Exemption from Muzzling of Dogs with Collars &c. in certain Districts.

1. The Rabies (Muzzling of Dogs) Order of 1889 shall in its application to the Districts and parts of Districts of Local Authorities mentioned in the Schedule to this Order be read and have effect as if the following paragraph were inserted at the end of Article 6 (Muzzling of Dogs) of the said Order of 1889, namely

(c.) Dogs which have on a collar with the name and address of the owner of the dog

legibly engraved on such collar.

and the requirements as to muzzling contained in the said Article 6 shall not apply to such dogs as aforesaid in those Districts or parts of Districts.

Saving as to Application of the Muzzling Order in other Districts.

2. Nothing in this Order shall in any way amend or affect The Rabies (Muzzling of Dogs) Order of 1889, in its application to any District or part of a District of a Local Authority
