Hull, Octob. 25. Here is lately arrived the Fortune, John Peacocke Master, from Gortculugh, under the Convoy of the Garland, Capt. Thomas Robinson Commander; He brought with him Mr. John Wayte of this Town, Master of a Fly-boat called the John, of 300 Tuns, carrying 10 Guns and 14 Men, who in their Voyage to Riga met a French Privateer of 18 Guns besides Pareroes, with whom they maintained a very sharp Fight for several Hours, killing and wounding above 50 of the Privateers Men upon the several Attempts they made to Board the said Fly-boat, and at last forcing the Enemy to quit her. Of the English only Mr. Wayte and two of his men were wounded, which caused his return hither, having sent his Mate with the Ship to Riga.

Plimouth, Octob. 28. Yesterday arrived here the William of this Place, and the Margaret of London, and this day the Rebecca of this Town, and the John and Margaret of London, all four from Virginia. This day came into this Port a Dutch Caper from Cruising. The Virginia Fleet with the Men of War their Convoy, intend to Sail to Morrow for the Downes, if wind and weather permit.

Weymouth, Octob. 29. Yesterday arrived here from Virginia, the Owners Adventure of 170 Tun, 6 Guns, and 19 Men, besides 4 or 5 Passengers, Thomas Wharton Commander; On the 27th instant about 2 in the Afternoon, they met a French Man of War of 44 Guns, and fought with him till Night, when having disabled the French in their Rigging, and shot away their main Yard, they got clear of them, and came into this Road, without the loss of one Man, but the Ship is very much damnified in her Hulk, Sails and Rigging.

Whitehall, Novemb. 2. The Sieur de la Tour Baron of Bourdeaux, Counsellor of State to his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy, Prefident of his Finances in Savoy, Intendant of his Household, and his Envoy Extraordinary to Their Majesties, had this day his first Publick Audience of the King and Queen, to congratulate Their Majesties happy Accession to the Crown, being conducted by Sir Charles Cottrel, Master of the Ceremonies.

WHEREAS His Majesty hath Empowered John and Thomas Webb Gentlemen, Keepers of the Park in St. James's Park, as also Keepers of the Game within Ten Miles of the Court of Whitehall, and the Precincts thereof, And Information being given, that notwithstanding His Majesties Commands, several Persons do molest and kill His Majesties Ducks and Game within the said Limits; It is therefore His Majesties special Command, That none presume to keep a Fowling-Piece, Gun, Setting-Dog, Greyhound, or other Dog, Net, Tammel, Trammel, or other unlawful Engine, wherewith to destroy or kill, or any ways disturb the Game, contrary to the Law and Statute in that case made and provided, other than such as shall be by Law Qualified. And whoever shall give Information to John Webb living in St. James's Park, shall have a Gratuity for every Gun, Net, Dog, or any Engine, that shall be seized and taken from any such Offender.

Any Persons who have been Robbed, either on the Highway, or by breaking of their Houses, may have a view of the said Persons, viz. the Golden Farmer at Newgate, London, and Thayne and Parfoild at the Marshalsea Prison, for the County of Surry in Southwark, and may receive further Information concerning them from the Keeper of Their Majesties Gaol of Newgate, London, to the intent they may be Prosecuted according to Law.
