. A Dutch Rear-Admiral with about 10 Men of War continue at *Spithead*.

Deale, October 28. Yesterday about Noon arrived in the *Downes* Their Majesties Ship the *Lenox* with the Earl of *Marlborough* and Lord *Celchster*, who came from *Corke* the 18th instant. In the Evening arrived the *Charles* Galley, *Northumberland*, *Warlight*, *Owners Love*, *Fubs Yacht*, and *Salamander*, likewise from *Ireland*. And now are coming in the *Crafton* and *Nidena*; the first having on board the Corps of the Duke of *Grafton*.

Whitehall, October 28. An Humble Address from the Mayor, Aldermen, Common-Council, and the rest of the Corporation of *Nottingham*, was lately presented to His Majesty by one of the Aldermen of that Town, accompanied with several Gentlemen of the County, congratulating His Majesties happy Success in *Ireland*, and safe Return; which His Majesty received very Graciously.

Kings-ton, October 28. The Earl of *Marlborough* arrived here this Evening from *Ireland*, and was very favourably received by His Majesty. The New Fort of *Kasale* was surrendered the 17th of this Month, Sir *Edward Saut* the Governor marching out, according to the Capitulation, with about 1100 Men. The Enemy left in the Fort considerable Stores of Ammunition and Provisions.
