Is Majesty has been pleased in Council to Order, That a Proclamation be forthmith Published, for the Security of Their Majesties Subjects against Robbers in the Highways, House-breakers, &c. By which, all risons are required to Apprehend John Smith alias ely Smith, Charles Rawlinson alias Lloyd, Edward Poor, Anthony St. Leger, Jonathan Compton, Elias Carroll, Henry Howell, Charles Browne, Richard Awson a.i.s. Old Mobb, Thomas Randall, Thomas Walters, Nicholas Gradin, Anthony Dunn, Henry Vaughan alias Phillips, ---- Frelawney, and William Jennings, who are notoriously known to be Highway Robbers and House-breakers, with a Promise of Twenty Pounds Reward to such as shall Apprehend any of the Persons above-named, and Ten Pounds for every other Highway Robber, Burglarer, or Murderer, to be paid upon their several Convisions, without any abatement or deduction whatsover, by the Sheriff of the County where such Convisions shall be made.

All Justices of the Peace are, upon notice of this Proclamation, to take Order, that due Warch and Ward be constantly kept by Horse and Foot, and that Hue and Cry be made after all Robbers, and other purfuit made with the utinost diligence that the Law requires for the Apprehanding Such Offenders, Strictly thinging all Vintners, Keepers of Common Ordinaries, Gaming-houses, Ale-houses, and Persons keeping Lodings, Chamberlains, and Keepers of Common Oftleries, Goldsmiths, and Workers in Gold and Silv:r,Brokers,aud Common Buyers and Takers to Pawn of Goods, and all other Psrsons where any such Robber on the Highway, Burglarer, or Murderer, shall resort unto, come, or be, or fuch Persons as they have cause to susped to be such, that they immediately stop them with their Goods suspected to be stolen, and cause the said Offenders to be apprehended and carried before some fustice of the Peace, to be proceeded against acording to Law; and all Goldsmiths, and Workers in Gold and Silver, are required, when any melted Silver in Inzate or otherwise be brought unto them, to be well fainfied of the Parties that bring the same, and woo melted down the fame, and why the fame was fo melted down; and if they suspect any Person, they are to carry them before some Justice of the Peace, that the said Suspection may be farther Enquired into, as they will infiner the contrary at their Peril.

And for the more effectual Execution of the Laws

And for the more effectual Execution of the Lates winft such Offenders, and for the preventing of survey Robberies, &c. All Instices of the Peace are required to meet forthwith in their several Districts, and can'e publick. Notice to be given to all Innkeepers, Offers, and such as lett Horses to Hire, to all Brokers, and such as lay and take Pattins, That if any sithem do famish any Persons who shall commit any of the Offences aforesaid with Horses, or shall in any

manner receive, comfort, harbor, maintain, cointenance, or conceal any such, or other Felons, they shall be punished and proceeded against according to the Severity of Law.

verity of Law.

And all Justices of the Peace are Enjoyned to meet once in every Month in their several Divisions, to Enquire after, and take an account of the Constables of the Defaults of Watch, Warding, and Hue and Cry, and Pursuit of Felons; and to take care, that all Persons making default therein be presented, and prosecuted to Conviction, for such their D faults.

The Justices are likewise to Enquire after the Defaults of Constables, Headboroughs, and other Officers of Justice, to see that they do their respective Duties, as they are of Office to perform, in discovering of all Persons committing any Murder, Robberies, Burglaries, or other Felonies, and to present their Defaults at every next Quarter-Sessions, and to see them Prosecuted for the sume.

The Jultices are Monthly to take an account from the Constables, of all Innkeepers, Ostlers, and Keepers of Herses at Livery, and of such as keep and lee out Horses to hire, and of Persons either publickly or privately driving the Trade of Pawn-Brokers, and Common Buyers of Goods, and of their Demeanor in their said Employments, and also what superfect Persons there are, and where and by whom they are lodged, harboured, or resorted unto, in their Constableries, to the end the Offenders and their Harbourers, Anders and Countenancers, may be proceeded against according to Law. And to that end, the said Justices of the Peace are required to cause the Constables to make frequent Searches after all Persons suspected to be of Evil Lise, and Guilty of the said Offences, their Abettors and Harbourers, to the end they may be proceeded against.

And all Justices of the Peace committing any Highway Robbers, House-breakers, or Munderers, are with all convenient speed to transmit a Copy of such Persons Commitments to some one of the Judges of the Kings-Bench, with a description of such Persons as are by them committed, with an account of their Horses and Goods taken with them, to the end the said Judges may give farther Directions for their Prosecution as shall be requisite, so as that they may in no wife escape from Justice, but receive a sust Pumshment for their Mildoings.

Edinburg, October 30. On the 27th instant a strict search being made among the Merchant Ships that lay in Letth Road, outward bound, the Lord Ballintine, who some time ago killed a Sentinel at Edinburg, and Mr. Season the Laird of Garetten's Brother, one of those who set upon the Mail, one Mr. Wast an Inn-keeper, and a french man, who were all designing their Escape under borrowed Names, were found on board of one of the said Veslels, and brought Prisoners kither. The Chief Officers that were made Prisoners who he surrender of the Castle of Fedres, are the Viscount Fendrat, Lieutenant-Colonel Objectust, Lieut. Col. Douglas, Captain Debie, Captain Grani, Captain Season, Captain Teisort, and Captain Johnslow, with 10 or 12 Inserior Officers, of whom four are French men. Letters of the 22d instant from Colonel Buchan in Aberdeen bear that the Laird of Inversilachy, Farquharfon of Westown, and Colision of Auchlonnes, with Keith Sheriff of the Mernes, Sie Williams Keith of Ludgebarne, Daviason of Bensersig, Alexander Tissoch, and several other Gentlemen in the Highlands, who had been in Rebellion, were coming in to yield themselves Prisoners at the King's Mercy, and that he had granted Passes to most of them for their Safety.

On Saturday last came Pembrook, October 28. into this Harbor a small Vessel of about 30 Tuns, called the Amity of Limericke, laden with Fallow, Hides, Gc. the Mafter pretended to be bound to Bristol, but upon Examination, and discovery of some Papers, it appeared he was bound to France, upon which the Vessel was secured with the Persons on board her, among whom is a French Captain, who happened to be left behind when the French Squadron failed from Galloway; he says, the Gari-fon of Limericke confifts of about 7000 Men commanded by Sarsfeild.

The Wonderful Eeginnings of Your Reign, are most certain Presayes of the Bissings which Heaven prepares for the Upreshings of Your Intentions; which have no other Scope, than to Restore this sourishing Kingdom to its frist Greatness, and break the Chains which Europe groams under. This Magnammous Design, worthy of the Hero of our Age, stid his Royal Highness at first with inexpresible 109; but he was constrained to Conceasit in the Secret of his Hart; and it at last he has been free to own it, he is obliged to the very Name of Your Majesty for it, since that alone has made him concease of ome hopes of Liberty, after so want Tears of Scrutinde. to many Years of Servitude.
